General Election 2010: County Executive

EDITOR'S NOTE: Following is the first in a series of articles detailing the duties and responsibilities of the county offices up for election in August.

Cannon County voters will go to the

polls August 5 to elect persons to serve in a number of county offices for the next four years.

One of the persons they elect will serve as county executive. The current salary for the position in Cannon County is \$66,702 per year.

Three people will be on the ballot

Gannon, Rebekah Hindman Parton and R.O. (George) Pittman.

Gannon is the current county executive and has held the position the last eight years. He is seeking his third four-year term.

Parton is a current Cannon County

for voters to choose from: Mike Commissioner, having served the last eight years on the body. She is the owner and operator of A Touch of Home Flowers.

> Pittman currently helps at J.P.'s Fine Swine Bar-B-Cue, which is owned by his son. He has a background in business, having worked as a vice

president for an explosives manufacturer.

The proposed budget for the executive's office for the 2010-2011 fiscal year is approximately \$178,000. The executive has two assistants, a secretary and a bookkeeper. See ELECTION, page 11

Bullard Remembered For Desire, **Passion**, **Humility**

Those who coached and knew former Woodbury standout athlete Steve Bullard remember him as not being the biggest or fastest athlete on the field; however, what he lacked in size and strength he more than made up for in desire, passion and humility.

Bullard, 53 of Joelton, Tenn., passed away Sunday, May 23 at St. Thomas Alive Hospice. Funeral services were held Tuesday, May 25, at Cheatham County Funeral Home. He was buried in the Will Smith Cemetery in Ashland City.

Bullard starred as a receiver and safety on the gridiron for Woodbury Central in 1974, helping lead the Lions to their first 10-0 season - a feat that has not been duplicated since. It was Bullard's only season to play high school football but it left a lasting impression and helped pave the way for future personal success.

"He was just a natural

As you can see, I am addressing this to you as a person not necessarily as the Sheriff. I have worked in public service for 27 years, I do not consider myself an expert on human nature, but I do have a lot of experience in dealing with people when they are at a crisis point in their life. Therefore, I feel comfortable writing you this note commending you and your staff on the handling of 'people'.

At the Good Old Days, I was very impressed with the mannerisms, caring attitude and willingness to assist that your volunteers provided to the public. I, like you, have observed a lot of people through my job, what were good people, in desperate situations, making the wrong decisions. I admit, it took me a few years of working with the public, and some aging, to learn the lesson of not to judge immediately when becoming involved with a situation and with people.

These young men were absolutely superb. The gentleman at the gate would no less than insist the senior citizens wait for an escort to help them carry their chairs to a shady spot around the stage. Our booth workers, as well as all booths, were checked on at least three times a day to see if anyone needed anything. The young men you provided were irreplaceable at setting up tents, unloading merchandise, helping with lights, etc.

I caught Anna at the fairgrounds and told her how proud you all should be of these young men. They were not just doing a job, they had been given the opportunity to be a part of something, get involved and

unknowingly be reminded of the manners that were instilled in them when they were young. I don't have to tell you Billy, as it apparent you know, sometimes it is a simple project such as this that wakes up a person, reminding them to get their life back on track.

I realize some people we come in contact with cannot be helped, as they will not help themselves. I know you come in contact with individuals who are dangerous. With that said, I want to commend you for not only remembering you are not just a Sheriff but a person; and more so for taking the time to acknowledge that there are individuals you oversee in your jail are not just prisoners, but people.

Melba Chancey explained. "That was back in October and I'm still here... When I was diagnosed I prayed for two things, the wisdom to accept it and then for my fighting spirit to return. Both prayers were answered." Chancey's relay team, Melba's Mavericks, had a Mardi Gras theme and were handing out beads for donations.

American Cancer Society Staff Partner and organizer "They gave me six months to Harriett Stewart detailed the

meaning of the Relay.

"Our motto is 'Cancer never sleeps, and one night a year neither do we.' The relay symbolizes the experience of a cancer patient, beginning at 6 P.M. the teams begin walking... The relay goes on for a full twelve hours. We do one walk by candle light which represents the patient's darkest hour. By early morning the participants are worn and tired and the public has left... The morning light shines over the

trees just before 6 A.M. and that symbolizes a clean diagnosis."

The Relay serves a number of functions, it is a fun atmosphere for the public, it is a way for people to deal with the loss of loved ones to the disease, but most importantly it raises a lot of money for cancer research.

No official figures have been released but the Relay is expected to raise over \$15,000.

Meaner Than Fiction: Reality TV High On Aggression

Newswise — All the gossip, insults and dirty looks add up fast on popular reality shows, far outpacing the level seen in equally popular dramas, comedies and soap operas according to a new Brigham Young University study.

The researchers looked at five reality shows and five non-reality shows and found 52 acts of aggression per hour on reality TV compared to 33 per hour for the non-reality programs.

"The Apprentice" topped the list at 85 acts of verbal or relational aggression per hour.

Simon Cowell and "American Idol" checked in a little lower at 57 aggressive acts per hour – but then again, backbiting is tough

to do while singing.

"I knew the level of aggression was going to be high, but I had no idea it was going to be this high," said Sarah Coyne, a BYU professor of family life and lead author of the study. Coyne's findings will appear in the June issue of The Journal of Broadcasting and Electronic Media.

The researchers analyzed 120 hours of programming and coded every instance of physical, verbal and relational aggression. The 10 shows selected for the study are popular with audiences in Britain, although several shows are American productions.

And despite the "reality" label, half of the aggression appeared to be incited by

producers. One common tactic is to put participants in a booth and bait them into saying something nasty about their competitors.

What's the big deal?

Numerous other studies, including one by Coyne, demonstrate that meanness rubs off on viewers. And that was using very contrived and clearly fictional scenes.

"Of any type of program out there, I would think that reality programs are the most likely to be imitated," Coyne said. "All audiences think it won't affect them, but we aren't as immune as we think we are."

Where In The Bible Will I Find? Human Experimentation?

Recent reports in the national media about human experimentation are extremly disturbing. The Nashville Banner, Tuesday, June 28, 1994, revealed that Vanderbilt University experimented on human beings over a twenty year span. Radiation experiments were conducted on eight hundred and nineteen pregnant women "to learn how iron was absorbed by pregnant women" (p. A-1). Vanderbilt's experimentation on pregnant women was done under the auspices of the federal government. Between 1932 and 1972 our government decided to investigate syphilis among black men in Tuskegee (Macon County), Alabama. Doctors from the Public Health Service conducted tests to ascertain how black men were affected by untreated syphilis. The government simply investigated syphilis; they made no attempt to treat it.

Even when penicillin was discovered and widely used to combat the scourge of syphilis, the doctors in the Tuskegee Syphilis Study allowed the men afflicted with syphilis to continue their suffering without any medical relief. Millions of Americans reacted with horror when they learned of the cruel human experiments of the Nazi government. American service men were submerged in water while the temperature of the water was gradually lowered until the soldiers froze to death. The purpose of the experiment was to learn how quickly German pilots would die when they were shot down over the North Atlantic.

German doctors performed hundreds of experiments on human beings. Some of these brutalities are chronicled in Robert Jay Lifton's book, "THE NAZI DOCTORS." In our condemnation of German scientists, were we not condemning ourselves for equally hideous practices? How could American doctors or German scientists or anyone else have so little regard for human life. Could it be that they did not believe in the sacredness of all human life?

Could our killing of one million six hundred thousand unborn babies stem from the same disregard for life? Does not our president and other government leaders show disregard for human life when they legalize and support experimentation on aborted fetuses? Are not all human beings - unborn babies, handicapped people, old poeple "fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalms 139:12-14)?

In view of God's view of those creatures made in His image, how can anyone support abortion, infanticide, euthanasia and suicide? Does not this put to naught the second commandment of Christ to "Love thy neighbor as theyself" (Matt. 22:39)?

ELECTION ...

A county executive is both a manager and a mediator. The person who holds the position is responsible for running the business of county government. They are a manager of money and people.

The county executive interacts with state and federal government officials and agencies. He or she serves as a primary point of contact for companies interested in doing business in the county.

Unofficial duties include providing assistance to citizens who need services, or have a complaint about county government.

The County Executive is the chief executive officer for Cannon County and is the highest elected official. The Executive has the responsibilities of coordinating, processing and analyzing all County legislative measures as well as exercising a role of leadership in Cannon County government.

• The County Executive compiles a budget for all county departments, offices, and agencies, which is presented to the County Commission.

• The County Executive may examine the accounts of all county officers.

• The County Executive manages the county's payroll function of all county employees.

• The County Executive manages accounting functions such as bank accounts, accounts payable and accounts receivable.

• The County Executive manages the Cannon County personnel (human resources) function. This function is responsible for the legal hiring and firing of employees, recommending salary ranges and pay scales, administering employee benefits, etc.

• The County Executive manages Cannon County's purchasing function.

• The County Executive works closely with the County Attorney on all legal matters affecting Cannon County.

• The County Executive manages the county's insurance needs and liability issues.

• The County Executive sets the standard for ethics for Cannon County. He must be familiar with the conflict-of-interest laws and disclosure laws which are applicable to Cannon County and its employees.

• The County Executive works closely with the surrounding municipalities and County Chamber of Commerce in an attempt to attract new businesses and industries to Cannon County.

Subject to the approval of the county legislative body, the county executive appoints department heads and members of county boards and commissions when the general law or private acts do not provide for the election or appointment. However, this authority is limited as the general law or private act creating the department or board usually specifies the method by which the various department heads or board members are selected.

As office management is an important function of the office, county executive should have knowledge of personnel procedures as affected by both state and federal laws. The county executive should have a basic understanding of potential liability, including both personal liability and county liability, and of the Tennessee Governmental Tort Liability Act.

A county executive must be a qualified voter in the county, be at least 25 years old, have been a county resident for more than one year prior to filing the nominating petition for the office, and must not otherwise be disqualified from holding public office (by reason of criminal conviction or other legal disqualification). No educational or experience requirements apply to the office.

The county executive is elected by popular vote at the regular August election every four years coinciding with the governor's election, and takes office on September 1 following the election, after receiving the proper certification of election, obtaining the official bond and taking the required oath of office. Failure to take and file the proper oath and bond is a misdemeanor offense.

Meth Found On Petty Gap

We're going to implement it for the tail end of the 2010 year while the seniors are gone." about Cannon Asked County's need for a middle school, Tenpenny said "it's inevitable with the changing standards. You just have to start earlier [with a more standard and stringent curriculum] for kids to enter high school prepared and on course to graduate."

County Budget Committee Turns Down Several 2010-11 Requests

Having gone through the process of hearing all of the budget requests from the different county departments and agencies, the Budget Committee of the Cannon County Commission began its final review of the proposals Thursday night.

Based upon the review by the committee, it is unlikely every county department or agency will receive all of the money they are seeking, although the ultimate decision will be in the hands of the full county commission.

In addition, the requests presented include a three percent pay raise for county employees, and it has yet to be determined if there will be enough money available to make that possible.

Entering Thursday's meeting the proposed County General Budget for fiscal year 2010estimated 2011 shows revenues of \$5,064,178 and projected expenses of \$6,209,881.

The first proposed budget to get pared by the budget committee's knife Thursday was that of the Cannon County Ambulance Service. Director Ricky Cope is seeking \$114,153 more for Medical Personnel to pay for an additional crew. The sentiment budget expressed by committee members Chairman Mark Barker, commissioners

Greg Mitchell and Kevin George and citizen representative Bill Jennings was that it is not affordable at this point to increase staffing.

The sheriff's department is seeking a nearly \$100,000 budget increase, the majority of it for increases in employee salaries, wages, overtime pay and benefits. The committee made some minor downward suggestions to those budget line items.

During the discussion of the proposed budget for the sheriff's office, Fifth District Commissioner Bob Stoetzel questioned why there were line items and salary figures listed for the positions of Chief Deputy and Sergeant(s) when there were currently no persons filling those positions and there are no plans to do so.

The committee decided to move the money the sheriff proposed setting aside for those positions to another line item in the sheriff's budget, that of Deputy(es).

(EDITOR'S NOTE: During the discussion of the sheriff's budget, this reporter and Stoetzel got into a heated verbal exchange after I blurted out for Stoetzel - who was sitting behind me - to "hush" when he interrupted me while I was attempting to ask Chairman Barker a question. We continued our heated dialogue following the meeting. I apologize to the members of the committee and

those in attendance for my part in the incident.)

Other major budget increase requests the committee recommended trimming or eliminating Thursday included:

• That of Fire Prevention and Control, which is seeking an additional \$252,000 for Motor Vehicles (\$200,000) and Other Equipment (including pumper/SCBA Bottles).

• Funding a \$40,000 salary for the Supervisor/Director of Cannon County Emergency Management.

Also considered or recommended by the committee Thursday:

• The Cannon County Senior Center requested a \$15,000 contribution from the county, up from \$4,000 this year, but the committee suggested \$6,500.

• Cannon County SAVE, which provides services to victims of domestic violence, desires a \$10,000 contribution from the county. The committee will forward the request to the full commission. • The budget requests of the County Executive Office and the Election Commission Office were trimmed slightly.

• Left relatively unchanged were the requests from the Adams Memorial Library System, the Parks and Fair Boards (Community Center), Agricultural Extension Office and Veteran's Services.

schools after him. He only played the one season because of various factors but he was something to watch."

Bullard was a three-sport star who was most known for his play on the football field. He intercepted two passes in his first game as a Lion, running each back to the 10. Mayfield recalls another game against a top-ranked team where Bullard intercepted a pass in the Lions' end zone and also had a 86-yard touchdown reception to give Woodbury a 7-0 lead.

And then there was the memorable game against Lynchburg, which Woodbury had not beaten in 25 years - until 1974. Lynchburg was unbeaten and had been unscored upon but Bullard caught two touchdown passes and ran the second half kickoff back 90 yards for a touchdown. By the time the smoke had cleared Bullard had led Woodbury to a 22-87 win.

Woodbury Mayor Harold Patrick called the action for local radio and he remembers Bullard as one of the best all-around athletes ever to play in Woodbury.

"He was absolutely one of the best I've seen play here through high school," Patrick said. "He wasn't big, maybe 5-foot-11, 165 pounds, but he had talent and he just played. What stands out to me is how hard he played. (Bullard) gave you his heart and soul the entire game. What he may have lacked in talent he made up with his heart, passion and tenacity."

That's how Hall of Fame Coach Boots Donnelly remembers Bullard. Donnelly signed Bullard to play football at Austin Peay following a stellar two-year career at Northeast Mississippi Junior College. Bullard helped lead Austin Peay to its first and only Ohio Valley Conference football championship in 1977. In fact, it was Bullard who hauled in the game-winning touchdown with 30 seconds remaining to beat Tennessee Tech and give Austin Peay the title.

"Bullard had, without a doubt, as soft a pair of hands of any kid I have ever coached," said Donnelly, following Bullard's funeral Tuesday. "He was a great receiver for us at Austin Peay. He was a tremendous athlete and a very humble kid. He was just a very, very good player and late in life he became a better person than he was an athlete."

Donnelly said Bullard left his mark on the young people he taught and coached in Cheatham County.

"He had a knack for getting along with people and with people that for whatever reason had problems," Donnelly said. "He left his mark on the people who came into contact with him and he was great with special needs children. He had a big place in his heart for them."

Bullard was preceded in death by his parents, James M. Bullard and Marlene A. Taylor. He is survived by his wife Angela Bullard; daughters, Dena Thomas, Regena Hughes and Stacey Groves; son, Brian Bullard; granddaughters, Cierra and Chloe Thomas; brother, Mike Bullard; and sisters, Pam Nash and Sandy Gray. Jesse Moulton, Danny Barksdale, Mark Forbes, Dustin Bullard, Zeb Bullard and Brian Vann served as pallbearers.

All the trading that Grady was famous for helped out the family during their lifetime. Grady went to farm school which was given at the Veterans Memorial Gym. Avanell and Grady were entrepreneurs according to Grady Jr. While farming the Georges operated a portable Roller Rink.

Avanell owned several places here in Woodbury at different times. They actually owned the building where the first Dollar General bought; it was the Georges Five and Dime. After they sold the building to Dollar General, Nell was the first manager of it. The Dollar General has been in about three different places and is now the Dollar General Grocery Store at Edgefield. Nell had the Trade Fair (the Quick Shop) and the Fina near Piggly Wiggly. They operated a restaurant at the corner of Lester and McCrary Street where the Good Will trailer sits today, Scotties was a the original restaurant there. There was the Ice Cream Shop on Main Street right across from the Courthouse. When the girls were older they always helped their mother in whatever she did in the food business, and she was always successful in what she did. Grady and Nell had five children: David, Jana, Grady Jr, Faye and Beth. They were always a close family and the way that Grady described his father, he was the same way. Nell had been hit by a bread truck right at her driveway in the late 1990's and the family said that is when her health started going down. She died in 2005. Grady is now having heart problems which started about a year ago. He currently has a pacemaker to help his heart.

Over 250 Turn Out For Turney

As his life flashed before him, he sat with his wife of forty-three years and felt mixed emotions to be leaving Auburn School which greatly had impacted his life. Along with a host of well-wishers, he watched with interest a PowerPoint presentation that chronicled his forty-four year career in education. The staff of Auburn School hosted a retirement reception for him with over 250 in attendance on Sunday afternoon May 23rd. With a tearful voice, Roger Franklin Turney thanked everyone for coming, then he jokingly said, "I didn't know there would be this many people so glad to see me gone!"

First grade teacher for thirty-six years, Ms. Betty King stated, "Working with Mr. Turney has been a roller-coaster ride of tears and laughter - it has been fun." Director of Cannon County Schools, Ms. Barbara Parker stated, "It will be difficult to replace a legend like Roger Turney who will greatly be missed." Melinda Crook fifth grade teacher for nine years stated, "Mr. Turney is a great supervisor who lets us do our job. If we need help with something, no job is too small or too large. He has a huge impact on Auburn School as well as the Auburntown Community."

In addition to his vocational career, Mr. Turney is a dedicated civic and church leader. His youngest son Travis finds it hard to visualize his father as retired. "He is the man that never stops going," he declared. Mr. Turney has served on the Auburntown City Council since 1970 and as mayor since he was first elected in 1972. He has been an elder at the Church of Christ in Auburntown for the past twelve years. He is a 1972 charter member of the Auburntown Lions' Club and has served as its president for more than a decade.

Mr. Turney chuckled when he said that after retirement he would most likely visit Auburn School frequently, "Just to make sure it is still there after serving as principal for thirty-six years". Although born in Ohio, Mr. Turney lived in Auburntown when he was enrolled in first grade at Auburn School under the tutelage of Miss Elna Duggin. During the fourth grade, he and his parents, Hop and Mable Turney, moved to California with his siblings Dennis and Jacquline. However, they always returned every couple years to visit family. "When I was a teenager, I noticed a pretty school girl named Shirley Turney.



Between visits, we kept in contact by mailing cassette tapes to each other," he explained. "Shirley was the real reason I moved back to TN to attend Middle TN State University (MTSU)," he disclosed. Mr. Turney lived with his maternal grandparents, Charlie Hawkins, the first mayor of Auburntown and wife Jennie. He earned both a bachelors' and masters' degree and taught at MTSU for four years prior to becoming principal at Auburn School.

When asked to name his greatest career accomplish, Mr. Turney showed his sense of humor by saying he was just glad to have survived! He reported that his biggest challenge came after the Auburn School burned in 1977. Many people felt the county could not afford to rebuild the school. Mr. Turney reported his father-in-law, Tommy Turney, was a member of the county court and instrumental in promoting funding for a new elementary school. The new Auburn School opened in 1980 with additional space constructed in 2002.

Mr. Turney is looking forward to retirement and spending more time with family, including sons Todd, Corey and Travis and five grandchildren. Mr. Turney's wife Shirley has enjoyed retirement from teaching for the past three years. Mr. Turney has planned a garden to share and already has thirty-six tomato plants. Perhaps that is one tomato plant for each year he was principal at Auburn School. Mr. Turney also has plans to renovate his 1964 Ford Falcon and enter it in antique car shows.

During the retirement reception for Mr. Turney, a book with hand written notes, letters and pictures, was lying on the gift table. His students at Auburn School had designed and given him this special gift showing their friendship and respect. One 5th grader wrote "...I will miss you like when you pass me and you always tap me on the head and we laugh. I will miss that. No one will ever take away that memory." A couple of kids commented on their principal's math teaching skills. "Thanks for helping me on my math lessons and thank you for helping me with all that algebra." A teenager said Mr. Turney made it fun to come to school and another said she would miss walking with Mr. Turney when he takes her class on their daily exercise walk. A 4th grade child declared Mr. Turney was "astonishing" while his fellow classmate drew a bright blue sea with the inscription that he would miss Mr. Turney "forever and ever".

> If anyone could be called, "Mr. Auburntown" it would be Roger Turney. His many accomplishments were recently recognized by the members of the 160th General Assembly of the State of TN. A Resolution honored him as an outstanding educator who has provided the highest quality of education for Tennessee's students. That is the sentiment of so many family, friends, co-workers and community leaders who came to wish him well on his special day to celebrate his much deserved retirement.

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AG Warns Against On Line And Other Frauds

Tennessee Attorney General The capacity for thieves to steal your identity and commit fraud is only limited by their creativity.

According to Tennessee Bureau of Investigation crime reports, online and other fraud is a serious problem in Tennessee. Federal Trade Commission statistics place our state in the top half of the nation in fraud, identity theft, consumer and related complaints. This means that all of us should remain vigilant

against identity theft and other deceptive activity.

More people than ever are using the internet to shop, bank, search for jobs, and, as seen recently, donate to or volunteer for charitable work. While managing your life online is convenient, it may come at a high price if you are a victim of fraud or identity theft. But you can take steps to mitigate this risk.

The General Assembly has provided both my office and the District Attorneys powerful tools to use in combating identity theft and other fraud. Under consumer protection and criminal laws, identity theft is defined expansively, interpreted liberally, and subject to substantial financial and criminal penalties. Taken together, the laws protect a wide-range of sensitive information including biometric data, social security numbers, and health insurance account numbers from law breakers in this state. But unfortunately, many of the most sophisticated scams operate from beyond our state and national borders.

Consumers themselves are the front line defense against identity theft and related fraud. My office's Consumer Division works closely with the Commerce and Insurance Department's Division of Consumer Affairs to help Tennesseans learn how to avoid disclosing their personal information and to resolve those cases where sensitive may have been data compromised.

In some instances, it is not the consumer's fault that personal information is compromised. My office sees a number of cases in which personal information is compromised when the security of computer databases is breached at hospitals, schools, banks and other institutions. including government offices. All it takes in such cases is the theft of a single laptop, flash drive, or hard drive to provide access to extraordinary amounts of sensitive personal information. In 2007, Tennessee and a group of other states led a multistate investigation into the theft of confidential information stored on computers owned by a major national retailer. Company officials said the hackers broke into an electronic system handling credit and debit card transactions as well as checks and merchandise returns for customers. Information from payment cards and other transactions from almost 50 retail stores in Tennessee were potentially compromised. To resolve the case, the corporation voluntarily adopted heightened safeguards

Corn and Soybean - Replanting, Fertility, Etc. (Angela McClure, Corn and Soybean Specialist)

There were a number of folks who made the statement back in mid April that corn planting had gone too smoothly this year!! So, we have hit our bump in the road (photo from Tim Campbell, Dyer County). Corn loss estimates are still coming in on river bottom fields as the

water continues to rise, and there is clean-up to do in those bottom fields that have drained off. The good news is that compared to last year where we had weeks of cool temps and almost continuous rain, our rains have come and

gone. As fast as it rained, I think a lot of water ran off upland fields which are now drying and corn is bouncing back with 80 degree sunny weather.

Most upland fields look good- some washing on hillsides and wet low spots, but as long as the corn and soybeans were out of the ground I don't think our stands are going to be badly impacted as long as the soil is able to drain. Where corn or soybeans had not emerged, check fields over the next few days. Emergence may be poor in areas that silted over too deep. Since we are into early May, a uniform corn stand of 24,000 plants per acre would definitely be a keeper. Some may choose to keep a lesser stand and accept that yield potential is going to be reduced. We don't have a lot of soybean acres planted. Our target population for keeping a soybean field is uniform stand of 100,000 plants per acre or better for a Group 4 bean.

How Long does Corn Survive under Flooded Conditions? It depends on duration of flooding and temperature. The warmer the temperature prior to flooding, the less time plants can tolerate being under water. Emerged soybeans may be more tolerant to short term flooding than corn. Back in 2007, I had a soybean test at Milan that was flooded for several hours. The soybeans were about 10 inches tall and blooming and were coated with silt, but they sloughed off the mud and kept on growing. The plants didn't set pods on the lower branches but the crop made 50+ bushels/acre.

Where corn is under water for one day or less, I would consider salvaging that field as long as the stand is something you can live with and the plants are healthy otherwise. With corn, flood water can deposit silt and potential pathogens into the whorl. Be aware that corn can die from a condition called 'dead heart' where the tissue

down in the stem turns brown and mushy but the exterior of the plant still looks okay for a few more days. Another condition called crazy top can show up late in the season caused by water damage to the growing point and tissue that forms the immature tassel

Saturated soils or 'wet feet' will slow plant growth and have a bigger impact on nitrogen loss

from the field. N loss is addressed below.

What About Replanting Corn in May or June?? Flooded river bottom fields planted to corn will be wet for 2 or more weeks. Crop insurance requirements may dictate how much

rain will protect surface applied nitrogen from volatilization loss by moving urea or UAN down into the soil profile. Heavy rains leading to flooding and saturated soils for several days contribute to nitrogen loss through denitrification. Nitrogen loss to denitrification occurs when nitrogen in the nitrate (NO3) form is converted to nitrogen gas by bacteria in the soil. The amount of denitrification increases with the amount of time a field is water logged (soil needs to be saturated for at least 2 days in order for the bacteria to start the denitrification process).

In fields where some or all nitrogen fertilizer has already been applied, estimating the amount of N loss depends on the 1) nitrogen source used, 2) how long the nitrogen has been on the field, and 3) duration of flooding if water is standing in the field. Below is a table we borrowed from the University of Kentucky with some commonly used N sources and the percentage of fertilizer that is likely available as nitrate nitrogen at different times after application.

An estimate of denitrification loss is 3-4% loss of nitrate nitrogen for each day soil stays

corn is replanted this year. We ran into this issue last spring where replant corn got pushed into late May and June. We are working to get our recommended corn planting windows adjusted earlier, but at this time there are no changes from last year. May 20th is still the cutoff for full coverage insurance and June 15th is the late planting cutoff that is qualifies for reduced insurance coverage. Some crop insurance companies have more flexibility as to how they push those late replant dates. The extension service is available to help in any way we can to expedite this process.

What about My Nitrogen Losses (with Hugh Savoy, Extension Soils Specialist)? The following is a slightly tweaked version of some information we provide last year where N loss

was an issue. Extremely heavy rains last weekend and subsequent flooding have created concern with producers in those fields where fertilizers that were already applied prior to or at planting may be lost. Fortunately, while P and K fertilizers are water soluble and move into the soil profile fairly rapidly, they generally stay in the upper 3 inches of the soil profile unless the soil is removed from the field with flood waters.

Nitrogen fertilizer loss is more

saturated beyond 2 days. As an example: Ammonium nitrate applied at 180 lbs N/Acre before heavy rains where fields will stay saturated for 5 days.

o Example 1: ammonium nitrate applied a few days before rains. At < 1 week ammonium nitrate will be at 50% nitrate form (180 lbs N/acre x 50% = 90lbs nitrogen/acre). With 5 days of saturated soils minus 2 days it takes bacteria to start causing denitrification = 3 days that denitrification loss will occur. At 4% loss

per day x 3 days loss time = 12%loss has occurred (90 lbs nitrogen/acre X 12% loss = 10.8 lbs nitrogen lost per acre)

o Example 2: ammonium nitrate is applied 3 weeks before heavy rains. At 3 weeks ammonium nitrate will be at 80% nitrate form (180 lbs N/acre x 80% = 144 lbs nitrogen/acre). With 5 days saturated soils minus 2 days for bacteria to begin causing denitrification= 3 days that denitrification loss will occur. At $4\% \log/day \ge 3 days = 12\% \log s$ occurred (144 lbs has nitrogen/acre X 12% loss = 17.3 lbs nitrogen/acre lost).

Postemergence or side dress applications nitrogen to supplement nitrogen that may have been lost or to apply the should be made before the V6 stage of corn, but can be economical up to tasseling in some situations. If no nitrogen was applied at planting or the majority was lost due to flooding, side dress nitrogen should be applied as soon as practical after V3 corn. These nitrogen sources work equally well as a side dress source: ammonium nitrate broadcast, injected UAN, dribbled UAN or granular urea + Agrotain. Temporary leaf tissue burn of broadcast ammonium nitrate can be minimized by spreading the material when plants are dry. Leaf burn from nitrogen fertilizer will not harm yield.

Plant analysis may be used to assist the corn grower with a side-dressing decision after growth stage V6 and up to tasseling. Eighteen to twenty of the first fully mature leaves below the whorl should be collected from the affected area (no larger than 10 acres) and sent to the Soil, plant and pest center in Nashville (see: http://soilplantandpest.utk.edu/planttissue.html) for Total N determination. Total N in the leaf during this time should be between 3.00 and 3.5 percent. Plant analysis is generally not very effective until after the V6 growth stage unless there are severe N deficiencies in the field.

А pre-side-dress soil test (http://soilplantandpest.utk.edu/pdffiles/PSNTC infosheet105.pdf) may be used prior and up to V6 growth stage. A side-dress nitrogen application rate to correct potential nitrogen deficiency is difficult to quantify with any great degree of certainty. The range of 40 to 75 lbs N /acre is often used by corn growers making a decision to side-dress based upon calculated nitrogen loss or plant analysis results. More specific recommendations may result with the pre side-dress N soil test.
