Distracted driving is any activity that diverts attention

from driving, such as talking or texting on your phone, eating and drinking, talking to people in your vehicle, adjusting your radio, or programing your navigation system. Texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading text takes your eyes of the road for 5 seconds or more. At 55 mph, taking your eyes off the road for 5 seconds is like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed.

Consequences

Texting and driving in Tennessee can result in a \$50 fine for a driver of any age. For young drivers who have Learner's Permits or Intermediate Restricted licenses, cell phone use of any kind while driving is illegal.

# Makers to display endangered folk art

A master and apprentice team from the Tennessee Arts Commission's Tennessee Traditional Arts Apprenticeship Program will be demonstrating white oak basketmaking in Woodbury on Saturday, April 15 from 10 a.m. to 4

Master white oak basketmaker Sue Williams of Morrison and her apprentice Brenda Kucharski have been invited to display and demonstrate their rare and endangered folk craft at the Arts Center of Cannon County.


Cannon and Warren Counties are considered by many folklorists to be the epicenter of this once ubiquitous local traditional art form.

Williams and Kucharski will be demonstrating in the lobby, accompanied by a powerpoint of their work together and a display of the baskets they have made during the apprenticeship. Attendance to this special Tennessee Folklife demonstration is free and open to the pub-

Williams and Kucharski are one of eight teams funded by the Tennessee Arts Commission's Folklife Program to pass down rare and endangered traditional art forms and skills through this year's inaugural Tennessee Traditional Arts Apprentice-

ship Program. Williams learned her art from legendary Cannon County basketmakers Estel and Gertie Youngblood and Mary Jane Prater starting in 1985. She has avidly taught, promoted and sharpened her skills in her chosen craft over

### Center stays Young

Now in its 27th year, the Arts Center of Cannon County offers creative, entertaining, and educational experiences for students in the Middle Tennessee re-

As part of the "Young at Art" school matinee series, the Arts Center offers three children's shows for both school fieldtrips and for the community at large.

The "Young at Art" school matinee series is designed for home school groups, public schools, and private schools in Cannon County and the 6 surrounding counties. Students on field trips often eat lunch in the Farmer's

Market Pavilion or in Cannon Hall (inside the Arts Center) before or after the

performance.

The shows offer educational entertainment that is often associated with literature taught in the classroom, such as last season's shows: "A Year with Frog and Toad", "The Cat in the Hat", and "Elf the Musical Jr."

This series offers a unique opportunity for students to experience live theatre, meet with the cast, and take pictures with their class on the set. In 2016 the Arts Center hosted 7,250 students.

The Student Ticket Sub-

sidy program, grant funding to buy theater tickets, through the TN Arts Commission is available to students of every county. See GRANTS at TNArts-Commission.org. Many of the schools who attend the "Young at Art" series apply for this funding.

The 2017 season started strong with "The Lion King Experience Jr.'s" ten sold out school matinee performances and three sold out public performances. Up next this year is "Lyle the Crocodile" which runs May 4-16.

When Lyle the big green Crocodile turns up in the Primm family's bathtub, nobody knows quite what to do. Lyle's performing talent soon wins them over so the Primms invite him to stay. This does not make their neighbor, Mr. Grumps, and his equally

grumpy cat, very happy. The musical is based on the book "Lyle, Lyle the Crocodile" and "The house on 88th Street" by Bernard Waber. It was adapted for the stage by Kevin Kling, and music by Richard Gray.

The cast stars the Art Center's very own James Bessant. James started performing on the Arts Center stage at age 13,





### Buddy Black

Buddy Black, Woodbury passed away on April 2, 2017. He was born in Rutherford County to James Hillard and Eva Groom Black. He was the second of six sons, preceded in death by three brothers, Wayne Black (MIA Korea) Pete Black, and Denny Black.

Buddy is survived by his wife, Annabel Seward Black; son, James Donald Black; granddaughter, Devon

and grandson, Destin; brothers, Sam (Francis) Black and Bobby (Lynn) Black both of Murfreesboro, and a sister-inlaw, Gerry Black of Murfreesboro.

Buddy was raised in the Hopewell Presbyterian Church in Milton. He served with the 981st Army Engineers during the Korean War. He retired as a highly respected Chief Deputy Sheriff and Court Officer in Cannon County after 20 years of service.

Buddy's primary passion in life was working with large animals. He showed his first Tennessee Walking Horse at age thirteen. He began training professionally in the mid 1950's. Winning Three-Year-Old Gelding Class at the Celebration in 1957 aboard Go Boy's Jet-A-Way. During his career, he showed Sun's Ace of Spades, The Sire of World Grand Champion, Ace's Sensation, which he owned as a Two-Year-Old. He was the trainer of the 1969 World Grand Champion Walking Pony, Scat Man's Kitty Kat. Other great horses in his stable were Go Boy's Brenda Lee, My Fair Lady, Mysterious Shadow, Handshaker's Princess, Son of Bel Aire, and Society Mack K. In 1965 he presented Triple Threat for sale commanding a bid of \$43,000. The highest priced walking horse ever sold at public auction at the time.

Buddy Black is the name that comes to mind when you hear the term Mule Skinner. He began working mules in the field at age five. His skills developed into training and showing draft mules. Many champion mules passed through his barn. In 1978 he won the Champion Pair Mules at Louisville, KY. There were nine championship classes in the show and he won seven of the nine. Buddy was one of the founding members of the Middle Tennessee Mule Skinners to preserve the heritage of the working mule. For 34 years, he had the honor of being the first wagon in the Columbia Mule Day Parade. He was named the Honorary Grand Marshall of the 2014 Columbia Mule Day Parade. Fittingly enough, Buddy passed away following the weeklong celebration of 2017 Mule Day which he loved so much.





# **April storms kindle** memories from '74

In wake of the recent storms that ripped through Cannon and surrounding counties the last few week, I can't help but recall the so-called Super Outbreak of April 1974.

That series of storms, which occurrred 43 years ago, stands as the most violent tornado outbreak ever recorded in the United States. From April 3 to April 4, 1974, there were 148 tornadoes confirmed in 13 U.S. states. Twisters were reported in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, North Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia and New York. At one point, as many as 15 separate tornadoes were ongoing at the same time.

The 1974 Super Outbreak remains one of the most outstanding severe convective weather episodes of record in the continental United States. Hardest hit was Xenia, Ohio, with much of the town destroyed and 32 people killed.


These storms are particularly memorable to me because they destroyed the home of my aunt and uncle, Jack and Ruth Pugh near Gassaway. I will never forget how their farm looked after the storm and how strangers rallied to help them rebuild.

Here's report from the April 11 edition of the Cannon Courier:

Mrs. Buster Chapman was killed when the tornado struck her mobile home in the Sycamore community. The Chapman children, Sandra and David, were rushed to Good Samaritan Hospital and later transferred to

Rutherford Hospital after receiving numerous injuries in the storm. The Chapman home was completely destroyed.

Hardest hit section of the county was the Gassaway community. Roofs were blown off many homes and barns. Trees were uprooted and shredded by the high winds. Cars and trucks were overturned and received heavy damage.

The home and contents of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Pugh, just outside Gassaway was completely destroyed. As the tornado swept across the Pugh farm a barn and upright silo were also destroyed. A truck parked near the silo received heavy damage along with other farm machinery. Bales of hay were scattered over a wide section of the farm. The Pugh family escaped serious injury by taking shelter in a storm cellar. Various reports indicate that two tornadoes struck the farm.

The tornado then moved into the Dowelltown community of DeKalb County where extensive damage was reported to many homes and businesses.

# Hometown newspapers don't offer 'fake news'

There I was the other evening, minding my own business, nursing the crud, when some paid idiot on television blared out: "Elvis is not dead. That's not his body in the grave at Graceland."

Thus, we have another media-born 'conspiracy.'

One talking head credited a man dying with cancer had agreed to go in the casket in place of Elvis.

Similar conspiracies bubbled up after New Years Day, 1953, when it was confirmed Grand Ole Opry Super Star Hank Williams Sr. had died in a car en route to perform in "It's eerie now in the 1990s, that

folks still believe Hank is still alive," confirmed the late Hillous Buttrum, a member of The Drifting Cowboys' band in 1953, in an exclusive interview he gave this newspaper reporter! Elvis' death back on Aug. 16, 1977

is one of those events you know where you were standing or sitting when news of his death came over the radio.

I was helping 'make up' page 3 in the Carthage Courier newspaper the afternoon of Aug. 16, 1977, along with editor Murphy Fair and Publisher Hershel Lake, when news broke King Elvis had died.

Same is true for Hank Williams. I was slopping the hogs out at the barn when Momma Whittle hollered from our farm house: "Hank Williams died this morning."

I was chopping weeds in a soybean field back home in the Bootheel farming country of Southeast Missouri when we learned Patsy Cline had perished March 5, 1963 in a field across the Mississippi River near Camden, TN.

President John F. Kennedy's assassination in Dallas is the most infamous milestone day where most Americans know where they were standing when Walter Cronkite lost composure on CBS Network.

The conspiracy theories that assassination launched are still spread as 'fact' around the globe.

I was pulling into a parking space at the Holiday Inn in Poplar Bluff, MO, when a news bulletin confirmed Martin Luther King had been gunned down on April 4, 1968 at the Lorraine Motel in Memphis.

Cannon Courier colleague Mike Vinson was the last journalist to interview James Earl Ray.

After that interview and multiple

interviews with James Earl Ray's brother in McMinnville, TN., columnist Vinson is penning a movie script there was a conspiracy of people, instead of

Ray involved in the death of Mr. King. Ray died on April 28, 1998 recanting his confession to his grave he had not fired the rifle that killed Dr. King.

The Rev. Dwight Faircloth, a promoter of gospel music in Middle Tennessee, was a ticket agent for Piedmont Airlines at Nashville International Airport the day Elvis died. He especially remembers where he was standing the day King Elvis died, which happened on Momma Whittle's birthday.

"We had one flight scheduled that afternoon to Memphis," Faircloth recalled. "When the news broke that Elvis had died, that flight was over-booked almost instantly ... and when the plane landed at Memphis, folks at that airport called, wanting to know where was the luggage. We told them: 'There is no luggage. Folks just wanted to get on the plane to get to Memphis to be near Elvis and the family."

As a bona fide dyed-in-the-wool newspaper writer/devotee, it's my belief that 24/7 round-the-clock cable news networks and hundreds of cable channels have been bad for real journalism and great for fake news. The need for news feeds never ends, thus they slap anything on the air to fill time slots now.

# How emoji are used

Fake news, alternative facts and Russian infiltration! I think it's time for a break. So let's deal with something really important: like how emoji are being used around the world.

One of the problems we have always had with e-mail is how to convey emotions. True, there are a few keyboard emoticons that can illustrate a small range of sentiments, but tens-of-thousands of emoji run the gamut of emotions, feelings,

moods and attitudes. So, here's a surprising bit of information: more than 6-billion of the little cartoons are sent each day, and the greatest difference in users isn't based on age. It's based on gender. A recent report found 92 percent of the on-line population uses emoji. Specifically, 78 percent of women, but only 60 percent of men use the little pictures.

The report also found the main reason people use emoji are to help message recipients

understand what the sender is trying to say. But despite the emoji available on public and private sites, nearly a third of people surveyed

said there is a need for more of

the little icons, particularly images dealing with sports, politics and current events.

For better or worse, the use of emoji is also a topic

of serious, and not so serious, scientific research.

I recently found dozens of web sites asking users to choose their favorite emoji, when it is or is not appropriate to use an emoji, and how people interpret what the sender of a message is trying to say through the emoji.

But guess what: emoji aren't all that new. I remember from years ago filling out a form in my doctor's office with rows of smiley and frowny faces asking me how I was feeling that day.

And by the way, the word "emoji" comes from Japanese words for "picture" and "character," and has no linguistic connection with the English

# Is it Time Your Baby Saw a Chiropractor?

The article notes that when babies are adjusted there are no "bones cracked" as they called it. Many adjustments involve finger pressure on areas of the spine to have an effect on the nervous system. # **Doctors call for improvements** in fed healthcare regulations

largest Tennessee's professional organization for doctors is calling for significant improvements to federal healthcare regulations that it says would improve healthcare in Tennessee and across

In a letter sent to Tom Price, MD, Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the Tennessee Medical Associationoutlines a list of existing regulations and interpretative guidelines that result in daily administrative hassles for physicians and medical practices and negatively affect the delivery of care to Medicare and Medicaid

"We have heard from doctors and medical office professionals on the front lines of practice every day how burdensome, unnecessary federal regulations rob time from patient care. Now that a physician with extensive medical practice and health policy-making experience occupies the

HHS office, we have an

opportunity to shift the

focus toward what is best for patients instead of what benefits health government bureaucracies, and third parties who never see a patient," said Keith G. Anderson, MD, a Memphis cardiologist and TMA President.

In its correspondence to Secretary Price, TMA details a range of items that it says either need to be repealed or amended and urges the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to take suggested actions. Among those listed as high priority: Allow physicians to

privately contract with Medicare patients for medical services of their choice with no penalties. Ease the regulatory

burden of Exclusion Database checks by

requiring checks only for new hires, or at least reducing the frequency of required checks. Institute protections for patients that allow their established primary care

physician to conduct -

and bill for - the Medicare

annual wellness visit even

if the patient has received a screening from another,

less familiar source. Use the Medicare program as the model of network adequacy protection beneficiaries by reducing the ability of health insurance carriers utilize narrow networks.

Hold the Medicare Recovery Audit Contractors (RACs) accountable financial penalties for poor performance and incentivizing RACs to identify underpayments made to physicians during the audit process.

Discontinue using pain management satisfaction surveys for payment; record only for hospital internal use. Related incentives have inadvertently contributed to the prescription drug abuse epidemic in Tennessee and across the

Provide funding to support and/or regulatory relief when physicians treat patients requiring language sign interpretation.

### Social Security Matters

### Ask Rusty - WEP - Substantial Earnings Test

Dear Rusty: I turn 62 this June. I collect a State Retirement Teachers and have been told I face a windfall reduction in my SS benefits if I have less than 30 service years in SS. Social Security claims that the years listed below do not qualify as years worked because the income is too low. Having researched SS regulations it stated that prior to 1978, quarters were earned if you made \$50 in a quarter. If this is correct can you tell me why these years listed below would not count? SS claims I am three years short of 30 because of these years:

1971 (earned \$636); 1972 (earned \$799); 1973(earned \$2175). Thank you for your Signed: Retired Teacher

Dear Confused: What you're referring to is Social Security's Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) which applies when a person has a pension from an employer who did not withhold Social Security payroll tax, as well as income from an employer who did withhold Social Security payroll tax. In this case the question isn't really whether your income was enough to earn a "quarter credit" toward the required 40 credits to be eligible for Social Security benefits, but rather whether your income for those years met what Social Security calls their "substantial earnings" test. In order to qualify as substantial earnings in the formula for computing the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP) your Social Security earnings each year must meet or exceed a substantial earnings test. Security's substantial earnings minimums for the years you wrote about 1971 - \$1950;

1972 - \$2250; 1973 - \$2700.

So as you can see, you did not meet or exceed their Substantial Earnings requirement for the years

and \$2175 respectively in those years. Those three years are what made the difference between having Social Security benefit reduced because you have only 27 years of "substantial Social Security earnings", and being exempt from WEP because you have 30 or more years of Social Security income. What this means in terms of your benefit computation is that instead of applying a 90% factor to the first \$885 ("first bend point") of your average indexed monthly earnings amount, they will instead apply a 75% factor. In terms of 2017 dollars, that means that instead of that first "bend point" contributing \$796.50 to your Social Security benefit amount, it would contribute \$663.75 or \$132.50 less. But since for anyone first eligible for Social Security in 2017 the maximum WEP reduction for 27 years of substantial earnings is \$128.40, that is the amount your Social Security benefit would be reduced as a result of the Windfall Elimination Provision.

Some programs scheduled for elimination include LIHEAP (Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program -- 14,454 people), SCSEP (Senior Community **Employment** Service Program -- 82 people), Services SSBG (Social Block Grant -- 144 people), Weatherization (49 households). also eliminates **CSBG** (Community Service Block Grant -- 18,638 people), which includes significant funding to Commodities, Meals on Wheels of the Cumberlands, and the STAR program.

Some programs scheduled for cuts include Residential Educational Programs (local funding will have to replace 25% of the federal funding it currently receives) and WIOA (Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act -- reduction of 21% or 201 people). Potentially, Head Start may be cut too; it is not confirmed, but Health and Human Services is scheduled for cuts (reduction of 18% so possibly 9 children).

UCHRA has worked through nine Presidential administrations since it was first established in 1973. Still, if you like these programs, you are encouraged to call the Upper Cumberland's U.S. Senators and Congressmen to share your experiences:





with the Woodbury Police Department, Cannon County Sheriff's Department, Department of Children's Services, and the District Attorney's Office to respond to child abuse cases and help children and families heal from the trauma. The Department of Children's Services protects children. Law enforcement investigates the crime and arrests the perpetrator. The District Attorney's Office aggressively prosecutes offenders. While, the Child Advocacy Center helps abused children and their families heal from the trauma of the abuse.

The Honorable Judge Susan Melton explained the importance of the services to children, "The Cannon County Child Advocacy Center is instrumental in assisting children who are victims of sexual abuse or children who have been drug exposed by allowing them to tell their account of the story once in an environment in which they feel safe and free from any outside influence."

Cannon County Sheriff's Office, Woodbury Police Department, and Cannon County Ambulance Service supervised road closures and kept runners

Over \$5,750 was raised for the Cannon County Child Advocacy Center to provide crisis intervention services free of charge to child abuse victims. All funds raised in Cannon County stay in Cannon County and benefit child

abuse victims and their non-offending family members.

"It feels good to finally have all of your hard work pay off, especially since we have been working hard for two years," eighth grader Brady Bryson said. "It is really rewarding to finally have a win."

Head coach Michael Bryson added, "It felt

Close to 2,000 students were registered at the event held at the Tennessee Miller Coliseum at the two-day tournament which concluded Friday evening.

Central Magnet High shot a score of 3,367, beating last year's winning score by 22 points. White County, the state high school champion in 2014 and 2015, was again the runner-up with a 3,352. CHET, which participates with home school students in the Nashville area, had a 3,287 to finish third. Oakland was fourth with a 3,263 and Warren County fifth with a

Stewarts Creek ended Central Magnet's

two-year reign as champion of the middle school division with a winning score of 3,212. Central Magnet was runner-up at 3,199 followed by Stone at 3,179, Whitworth Buchanan 3,147, and Christiana 3,136 to round out the top five.

East Lincoln moved to the top spot in the elementary division by shooting a 3,192. Buchanan was second with a 3,182, while Christiana, which had won the championship three of the past four years, was third with a 3,079. Cleveland's Black Fox elementary was fourth with a 3,029 while Browns Chapel was fifth with a 2,914.

Central Magnet's Alison Blanton was the event's top shooter. The junior shot a 297 (out of a possible 300). CHET's Laurel Thompson, who was the event's top female shooter three straight years, edged Central Magnet's Kaylie Corban for second place. Both girls shot a 294 in their rounds and a shoot-off was held to determine the runner-up. White County High's Haylie Young was fourth with a 293 and Tullahoma Middle Schools KT Payne had a 289 to comprise the top five

overall female scores. Warren County High School junior Austin Evans and Meigs County High freshman Caleb Smith each shot a 292. Austin was the medalist as he had 23 10s to Caleb's 21. Caleb's Meigs County classmate Jay Tyson was third with a 291. Stewarts Creek's Chase Hulan was fourth with a 289 and Central Magnet's Chase Wyatt fifth with a 286.
