Vandals strike hard under cover of dark

A series of shattered windows and car robberies kept the Woodbury Police Department busy one night last week.

The incidents prompted Woodbury Police Chief Kevin Mooneyham to issue a public reminder to residents that they should remove all forms of currency from their vehicles and to lock them when they are leaving them parked overnight.


During the late evening hours of Monday, June 11 and the early morning hours of Tuesday, June 12, the WPD investigated three incidents of windows being smashed with large objects at area businesses, and five reported robberies from cars on Lee Ave. and Kimela Dr.

One incident of vandalism took place at Jennings Jewelers on W. Main St. WPD Patrolman Brent Brock reported he was dispatched there at 2:50 a.m. for an alarm, with glass breakage.

Upon arrival Officer Brock observed the right front of the store had been broken, and a broken brick was lying on the sidewalk, broken into several pieces.

County Sheriff's Cannon Deputies Seth Perry and Brandon Gullett also responded to the scene, and searched the area in an attempt to locate a suspect of suspects and additional evidence. Nathan Jennings, a resident of

Gannon credits Appelbaum for 'wonderful' work

(June 13).

A process spanning six years and the cooperation of local, state and federal governments, culminated in historic fashion atop Short Mountain Wednesday

The U.S. Department of Justice transferred to the state of Tennessee approximately 1,000 acres of undeveloped land as a result of a federal criminal conviction of two individuals for distribution of marijuana.

The land will be managed by the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency and will be known as Headwaters Wildlife Management Area. It is the 124th Wildlife Management Area with the TWRA.

It is the largest transfer for conservation purposes in the past 15 years by the federal government to a governmental entity, according to William C. Killian, U.S. Attorney for the eastern district of Tennessee.

"It is a great day for all of us," Killian told the crowd of more than 100 at the dedication for Headwaters Wildlife Management Area. "This historic conveyance of forfeited property will leave a

Reid all about reviving IDB

Randall Reid was beaming with enthusiasm one morning last week as he breakfasted at Joe's Place.

Reid, the new chairman of the Cannon County Industrial Development Board, is as excited

as he's ever been about the direction of the organization and its goal of bringing new business and industry to Cannon County, and helping those which are already here expand and prosper.

Reid was selected as Chairman of the reorganized IDB after the Cannon County Commission named seven persons to serve on the body Tuesday night. They meeting their first immediately following their appointments.

Reid is the longest-serving member on the IDB, having been

Sales tax hike on Aug. ballot

Cannon County's government and school system are having a difficult time making ends meet these days, and are looking to voters to give them a financial helping hand.

To that end, a referendum will be placed on the August 2 election ballot regarding the local option sales and use tax. The Cannon County Commissioners voted during their monthly meeting Tuesday (June 12) to pass the issue on to the voters of Cannon County.

Commissioners voted a few months ago to increase the sales tax a penny, from 1.75 to 2.75 percent. However, they had to rescind that action due to the fact that an increase in the sales tax must be approved by voters via a referendum. The referendum must take place no less than 45 days and no more than 60 days from when the commission votes to place it on a ballot.

Cannon County's local sales tax rate has been 1.75 percent since Jan. 1, 1976 and is among the lowest in the state.

In other business, the County Commissioners unanimously voted to override a veto made by Cannon County Executive Mike Gannon to increase the local Litigation Tax from \$12.00 to \$15.00 to cover the cost of the state-mandated raise in salary for

the General Sessions Court Judge. The Commissioners also let a veto made by Gannon stand that overrode the enactment of an Archive Fee of \$5.00 in regards to preservation and storage of records.

Most of the time Cannon County Sheriff Darrell Young comes across as a fun and friendly person.

Every now and then, though, he can be an ornery cuss.

The job calls for being both.

The ability to be engaging comes in handy when dealing with constituents, complaints and a certain Cannon Courier writer.

The ability to be stern when needed comes in handy when dealing with crooks, crackheads and, well, a certain Cannon Courier writer.

When Young ran for, and was eventually elected as, sheriff in 2010, there was little doubt he could handle the law enforcement aspects of the position.

After all, he had been with the Woodbury Police Department for many years and had worked his

way up to the position of assistant chief.

However, the Cannon County sheriff has many more responsibilities than those of an assistant chief.

• The sheriff is responsible for the operation of a detention

increases tremendously.

Recently, Kevin Mooneyham was officially promoted from assistant police chief for the Town of Woodbury to to police chief. All indications were, and are, Mooneyham has all of the qualifications which make him the right fit for that job.

The last person to hold the assistant chief's position was Young. If he had not been elected sheriff, there might have been the possibility he would have succeeded Tony Burnett.

While things didn't work out that way, time has shown that they worked out for the best, because Young has demonstrated he is the right fit for the job of sheriff.

An ode to our fowlfeathered friends

Chickens get no respect....!!

History annals verify that, dating as far back as the Greeks and Romans.

Despite giving us mostly-healthy poultry food products, chickens are still "slurred" today.

It never changes. Back during boyhood farm days, I had some smartmouthed boyhood buddies who used the foulest of fowl-language to describe my social standing.

"Whittle, you're chicken squat, put it on a biscuit, and eat it hot," was a popular, if childish chicken-house-chant.

I didn't take it personally, but that "chicken-house-chant" rant not only reflected bad on the birds, but insulted a number of my chickenlivered (not brave) friends dating back to country school yard days.

I ain't proud of this, but I ran like a "scalded chicken" in second grade to keep from getting my nose bloodied by Larry Dee Taul, who strutted like a proud rooster as the burliest biggo bully of fourth grade.

"Whittle, you piece of chicken-nardy, I'll kick your scrawny butt the next time you come into town," bully threatened.

I've never fully understood why "foul" language has to include our fine fowl-feathered friends.

My late great friend, Max Northern, also held chickens in high esteem. So high, in fact, he wore his job title - "Chattanooga Chicken Checker" - like a badge of honor. Say it real fast, and it has a special rhythm.

When he died of a heart attack, I was honored to be asked to do the eulogy at his funeral. I made certain his work title,

"Chattanooga Chicken

Checker," was in the tribute.

Farm folks seemed to have more respect for chickens since they not only helped feed us, but helped keep us snug while sleeping on thick "featherbed mattresses" on cold winter nights long after our coal-fired Warm Morning pot-bellied stove had lost its heat.

And on tundra-like work days out in the fields, there was nothing better than a piping-hot pot of farm neighbor Mommie Gowen's locally-famous chicken and dumplings she cooked atop her woodburning Sears-Roebuck cook stove.

"Mommie Gowen had the best chicken and dumplings up and down our farm road," recalls Alvie Jones, who grew up a farm neighbor boy back in Missouri.

Certain bragging rights went to farm families blessed to have mothers and grandmothers who knew how to prepare a tasty high-piled platter of fried chicken topped off with larruping good thickening gravy and biscuits.

"My late mother fixed the best fried chicken and gravy back when we lived out in Greenvale," testifies Lascassas resident Hooper Penuel.

Chickens were "a survival staple" that got many Great Depressionera farm families through hard times, confirmed retired Cannon/Rutherford County educator Jerry Gaither, a native of Auburntown.

"We'd have starved to death if not for the chickens, cows and hogs we raised on the farm," Gaither confirmed.

"Road-kills" were "bonus days" up and down our farm lane when a chicken would get run over by

neighbor boy Bruce Gene Bryant's souped-up black 1948 Ford coupe.

When we saw feathers fly, we'd bolt out of the cotton fields to see how mangled that "road-kill chicken" had been damaged after being hit by Bruce Gene's speeding automobile.

Saturday was our normal chicken-killing day. If mother killed two chickens, it generally meant the Reverend Allie Sullivant, and his wife, Alice, were coming for Sunday dinner.

"Don't you dare reach for the last piece of chicken when the preacher comes," Momma instructed firmly

to her young'ens. There's an art to killing a chicken.

Aunt Durette Reed had "wringing a chicken's neck" down to an art form. Unless the chicken's head popped off when its neck was wrung, it wasn't considered a good clean chicken-neck wringing.

Chicken-killing days made for some highdrama for me and cousins Robert Terry and Sandra Kay Reed. After the chickens' heads were popped off, the headless birds would flop around for a minute or two out across the pasture.

We called those flopping chickens doing the "barnyard boogy!!"

Cousin Robert Terry remembers those chickenkilling days: "Wringing those chickens' heads off, was the one job I hated most back on the farm."

Chickens didn't seem to benefit from it either.

Another view

Do politically motivated rulings really solve anything?

It's amazing sometimes how what we think of as obscure laws can have such unforeseen consequences. For example, all of a sudden the Tennessee Open Meeting law is in the news, with some unexpected results.

The Tennessee Open Meeting Law specifies that almost all government meetings have to have a public announcement. More importantly, for our purposes, the law also specifies that any actions taken at an unannounced meeting are invalid. We usually think that applies to meetings involving things like tax increases and major construction proposals such as shopping malls.

But according to critics, the Rutherford County

Regional Planning Commission violated the law when it approved construction of a mosque at the May 2010 meeting. The question recently facing Chancellor Robert Corlew was whether or not announcements about the meeting appeared as a public notice. He recently ruled it did not.

So now mosque construction may or may not be on hold. But at the same meeting the commission also approved construction of a storage unit, a fire hydrant waiver and proposed changes in sign regulations. And now those actions are also called into question So here's where the law

of unintended consequences come into play. The legality of the storage unit now comes

into question, as do all of the other actions the commission took. And since all of the actions involve property, the sideeffects could rapidly escalate.

All of those people who said they were only concerned about the open meeting apparently didn't seem to have any problem with the Planning Commission approving a storage unit at the supposedly unannounced meeting. I wonder if they want the storage unit shut down? You don't think they really had something else in mind do you? Like being single-mindedly opposed to the mosque?

Is it time for life insurance?



Just as many people between the ages of 30 and 50 lack a will, many also lack life insurance. A March 2011 survey from Genworth Financial and the University of Virginia's Darden School of Business found that almost 70% of single parents and 45% of married parents were living without any coverage.1

Why don't more young adults buy life insurance? Shopping for life insurance may seem confusing, boring, or unnecessary. Yet when you have kids, get married, buy a house or live a lifestyle funded by significant salaries, the

need arises. Finding the right policy may be simpler than you think. There are two basic types of life insurance: term and cash value. Cash value "permanent") life insurance policies offer death benefits and some of the characteristics of an investment - a percentage of the money you spend to fund the policy goes into a savings program. Cash policies have correspondingly higher premiums than term policies, which give you death benefits only and have terms of 10 years or longer. Term is a great choice for many young



because it is relatively inexpensive. There is an economic downside to term life coverage: if you outlive the term of the policy, you and/or your loved ones get nothing back. Term life policies can be renewed (though many are not) and some can be converted to permanent coverage.2

The key question is: how long do you plan to keep the policy? If you don't want to pay premiums on an insurance policy for more than 10 years, then term life stands out as the most attractive option. If you are just looking for a short-term hedge against calamity, that's the whole reason behind term life insurance. If you're getting into estate planning, then permanent life insurance may prove a better choice.

It may be cheaper than you think. Premiums on 10year level guaranteed term policies are startlingly affordable. Just to give you a ballpark example, a 40year-old woman could potentially line up \$250,000 in coverage through one major insurer for a premium of \$16 a month in August 2011.3

Confer, compare and contrast. Talk with a financial or insurance professional you trust before plunking down money for a policy. That professional can perform a term-versus-permanent analysis for you and help you weigh per-policy variables.

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
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Wife's pocketbook often becomes husband's millstone

She had been our healthy one, eating everything right, walking regularly and if a drug store had depended on her for a living, they were out of luck. But when the "c" word enters your world, only one knows the future,

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you should plan for the next trip. In our case the time together was short and fast, but a time of closeness in hospital rooms and looks into each other's eyes that went deep into the other's inner-thoughts that made the final trip soul-calming.

It is strange how now the slightest thing can return my thoughts to those final weeks together in a hospital room. There I also wrote my weekly column on a laptop and shared them with my sweetheart of 35 years. The other night I saw a gentleman carrying his wife's purse and it sparked one of those thoughts back to three years ago. That thought also made me want to share one of those columns again with you.

I grew up during the days, just like many of you, when we would go into Saturday town on afternoons and park on the local courthouse square to watch folks as they shopped with local merchants. It was much

more interesting than chopping out corn and hauling hay as we had done all week, plus it also gave you a chance to look at the latest items in the window at Woolworths.

Courthouse squares have been replaced by shopping malls, which do not lend themselves as a real good place to watch people like a 1953 Ford Fairlane parked at a parking meter did in those early years. Watching folks from the front seat of the family sedan while your mother shopped, allowed you and your siblings the opportunity to make comments without being overheard. Mall benches do not give this same privacy and it is not as much fun without a brother or sister's comments about the latest fashions being worn by those passing our car's

My people watching today has just become an opportunity of observation rather than a fun activity like back when I was a child. For example, I'm amazed at the number of cell phones in use or just hanging from people's ears. Everywhere I looked,

people have those little boxes punching them with their thumbs or devices that resembled tiny piccolos attached to their ears. And, what gives with all the loud songs these phones play in public places? In fact, a phone playing a crazy tune and everyone within hearing range grabbing their belts wondering if it was their phone that was ringing, often interrupted the calm of the day. At least on the square all you had was a car horn honking from an impatient driver.

The thing that catches my attention the most these days is the number of husbands looking after their wife's pocketbook over at the surgery center waiting room. It is a known fact that if there is anything that a man dislikes to do, it is having to carry their wife's pocketbook where other men or women see them do so. It is just not natural for a man to do this and you can tell by the way they carry the item that they would like to become invisible if at all possible.

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



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Chamber seeks money to lure tourists

The largest marketing tool Cannon County has to attract tourism is asking for a \$10,000 contribution from the County's budget during the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

Neal Appelbaum, President of the Cannon County Chamber of Commerce, handed out a comparison sheet to Budget Committee members during a meeting Thursday which showed neighboring counties and how each helps to fund their local Chamber.

The Cannon County Chamber has been getting just a \$50 yearly contribution. Appelbaum said if the County utilizes the Chamber to its full potential, the Chamber can increase tax revenue by bringing in tourism and recruiting industry.

Other area counties, by comparison, fund the Chamber anywhere from \$15,000 to \$75,000. Counties included in the comparison were DeKalb, Smith, Fentress and Clay.

The contribution of \$10,000 would be to help pay staff, fuel, a good

starting advertising budget and communications. If funded correctly the Chamber will help in the Marketing, Strategic Planning, Business Development, Tourism, Grant and Industrial coordination.

Also Thursday, the Cannon County Rescue Squad presented its budget request. They were budgeted \$3,085 in the current fiscal year which ends June 30. They have requested an increase of \$7,500, to pay off a note on a rescue squad vehicle, making their total budget request \$10,585.

The Cannon County Parks and Fair Board asked for a 5 percent raise in salary for the director and assistants. That took care of most of the \$2,000 increase the parks are requesting from

The Solid Waste Budget was reviewed. The total estimated revenue for the fiscal year ending June 30 is \$503,757, with the estimated expenditures being \$514,423.00. The estimated revenue for the 2012-2013 fiscal year is \$497,436 while the estimated expenditures are \$509,596.

The Budget line item of "Other Contracted Services" is estimated at only \$300 for next fiscal year as the estimation is already at \$4,020 for the 2011-2012 fiscal year.

The final budget reviewed Thursday was that of the Cannon County Election Office. The Election Commission had passed the budget moments before it was presented to the County Budget Committee.

In it the Assistant Administrator line item has been budgeted at \$20,000, based on a rate of 30 hours a week. It was also noted a line item of Overtime was \$1,000 but that was questioned since both Administrator of Elections and the Assistant are paid based on a

The total request of the Election Office is \$165,379, which is an increase of a little over \$3,000 from the 2011-2012 budgeted amount.

The budget committee will take this week off before beginning the second round of reviews, which is making the decisions on what to cut and what to keep in the budget requests of the county departments for FY2012-2013.

"When I asked (County Executive) Mike Gannon if I could pursue this outcome we never knew this could be possible," Appelbaum said. "It started as a really small idea. There were so many sticking points just trying to manage all the physical and legal pieces of it that we weren't sure if it was ever going to happen but we are there and we can celebrate."

Gannon said Appelbaum's resilence was paramount in the federal governement's transfer of the approximately 1,000 acres on Short Mountain - the highest point in Middle Tennessee.

"This is a wonderful thing for Cannon County and the state of Tennessee," Gannon said. "It will benefit us now and for future generations. Give all the credit to Neal Appelbaum. It was his idea and he worked on it for nearly six years. He does not give up and due to his determination this is where we are today. I am just so thankful for his efforts and everything the state of Tennessee did."

Short Mountain is a critical habitat for plant and animal species, and contains the headwaters for three Tennessee watersheds - the Caney Fork River, the Collins River and the East Fork of the Stones River. The property will be open to the public for small game hunting, hiking and wildlife viewing.

"It is only right for us to protect these lands now and for the generations to come and utilize these lands for recreation and get back in touch with the outdoors," said Ed Carter, executive director of the Tennessee Wildlife Agency. "This was truly a partnership of local, state and federal governments and spans two governors of Tennessee. It's a great day for all of us."

The land was forfeited to the United States as part of the 2007 federal criminal convictions of Morris Roller and Jeffory Carl Young for distribution of marijuana. Roller and Young are currently serving federal sentences of 200 and 224 months, respectively. The transfer was made under a law that allows the Justice Department to convey forfeited property to states for public use for recreation or conservation purposes upon request by the governor or chief executive officer of the state.

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

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
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

Senior Center, **SAVE** receive funds from UW

The United Way of Rutherford and Cannon Counties announced today its plans for investing a record \$2.367 million to the community for the 2012 -2013 fiscal year.

This amount includes \$171,746.98 designated to non-partner agencies per donor wishes, as well as an allocable pool amount of \$1,789,000 - the highest to date for the local United Way and a 10% increase from 2011.

For the second year, the local United Way also offered an opportunity for a one-time grant of up to \$5,000 to agencies that align with United Way's mission and values. the grant Through opportunity, \$36,500 was funded to ten programs.

Organizations in Cannon County that received allocations included the Cannon County Senior Citizens Center, which received \$25,000. Cannon County SAVE received a grant for \$5,000.

Each spring, partner agencies present their funding request to the appropriate allocations panel, which are aligned according toUnited Way's impact areas of education, income, health and rebuilding lives.

Many farmers having problems with fruit pests

Spotted wilt reduces fruit production and cause the development of unusable fruit. Control consists of resistant varieties and reduction or replellence of the thrips insects that vector the virus. Reflective mulches and the use of Admire insecticide provide some

Tomato spotted wilt virus is appearing in several locations across the state. As previously reported this disease should be severe this year. Symptoms vary, but some of the most

common symptoms are shown in the photos. Symptoms often begin in the upper part of the plant, distinguishing it from the common fungal blights, which begin on the lower leaves.

repellent production. Aluminized plastic mulches can be used on new planting; for home gardeners, aluminum foil will serve the purpose. Insecticides with trips activity include dimethoate, Venom, Lannate, Monitor, Rimon, and Radiant. For home gardeners, the spinosad products such as Conserve (Southern Ag) and Ferti-lome Borer, Bagworm, Tent

Caterpillar, and Leafminer Spray would be most effective. Just a few of the symptoms of tomato spotted wilt:

2. Tomato Pinworms Found in East Tennessee

The early instar caterpillars of tomato pinworms first feed on the tomato foliage as leafminers. As they mature, the caterpillars move to the fruit and chew into it making the pinhead size holes. Damage to fruit can be extensive. Pinworms do not overwinter outside in cold climates. They can overwinter in Tennessee in greenhouses growing tomatoes and then spread to the field if plants are not destroyed in the spring. They can also come in on infested transplants brought in from warm southern states such as Florida. Since it is not a pest that we see every year, look for the blotch-like leaf mines, tied or folded leaves, and holes in stems and fruit. Tomato pinworms can also attack eggplant, potato and several solanaceous


3. Caterpillars on Cole Crops

Cabbage loopers and imported cabbageworms have been found at damaging levels on cole crops such as broccoli. We started catching cabbage looper moths in pheromone traps May 11. Caterpillars were found in the field soon after. The most common caterpillar in many fields now is the imported cabbageworm. Imported cabbageworms do not have a reduced number of prolegs like cabbage loopers. Imported cabbageworms are a darker green color and have a velvety surface with a faint yellow stripe down the back. The white butterflies with black tips seen in cole crop fields now are adults of the imported cabbageworm. I have not seen any diamondback moth caterpillars yet. They are a much smaller green caterpillar and the tiny moth has a double diamond pattern on the wings.

The Japanese beetle adults are active now. They were not caught in the Nashville trap as of May 17 but there were over 80 in the trap by May 30. These pests skeletonize leaves of many types of plants and feed on flowers such as Rose of Sharon, butterfly bush, crepe myrtle and roses. They can also clip the silks of sweet corn preventing pollination of all the kernels.

5. Squash Bugs

Look for the copper color eggs being laid on the leaves of cucurbits. The adults overwinter in fence rows under weeds and plant debris. They move to the plants in the springs to mate and lay their eggs. Try to control the young nymphs that hatch from these eggs to keep population levels under control.

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


The Lions were 3-5 during the grueling stretch.

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

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

For example, within relationship, it may take at least five good acts to repair the damage of one bad act. - Praise the everyday as well as the exceptional. When people do something unusual, it is easy to remember to give praise.

What about the things that they do well all the time without recognition? Try to point out how much you appreciate the small services and tasks that someone unfailingly performs.

In her book, *The Happiness Project, Ms. Rubin reminds us that even as we give praise, we may not be getting the praise that we desire. Praise yourself! Give yourself a "Gold Star". If you do not receive outside recognition for a job well done...tell yourself that you are doing this for "Me"; this is what makes you happy, this is what you want to do. Find

ways to reward yourself; perhaps chart the things you accomplish. Express your appreciation for what others do; feel grateful for what others are doing for you. And lastly....this is a BIG one! Remember that being taken for granted is a form of praise! The more reliable that you are, the more likely you are to be taken for granted. If you always help with a specific project or in a specific way, people can overlook your efforts. Really, that is compliment! Have you thought of a way to praise someone today?

Is my drinking water safe?

Yes, our water meets all of EPA's health standards. We have conducted numerous tests for over 80 contaminants that may be in drinking water. As you'll see in the chart on the back, we only detected 11 of these contaminants. We found all of these contaminants at safe levels.

What is the source of my water?

Your water, which is surface water, comes from the East Fork of the Stones River and Dillion Spring. Our goal is to protect our water from contaminants and we are working with the State to determine the vulnerability of our water source to potential contamination. The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) has prepared a Source Water Assessment Program (SWAP) Report for the untreated water sources serving this water system. The SWAP Report assesses the susceptibility of untreated water sources to potential contamination. To ensure safe drinking water, all public water systems treat and routinely test their water. Water sources have been rated as reasonably susceptible, moderately susceptible or slightly susceptible based on geologic factors and human activities in the vicinity of the water source. The Town of Woodbury sources rated as reasonably susceptible to potential contamination.

The State and EPA require us to test and report on our water on a regular basis to ensure its safety. We have met all of these requirements. Results of unregulated contaminant analysis are available upon request. We want you to know that we pay attention to all the rules.

Other Information

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water:

- · Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- · Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

Microbiological Contaminants:

Turbidity. Turbidity has no health effects. However, turbidity can interfere with disinfection and provide a medium for microbial growth. These organisms include bacteria, viruses, and parasites that can cause symptoms such as nausea, cramps, diarrhea, and associated headaches. Fluoride. Some people who drink water containing fluoride in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Children may get mottled teeth.

Lead. Infants and children who drink water containing lead in excess of the action level could experience delays in their physical or mental development. Children could show slight deficits in attention span and learning abilities. Adults who drink this water over many years could develop kidney problems or high blood pressure.

Notice of Violation:

As required by State rules and regulations, The Town of Woodbury Water Treatment Plant has monitors on each filter that continuously monitor and record the turbidity of the water going through each filter and a monitor that checks the water of all the filters combined before it exits the plant. In December of 2011 the monitor on Filter #1 stopped working and it was in operation longer than 4 hours before it was noticed that it was not reading. The filter was shut down and replacement parts were ordered to correct this problem. During the time of operation the combined monitor was fully operation and did not indicate violations of the turbidity rule.

With this monitor on Filter #1 not recording the turbidity levels, the Town of Woodbury Water Plant was in violation of the Failure to Monitor. We reported the failure to the Cookeville Regional Field Office and have made the necessary correction in training and spare parts are on hand for immediate repairs.


Dear Ken: Who played Redd Foxx's sister-in-law on "Sanford and Son" and what else did she appear in?




