Reuhland left huge impact

Dr. Leon Reuhland's "huge foot print" left in life is visible from the mountains of East Tennessee to the low-lying marsh lands of West Tennessee.

His most personal impact, however, came in his beloved Cannon County and Middle Tennessee home community with residences in Murfreesboro and Woodbury.

The "community man among men," died at age 77, the night of Oct. 4, at his residence, following a long battle with cancer-related illness.

"His impact as a 40-year family

physician in Woodbury cannot be measured," described Woodbury Mayor Harold Patrick. "He was a community man among men, in the true Southern meaning of gentleman. He served more than 25 years, for example, as an unsalaried coroner for our home community...working with Woodbury Police and regional sheriff's departments as well."

His influence reached beyond Short Mountain to the east and the Stones River to the west.

"What Dr. Reuhland did in service to his community is immeasurable," verified former Rutherford County Sheriff Truman Jones, of Murfreesboro. "His 'community' was the entire Volunteer State. TBI, FBI...all law agencies in the state respected the professionalism of this man who volunteered his time as a coroner."

In his last years of "public service," Dr. Reuhland was also the "medical officer" at Tennessee Aviation Days Air Shows held at historic Smyrna Airport.

Retired Cannon Courier newspaper publisher Andy Bryson met Dr. Reuhland in 1970, when the physician first "hung his shingle" in the basement of Woodbury's old Good Samaritan Hospital.

"He was my late mother's

personal physician, and my family's doctor for more than 40 years," Bryson shared. "As a doctor alone, there's no way to estimate the lives he touched in a positive way.

"There's no aspect of community life that Leon Reuhland did not touch, whether it was as a private physician or an unsalaried 'Cannon County Coroner' in times of community tragedy," Bryson included. "Dr. Reuhland would come out anytime night or day, for accident scenes, shootings, anything that he could do to serve his beloved

City tightens up road block ordinance

After much thought and deliberation a committee recommended hanges to the Town of Woodbury's Road Block Ordinance during the Mayor and Board of Aldermen meeting Tuesday (Oct. 2) at City Hall.

There are not many changes where road blocks are concerned; however, interested organizations must go through an application process with the Town of Woodbury. Additionally, there will only be two roadblocks granted per month and they cannot be held on consecutive weekends.

Additionally, an organization can only conduct one road block per year and those organizations must request their date within the current calendar year, according to City Attorney Dale Peterson.

Peterson said the Woodbury Fire Department and the Woodbury Lions Club will have their annual dates automatically renewed as those two entities have a longstanding weekend of fundraising for the MDA Jerry Lewis Telethon during Labor Day Weekend (Fire Department) and the White Cane (Lions Club).

The roadblocks are limited to the intersections of Main and Tatum and Main and College Streets. Only three people can take up money at each intersection at one time. All persons working in the streets must wear reflective safety vests and be at least 18 years of age or older. The organization must

Corn maze turns grains to grins

You know fall has arrived when folks pay good money to get lost in a cornfield.

But what most families with young 'uns find is a barnyard full of fun to go around.

Steve and Barbara Pearcy's Shuck-n-Shack Corn Maze in Lascassas is one of several corn mazes harvesting tourists and homefolks alike this season in Rutherford County. What marks their attraction as a-mazing is seven acres of corn with two mazes based on the theme of Transformers Bumblebee, and the fact that their swaths through the cornfield were professionally designed.

"Steve told me several years ago, 'You know, I think we can do a corn maze and do it better than anybody else," says Barbara, his wife of 27 years and Shuck-N-Shack hostess. "I said, 'OK, let's give it a go.""

"I already had an interest in agritourism and we

were headed that way already. We were in the strawberry business, so this will all blend in together," said Steve, 54, who has operated P&P Strawberry Farm for the past 14 years while he also runs Pearcy's General Merchandise in the heart of Lascassas.

As for their green, green maze of home, this cornfield holds two mazes: one twists and turns for two miles and the shorter one meanders seventenths of a mile.

"We contacted a professional company, MazePlay (the business is located in Firth, Idaho), and they came in and cut a pattern in our corn patch," said Barbara, who grew up in Woodbury, the daughter of Bobby Joe and Phyllis Young. "You can choose from 100 or more patterns. If you have an idea, they will do that, too.

"First, you put in a late corn crop. Later,

Division of Forestry urges caution after summer drought

Burning permits for outdoor burning of woody debris will be required again starting on October 15th as Tennessee's fall wildfire season begins in earnest. The permit season will not end until May 16th, 2013. This wildfire season follows a record-breaking drought across the state during which crops withered in the fields and vegetation dried to tinderbox conditions causing some counties to request and initiate outdoor burning restrictions in a cooperative effort with the Tennessee Department of Agriculture.

"Although we've had some really good rains in recent weeks, we still want to keep in mind that it only takes a short period of time without rainfall, particularly in the fall, when we begin having problems with wildfires once again," said Jim Dale, Assistant District Forester with the Division of "This past Forestry. summer, solely because of the drought conditions we experienced, we saw an increase in the number of wildfires caused by such things as equipment use, smoking, lightning,

campfires, fireworks and other causes which are not traditionally as high in number as arson-caused and careless debris burning-caused wildfires," he said. "36% of all the wildfires which have occurred this year have been as a result of these other causes, while 37% and 27% have been attributed to careless debris burning and arson respectively." Through September 27th, some 787 wildland fires had burned some 6,634 acres across the state according to the Division of Forestry's weekly fire report.

The permits issued by the Tennessee Department of Agriculture, Division of Forestry are for the sole purpose of burning untreated wood waste or woody vegetation grown on-site such as branches, leaves and brush. Permits for burning areas larger than 8 feet X 8 feet must be secured by telephone while permits for debris piles 8 feet X 8 feet and smaller can be secured either online at www.burnsafetn.org or by telephone. All permits are completely free of charge. Telephone permits may be secured from 8 A.M. until 4:30 P.M. Monday through

Friday. No household garbage, treated wood waste, tires, plastics, newspapers, cardboard or other such materials may be burned as it is illegal to do so in the state. Violation of the burning permit statute is a Class C misdemeanor punishable by up to 30 days in jail and/or a \$50.00 fine plus court costs. The burning permit program administered by the Tennessee Department of Agriculture does not supercede any existing burning programs permit administered by cities or communities which have their own outdoor burning statutes.



Local newspapers connect us with our communities

We can get our national news on cable television, catch the weather on local broadcast stations, listen to talk radio on the AM or FM dial and follow our favorite blogs on the Internet, but where do we turn for local information that directly impacts our daily lives? More often than not it is community newspapers.

Technology has transformed how we gather information in the 21st Century. Newscycles run 24/7, tablets and laptops are becoming smaller and smart phones keep getting smarter.

As a result most traditional large newspapers are struggling to stay alive they are more and more frequently printing only two to three times a w personnel and content are shrinking like never before, and more information is shifted to online editions. Yet local community newspapers are thriving because they have persistently weathered the storm year in and year out to remain a fixture in our everyday lives. As our societies become more complex and diverse with growing numbers of ways to obtain information, the role of local newspapers in informing our communities becomes even more significant. We count on them to regularly check in with the courts and police stations. They print announcements on births, deaths, engagements, marriages, anniversaries, church news, job openings, school information and service club endeavors. They publish notices of local municipal meetings. They print tax increases, millage initiatives, notices of changes in

laws and property rezoning - all issues that most directly affect our pocketbooks by determining how our hard-earned tax dollars are spent at the local level and how are local officials are representing us.

They help run the local economic engine and provide a marketplace for the community. They offer local small businesses with an effective and affordable means of connecting with local consumers. They print sales at the supermarket, coupons for discounts at local stores, real estate listings, and classifieds for everything from a used car to a neighbor's garage sale.

It's also personal. Communities feel a sense of ownership in their local newspaper, and the people that report the news are often our friends and neighbors down the street.







MazePlay comes out with a tractor with a GPS and a computer system. The operator programs the maze, and he drives the outer perimeter of the field before he starts. The GPS system calculates and literally guides the tractor, with a 4-foot tiller attached, through the fields which makes the path. It takes about three hours to cut."

Another facet of this maze is that visitors are given a cardboard souvenir map. Each of the two mazes has six checkpoints with a hole punch at each site. Thus, you can punch into your map to prove you made it to each checkpoint. Children that register at each checkpoint receive a treat or novelty toy for

negotiating their way around the labyrinthe. Barbara said it normally takes her and Steve about an hour to hit all the checkpoints in the larger maze the first time they tackle it.

Pearcys' The son Jonathan, 25, who works at Mid-South Bus in Murfreesboro, also helps at the site.

"He always puts our checkpoints up every year, and he helps me run the hay rides and the entry admission," said his mother.

pumpkin patch (prices range \$1-\$5 and most were grown by the Pearcys) and a corn cannon (two shots for a \$1).

"A big hit is our corn grain bin that children can get in and cover themselves up with corn," said Barbara. Already field trips are planned by school groups coming from elementary schools in Lascassas, Smyrna and Rockvale. Shuck-N-Shack gives back

a dollar to local parentteacher organizations in the county for each customer (child or adult) who comes with a school group.

For Barbara, the highlight of their cornfield in peaceful Lascassas is seeing these children come through. They love it. They want to stay forever."

And for a last plus, "We harvest the corn after this is over with.'

The previous month of September minutes were approved as presented without corrections or change.


The financial report was presented in written form, reviewed and approved without correction. The balance of funds on deposit as of Sept. 30 was \$38,840.29.





Dr. Reuhland "befriended" multiple sheriffs in his home county, starting with two-term Sheriff Robert Bogle in the 1970s to present-day Sheriff Darrell Young.

Dr. Reuhland would often help "patrol" the back roads of Cannon and surrounding counties when there were staff shortages.

"I've often rode with Dr. Reuhland, when there was only one deputy on duty to serve our entire community," added Bryson.

Former Cannon Sheriff Bob Stoetzel described Dr. Reuhland's support of area law enforcement personnel.

"We became such good friends, Doc served as 'best man' at Teresa (Scott) and my (1982) wedding," Stoetzel noted. "When I first got stationed in Cannon County as a state trooper, Col. Bill Jones (former Police Commissioner of Murfreesboro) told me the one person I had to meet was Doc Reuhland.

"Since that initial meeting, I was privileged to have a lot of interaction with Doc," Stoetzel added. "He was as much a 'law man' as he was a physician. He was instrumental in getting a lot of programs started for Woodbury Police and the Sheriff's Department..."

He assisted in multiple crime investigations from the 1970s until his health-related "retirement" in 2011.

"He was instrumental in helping solve one of Cannon County's worst murder cases, the Jeff Bell murder cases, back in 2002," retired newspaper publisher Bryson shared. "When Bell's partial remains were found in a well, Dr. Reuhland personally transported the body parts to Nashville, not wanting any forensic evidence destroyed."

The doctor/investigator's work in the Bell case helped send three murder suspects to prison with life terms.

Bryson, who worked at the Cannon Courier since age 10 until his retirement in 2009, has witnessed some of the "most impactful" citizens in the region's history.

"Along with Dr. J.F. Adams, who came off Short Mountain to establish Good Samaritan Hospital last century, the predecessor hospital to Stones River Hospital, Dr. Reuhland ranks right up there in terms of modern-day impact," Bryson noted. "Dr. Reuhland ranks among the top four or five private citizens in terms of positive community service in during the past two centuries."

Friends and longtime government/civic leaders describe him as a "family man," a "healing man," a longtime "public (coroner) servant," and a principle "founder" of the present-day Stones River Hospital.

Rutherford County businessman/financier Greg Tucker was instrumental in assisting Dr. Reuhland in "saving the doors of Stones River Hospital from being closed" in the mid-1990s.

In 1995, community rumors were rampant Stones River would be closed by the Nashvillebased Hospital Corporation of America.

"I first met Dr. Reuhland and other members of a group interested in purchasing the hospital from HCA in Nashville," Tucker detailed. "From the first meeting, it was obvious that Dr. Reuhland was the one in the group with his feet solidly on the ground, and his respect throughout Middle Tennessee was far reaching, all the way to Nashville and beyond.

"After our initial meetings, I agreed with Dr. Reuhland if he'd lend his very influential good public servant name to head the project, I'd put together the business plan to purchase the hospital," Tucker accounted.

The community responded positively to new local hospital management team.

"With his ideas, and the resulting community support, we improved the hospital to the point, we paid off the borrowed indebtedness within two years after the purchase in 1998...," financier Tucker added.

The doctor helped bring Stones River Hospital into the 21st Century.

"During the acquisition phase of the hospital, Dr. Reuhland insisted on construction of a modern-day helicopter pad for use after they'd stabilize the patients until they could be transported to hospitals in Nashville," Tucker described. "Before the new helicopter pad, we'd have to move cars on the hospital parking lot in order for the air ambulances to land and take off with critically-ill patients..."

Dr. Reuhland was "a community servant," accounted Cannon County Executive Mike Gannon.

"I served as a county commissioner for 17 years before elected 10 years ago as county executive," Gannon noted. "I had no idea the impact this man had on life here, until I became county executive...

"As Cannon Coroner for nearly 30 years, until ill health forced his retirement in 2011, he never asked for one cent in payment for services rendered," added Gannon. "He never billed the county for all the seminars he attended down through the decades...a true unselfish public servant who will never be replaced in our community's life. He literally saved the county thousands of dollars with his service as an unsalaried coroner." "If there was a fire-burnout family, Leon was there," Gannon shared. "If there was a murder at midnight, Dr. Reuhland was there. If a family was hit by catastrophic illness, Dr. Reuhland was there."

As a physician for multiple decades, the doctor touched

thousands of families and loved ones not only in Cannon County, but throughout Middle Tennessee and the Upper Cumberland regions.

Woodbury Mayor Patrick recalls the doctor's earliest "practicing days" in Woodbury, dating back more than 40 years.

"His first practice was in the basement of the old Good Samaritan Hospital," the mayor recalled. "No matter the time, day or night, Dr. Reuhland has been there for our community, especially as the longtime volunteer unsalaried Cannon County Coroner..."

"I can think of no one man more impactful on present-day community life than Dr. Leon Reuhland, my friend and neighbor who leaves a void in our hearts, a hole in our community life that will never be filled."

Truman Jones describes Dr. Reuhland's "statewide impact" on law enforcement.

"This man is known throughout Tennessee law enforcement's community, for his tireless, dedicated support of all things lawful," added Jones, who served more than 25 years as Rutherford County's top law enforcement officer. "When helping construct the new jail in Cannon County in the early 1990s, he counseled many hours with us at the new Rutherford County jail as well as the jail in Coffee County..."

also have a sign clearly marked indicating who the group represents and what the money will be used for, according to Peterson.

One option is the General Fund could sell the existing Fire Hall Building to the Water Department and the Water Department can use the building if the Fire Department find can another place to go. Money from the sale could be used to help build a new fire hall. Dennis Bromley who runs an auto repair shop across the street from the current fire hall said that he would work with the City to find somewhere to put the fire truck during the winter months. Susan Trail who has a car lot also said he would work with the City as well. The car lot will be closing in a couple of

weeks so there is the possibility of that building being used to house the new truck.

James C. Hailey Engineering Co. representative Anthony Pelham brought а resolution before the Aldermen. The County has been working on a grant application through ECD a Community Dev-elopment Block Grant. They have been looking into several roads to extend water line additions in various rural positions in Cannon County. A cooperative agreement needs be worked out.

The project is a Cannon County Grant project for the Town of Woodbury Water Department to construct water line additions on Finnie Simmons Road, Lake Anne Road and Basham Ridge.

Approximately 18-to-20 connections are involved. It is a Cannon County grant but the matching funds would be put up by resolution by the Town Of Woodbury. Bids were open on Sept. 20th. The low bidder was W and Construction on the amount of \$178,176. No additional funds will be required. Expectations are that the final costs will be actually under the budget. The resolution was drawn to authorize the Mayor to coordinate and execute any documents in support of the County and covers all the awarding of the contract.


Appelbaum will check with Carolyn Motley of the

Court Action King ordered to pay county \$27,520 in restitution fees




Angela King was placed on state probation for 10 years and ordered to pay \$27,520 in restitution fees by Circuit Court Judge David Bragg Thursday

Bragg ordered Angela King placed on state probation for 5 years and ordered to pay restitution to Cannon County in the amount of \$26,170 for theft over \$10,000.

King, former director of the Cannon County REACH program, was arrested following an investigation by the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation in connection with a Tennessee Comptroller's Office audit of the office.

In another case King was placed on state probation for 5 years and ordered to pay restitution in the amount of \$1,350 for theft over \$1,000. These charges were related to passing a counterfeit check.





A tribute to Coach Mayfield

Friends, ex-students recall his leadership on and off the field

Editor's Note: Part of this article was accidentally omitted from the Oct. 3 edition of the Courier. This story is an expanded version of the original.

Cannon County lost a local sports legend when Coach Mike Mayfield died from complications following an automobile accident Tuesday (Sept. 25) in the Vanderbilt Hospital trauma unit.

Funeral services for Mayfield, 69, were conducted Sept. 28 at Woodbury First Baptist Church, and graveside services were held Sept. 29 at Mt. Tabor Cemetery in his hometown of Blountsville, Ala.

Mayfield was involved in a single-vehicle accident on East Main Street in front of Central Magnet School in Murfreesboro, Sept. 14. He had been hospitalized since.

Those who knew and worked with Mayfield during a long tenure as teacher, football coach and assistant principal at Cannon County High School say he left a lasting impression on all he encountered. The retired educator was a current member of the Cannon County School Board.

"I have known Coach Mayfield since he came to Cannon County in 1970," said Director of Schools Barbara Parker. "He was one of my high school history teachers, and for several years we taught across the hall from each other. In addition, we attended the same church. Coach Mayfield was a hard-nosed football coach who garnered the respect of his players. He had a humorous side and loved to spin every comment into a joke, but he had a serious side as well.


"He cared deeply for his family, his friends, his former football players, the students and teachers in the Cannon County School System, and of course Alabama football."

Parker said Mayfield told her he ran for a spot on the Board of Education to help make the system better.

"Many times (Mayfield) told me he ran for School Board member because he 'wanted to help people and make school better for everyone," Parker said. "He was the type of person who told you exactly what he thought at the moment, even if there were dire consequences, but he would also end our conversations with, 'I'll be praying for you.' Knowing Coach and his great faith in God, I knew these weren't idle words. He will be missed.'

Football players were not the only students Coach Mayfield cared about during his tenure. Cannon County High School Principal Tim Knox said Mayfield went out of his way to help all students.

"I remember when Coach Mayfield and I supervised the cafeteria together that he handed out probably \$1,000 over a several-year period to kids who needed a dollar or even more," Knox said. "He never refused a kid who needed money, food, or any necessity. I believe that Coach truly loved children."

People believe Mayfield is reason why Cannon County has football today. Mayfield would say it was the players, particularly a special seven he called the 'Magnificent Seven.'

By the end of spring drills in the 1973 Cannon County was down to seven players. Bruce Daniel, a current school board member and former player for Mayfield, said the 'Magnificent Seven' made Mayfield most proud.

"We went to practice and there were only seven players left," Daniel recalls. "Seven is all we had left, period.

Not seven good players and some others, but seven bodies.

Coach Mayfield questioned whether we wanted to continue the football program at Cannon County or not. There was a big debate and we told them we wanted to play.

We got out and scurried and got people to come out for football. Coach Mayfield would not let us quit. He said the reason Cannon County has football today was those because even wouldn't quit then and from there we built."

Mayfield would go on to say those "Magnificent Seven" forged the future of Cannon County football. They would not quit and, as a result, neither would he.

Mayfield's players say he motivated them to not only give everything they had on the football field, but in all areas of their lives.

"He wanted the best for us and he expected us to give our best in everything we did," former player Charles Alexander said. "He loved his players and we loved him.

Coach cared about us as much after we finished playing for him as he did while we were in school playing for him."

Civil War gunsmith among Hollow Spring residents

A Civil War-era gunsmith was only one of the businesses that once shared a home in Hollow Springs community, said historian Audrey Rogers Cawthorn. In "A Return to Hollow Springs," Cawthorn shared historic research and childhood memories of growing up in that rural community with members of the Cannon County Historical Society.

The 13th Civil District community of Hollow Springs has no historic indicators for the country stores, saw mill, churches and schools that were once landmarks. The Hollow Springs name was established around 1873 with the first school building. In 1875, the first post master J.W. St. John was appointed by the U.S. Government. A few of the early families settling in the were Parker, area Cawthorn, Lewis, Gilley and Sissom.

Previously Hollow Springs was a settlement portion of the head waters of Brawley's Creek. Native Jerry Sissom suggested the name may have evolved from a "holler" in the area with 11 springs; seven of which still remain active.

James L. Cawthorn was a noted businessman of the early Hollow Springs community. In 1838, he obtained a land grant for 1,000 acres of land now known as acreage behind the Gilley Hill Church. Cawthorn was born Jan. 12, 1812, and later married Sara Smith. Together they raised six children. By the 1850 U.S. Census, James L. Cawthorn reported owning a gun factory with five employees and an inventory of 80 guns valued at \$1,700. Ten years later, U.S. Census records indicated Iames L. Cawthorn was established in the manufacture of guns for the Civil War.

According to research by Ronnie Cawthorn of Tullahoma, the Cawthorn manufacturing rifle business was located in the headwaters of Brawley's Fork at Hollow Springs. The shop was on the Mill Bluff wagon road leading to and Lumley Stand Lebanon. Traces of the old road can still be found just south of the Dickens Hill or Gillev Hill Road. Cawthorn along with sons, William "Bill" and Pleasant, ran the gun shop locally known as Boring Works. When the Civil War broke out, Cawthorn and his boys were confronted joining with the Confederacy or aiding the War effort in gun production. Reluctantly, Cawthorn agreed to sell the weapons to Confederacy but his sons joined the Union Army. However, James the youngest was killed before he reached Murfreesboro to enlist. Three styles of rifles were manufactured at Hollow Springs: the "Mississippi, Tennessee and the Harper Ferry". Several surviving Confederate records show a number of gunsmiths and makers in the Nashville area. James L. Cawthorn of Cannon County is one of those identified making small deliveries of fire arms to the Confederacy. 1862 receipt February shows Cawthorn sold Confederate forces 31 Mississippi Rifles costing \$20 each. One half of the \$620 purchase price was paid by Jas. J. Turner and the balance covered by check on the Bank of Tennessee. However, after the Civil War, Confederate dollars were worthless. In the early 1870's, Cawthorn filed an unsuccessful lawsuit with the U.S. War Department in an attempt to regain funds for the sale of rifles to the Confederate States. He also petitioned payment for 43 fat hogs slaughtered by Union soldiers as verified by court testimony on Nov. 25, 1873. Jane Brown, mother of Frances "Fannie" Parker, testified that in June of 1863, Union Forces were camped out near the Cawthorn home. Soldiers slaughtered Cawthorn's hogs and took the meat to their camp. Only five hogs were left but the officer in charge, General Palmer, said Cawthorn would have to wait until after the war for compensation.

"Confederate Rifles and Muskets" by John M. Murphy and Howard Michael, published in 1999, quoted James Cawthorn having produced rifles for the Confederacy. One of the guns photographed is felt to be a "Mississippi Rifle" manufactured in small quantities by James L. Cawthorn & Company. The gun is on display at the Historical Greensboro Museum in North Carolina.

Another early businessman of Hollow Springs was Lawton Lewis. He was orphaned in 1910 by his parents James and Matilda Lemons Lewis who most likely died from typhoid fever. Lewis was raised by another Hollow Springs family, Silas and Fannie Brown Parker. Later the Parker's own son Billy and his wife Bertha, died from the deadly American influenza epidemic of 1918. Their two girls, Virgie Lee, age 8, and Willie Pearl, age 4, were taken in by Fannie Parker. Her son Clay Parker and his wife Mattie shared the home and most likely took a major role in parenting the girls in addition to their own large family.

Sissom is another original Hollow Springs sir name. Joseph Dillard (J.D) Sissom, was born in Cannon County in 1867. He married Sarah M. West and they raised 12 children. J.D. Sissom operated a dry goods store for 23 years at Hollow Springs and owned a number of farms. According to his December 1935 obituary, he was kind and well liked by all who knew him.

A couple churches in the area have early identified histories. The Hopewell Church in Bradyville was constituted in April 1833 with signatures of Jesse H. Gilley Jr., his wife, and their children. The Hopewell church split in 1869 when the Gilley family and others started a new church on a neighboring hillside. This church was named the Gilley Hill Methodist Church. Jesse H. Gilley Jr. (1814-1883) and his nephew Simeon H. Gilley (1844-1922) were the first preachers at Gilley Hill. It is felt descendents of Zachariah and Ivy Bush owned the land of the original church site. In more recent history, the Hollow Springs Community Church was established January 2, 2005. Several families of different faiths banded together with former Cannon County native and Methodist preacher, Joe H. Sissom. They initially met in the old Nazarene church on land owned by a cousin of preacher Sissom. The new congregation purchased an acre of land, tore down the old Nazarene church and built the new Hollow Springs Community Church. "Brother Joe" as he is referred to by approximately 100 members, celebrated his 77th birthday on Sept. 28. He said that he will never retire from the Lord but will someday retire from preaching. He loves the Hollow Springs Church, "Where everybody is somebody and Jesus is Lord." In addition to the churches, the Hollow Springs School was an important community resource. The first Hollow Springs School was a one room school built in 1873.

The second school with Pod Parker as principal was established in 1934. The first school bus driver was George Parker who began in 1931 to transport children in a covered wagon.

The Hollow Springs School building was destroyed by fire in 1944. A block building was constructed the same year.

First teachers in this third school building were Homer Parker, Ozell Tucker, and Earlene Williams.

When Audrey Cawthorn began first grade at Hollow Springs in 1946, Mr. Homer Parker was principal, 7th and 8th grade teacher and coach.

During his 10 year tenure, Mr. Parker coached winning boys' and girls' basketball teams as well as being responsible for daily operation of the school.

Teachers were Earlene Williams, Mildred Parker and Bessie Miller for primer through third grade. Fourth, fifth, and sixth grades were taught by Snow Curlee, and Howard Sissom.

As teacher, Mr. Parker started every school day with a Bible lesson. To teach, he placed children in a semi-circle and never lost his temper to maintain order. Before recess, homework had to be completed and no bullying was allowed.

As an adult, Joe Frank Tucker, claimed only "one time" would a Hollow Springs kid attempt to bully. "The paddling by Mr. Parker wasn't bad", he recalled. "But, nobody wanted to repeat waiting for classmates to gather around the closed door to count the licks out loud".

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

Apply now for 2013-2014 scholarships at Tennessee Tech

study programs and non-TTU funded scholarships, such as the Hope Scholarship, is available at www.tntech.edu/financiala id/home.

Prospective students, including incoming freshmen and transfer students, do not have to be admitted to TTU to apply for scholarships for 2013-2014. They can apply for admission to TTU and immediately apply for scholarships. Current TTU students are encouraged to apply for scholarships each year, as new or different opportunities may become available.

The scholarshipapplication must be completed and submitted online by 11:59 p.m. December 15, 2012.

The science of supermarket design



Have you ever thought about how a supermarket is designed? It isn't just a lot of groceries stacked neatly on shelves. A lot of work and research goes into deciding where all those groceries go. The first thing you see as you walk through the door is an inviting entrance with that is very eye catching and colorful. You will see rows of brightly colored fruits and vegetables.

Or, you might find bunches of beautiful flowers and plants. After the entrance the store is designed to make you stay longer and purchase more than you intend by doing the following:

* Cans of soup are not placed in alphabetical order. This makes you look on all of the shelves to find chicken noodle soup, for example. This means you might find other cans of soup that look good to you and you will buy more.

* The smell of bread and other baked goods will make you want to buy these foods. Supermarkets sell more baked goods when customers smell them baking. Did you know that for every minute you shop beyond the average 35-40 minutes, you probably spend more than you intend. The trick is to get what you planned to buy then go. They know who you are too. A lot of time and money have been spent trying to find out about vou.

Supermarkets believe you probably are female, shop on average 2.2 times a week, plan only a third of your purchases, do not shop with a list, make unplanned purchases, and spend 35-40 minutes in the store. 

THE CAMPAIGN FREE ZONE WILL BE ENFORCED AT THE EARLY VOTING AND ELECTION DAY POLLING LOCATIONS. The campaign free zone ends generally **100 ft**. from the entrance of the building in which the election is being held. Under Burson V. Freeman, the election commission may prohibit campaign signs and the electioneering on public sidewalks and streets if those areas fall within 100ft. boundary line. No campaign posters, signs or other campaign materials may be displayed. (Hats/shirts) No person may distribute materials, or solicit votes for or against any person or political party or position on a question. No person may solicit or collect for any cause.

What activity is permitted in the campaign free zone? An individual may bring a sample ballot or other campaign literature inside the boundary as long as the voter does not display the campaign literature to other voters. If the parking place of the polling place lies within the boundary, then a vehicle having campaign literature displayed on it may be parked within the boundary, only for as long as necessary for the occupant of the vehicle to vote.

VOTING BY MAIL:

If you are unable to appear at your polling place on Election Day or during Early Voting, you may request a By-Mail Ballot for the following reasons:

- 1. If you will be out of the county during all voting periods.
- 2. If you are a student (or the spouse of a student) enrolled in a college or University located in Tennessee;
- 3. If you are hospitalized, sick or physically disabled;
- 4. If you are a candidate for office in the election or an election official;
- 5. If you are the caretaker of a hospitalized, ill or disabled person;
- 6. If you are serving on a state or federal jury;
- 7. If you are observing a religious holiday;
- 8. If you are over 60 years of age or older;
