A 22-year-old Cannon County man has been charged with the arson of Ivy Bluff Methodist Church.

Ezra Marino was arrested Wednesday, Oct. 10 following an investigation by Investigator Anthony Young of the Cannon County Sheriff's Department and an agent from Tennessee State Bomb and Arson, said Sheriff Darrell Young.

Education officials are seeking to make Tennessee the fastestimproving state in the country in terms of the new education reform.

While the state and upper Cumberland region wants to be the fastest-improving in regard to "Race To The Top," Cannon County's educational system will strive to become the fastestimproving county in Tennessee, according to Director of Schools Barbara Parker.

"We want to be the fastestimproving county in the state (regarding Race To The Top)," Parker told board members during the regular monthly meeting of the Cannon County

Board of Education at Woodbury Grammar School Thursday (Oct.

"We know it takes a lot of hard work and teaching is hard but we do accept the challenge," Parker said. "We know what the challenges are and we are going to meet them head on."

Three years ago, Tennessee's education system struggled with poor student outcomes and inadequate standards that did not properly prepare students for the demands of college or work after high school. Today, Tennessee is in position to achieve proficiency, and is committed to the leading the nation in developing education leaders.

Auto salvage king

Jerry Pelham's been dealing car parts over half a century

There may be no man in Tennessee who has bought more wrecked or junked vehicles than Woodbury's

Ask the Auto Salvage King of the Midsouth how many cars and trucks he has purchased over the past half century and he cannot hazard a guess.

"I have no idea. A lot of 'em," says the laidback fellow, 68, who opened Pelham's Auto Salvage in 1958 when he was a lad of 14.

It would not be a fantastic notion to reckon the grand total of his vehicles might stretch bumper to

bumper from Woodbury to Detroit and back again. Pelham's motor madness and business brilliance began with a junker '49 Ford that he bought way back when for \$40.

"It was rusted out and didn't run too good," said the salvage man of his modest beginnings, who these days drives a 2005 Chevy pick-up. "I bought it wrecked and fixed it. I don't buy no new ones."

Pelham has seen a sea of change in the salvage and automotive industry over the past seven decades.

"Used to be everybody worked on their cars. You'd change engines in your driveway or go see a shade See AUTO, page 9

Green grows the garden

How do you feed a jail full of inmates without breaking the

county's budget? To Sheriff Darrell Young one

partial answer is "grow a garden." "When you feed so many

inmates you have to find some way of cutting costs," Young said. And who does the work?

The inmates supervised by jail staff at the overcrowded facility, which was built 20 years ago to hold 43 prisoners. Now it usually averages 60 inmates. The female side of the jail is particularly

crowded with one cell that was designed to hold only eight people.

On Tuesday (Oct. 9), a baker's dozen of female inmates were out of their cell and busy harvesting turnip greens.

The female inmates were picking and cleaning the greens while the guys slowly cooked them in a black, iron kettle over an open fire. Once cooked, the greens were packaged for one of the sheriff's department's freezers, which are loaded with a season's fill summer vegetables.

Fixing greens for the jail's population takes time with a bushel basket of the bright green, fresh leaves cooking down to just part of a serving.

A morning's work resulted in only two gallon freezer bags of turnip greens. It's a slow process, laughed chief cook Martha Francis. "It takes a lot to feed this

"We are fortunate to have Miss Martha here cooking for us. This jail feeds the best food," said one female inmate.

Educators and school students from Cannon, Rutherford, Wilson and Davidson counties have an (free) opportunity to experience 'living history' of Native American Indians at Long Hunter State Park on Oct. 19, 20 and 21...the dates of the Native American Indian Association's 31st annual Fall Festival and 2012 Pow

School administrators who want to arrange for their students to attend can call 232-9179.

"Students and classes are admitted free on Friday, Oct. 19, starting at 9 a.m., at Long Hunter Park, 2910 Hobson Pike, between I-24 and I-40," confirmed **Choctaw Tribal Princess** Sally Wells of Smyrna. "It's a great opportunity for youth and adults alike, to learn about the history of our Indian ancestors...

"We appreciate the Pow Wow and opportunity for our students to learn firsthand a 'living history' of our Native American neighbors," confirmed La Vergne-based Lake Side School teacher Teresa Barnett, of Smyrna. "Our students talk about this event year-round, their interest is so keen about the demonstrations of Indian heritage and

Long Hunter Chief Park Ranger Thurman Mullins praised the Nashvillebased NAIA groups' effort.

'We're pleased to host such a great historical event, for the NAIA Pow Wow has been named among America's 'top 16' living history festivals depicting our Native American's traditions and heritage," Mullins added. "This is no small pageant, as evidenced by the

thousands of guests who fill the park grounds each year for the NAIA's Fall Festival."

More than 12,000 persons showed up in paid attendance at last year's Pow Wow. Admission for adults is \$6, \$3 for 6-12 age children Five and under children are admitted free. "We make it as

affordable as possible, in order to encourage entire families make their way to beautiful Long Hunter State Park where the rangers make us feel welcome and safe each year," Wells welcomed. "It's an awesome opportunity for educators and parents to encourage children in learning more about our nation's history and heritage."

Why bring children to the Indian festival that annually features more than 40 tribes from throughout the U.S. and Canada?

"We have representatives from Choctaw, Cherokee and Lumbee tribes, just to name a few," Wells accounted. Writer offers thanks to those who saved trees

This letter is a follow up on my trees and to thank the people who helped me. After I was told by MTEMC engineers that my trees were to be cut down, I had no other options. I felt that my options had run out. I then did the following.





There's still time for fall planting

Fall is for planting, so say Andy Pulte and Susan Hamilton with the University of Tennessee Department of Plant Sciences and the UT Gardens. The well-known gardening experts say enthusiasts should take advantage of the season's great weather to plan and plant for next year's

"There is a lot of nice weather left to get out and garden. However, October is typically the driest month in Tennessee, so be sure to keep your garden watered," cautions Pulte.

Here are some additional tips from the UT experts for fall garden maintenance:

*Plant shrubs and trees now. Autumn's temperate weather leads to good root establishment before freezing temperatures cause plants to go dormant. This makes planting in the fall even easier than in the spring. You'll find a good supply of trees and shrubs at local suppliers and October is just the beginning of the ideal season to install such plants in your garden. If you do plant in October, definitely water well until rainfall picks up in November and December.

*Maintain those perennials, annuals and bulbs. One last effort at weeding will help to improve the appearance of your garden throughout the winter. Any weeds you can eliminate from the garden this fall, will possibly prevent thousands of weed seeds from sprouting in the garden next spring! Additionally, garden centers and nurseries are well stocked with spring-flowering bulbs and late October and early November is the ideal time to get them planted.

*Collect and save seeds of wildflowers. You can sow these right now allowing the seeds to overwinter in your garden or wait and sow early them next spring.

*Plant winter annuals in your garden now. Great winter garden plants include pansies, violas, snapdragons and dianthus. They can be planted in mass for a major splash of color in your landscape or use them in containers to add color in different strategic spots. Winter hardy herbs like parsley, thyme, and rosemary make great container companions with winter annuals. Also, consider inter-planting your winter annuals with bulbs of daffodils, tulips and hyacinths. Planting bulbs



between hardy annuals will bring a surprise burst of color in the spring. And when the fading bulb's foliage begins to wither, the winter annuals are so colorful that one barely notices the bulbs' yellowing foliage

*Don't forget your lawn. Fall is an ideal time to renew tall fescue (cool-season) lawns that have suffered during hot, dry summer months. Fertilizing with nitrogencontaining fertilizers will speed growth, thicken the lawn and improve its color. Seeding and mulching bare areas will provide erosion control and reduce the potential for weed problems. If you have a warm-season lawn it's not too late to prepare your Bermudagrass or Zoysia lawn for winter. By increasing the cutting height now, you can help buffer these lawn grasses from extreme low temperatures in

*Decorate your house. From now through Thanksgiving focus on decorating with natural elements. The key is making displays that use the traditional icons of fall (hay bales, scarecrows and corn-stalks) as supporting cast for the lead players (pumpkins, gourds, Indian corn, garden or pot mums, fall pansies, asters, ornamental kale and other blooming plants). Hay bales are especially useful "benches" for building versatile displays, while corn stalks add height and definition. Such displays can add a festive touch to a front porch or the landscape in strategic places like a light post or the entrance to a driveway or walk.

The first frosty night of the season

A coonhound on a trail on a cold frosty night always reminds me of my father who was an avid coon hunter. Recently, while through going the homeplace well house, I found hanging on a nail, where my father had left it from his last hunt, his Rayovac eight-cell flashlight with a leather strap attached to it. I always marveled at how he could tell the difference of the bark of each individual dog on a trail with as many as five or six dogs in on the hunt. I, for one, never developed that ability and often found it hard to stay up late, but he could follow his dogs 'til sun up and still put in a full day's work on the farm

The other night as I was drifting off to sleep on one of our first frosty nights of the season, I could hear a group of coonhounds on the knob behind our house. As I lay there listening to music of those coonhounds on the hillside, the memories of my father and his coon hunting experiences seemed to fill my head with many pleasant thoughts. remembered his hunting buddies, places he enjoyed going, special dogs, funny happenings, as well as numerous stories he would tell from his nights of hunting. They were all good thoughts that also caused me to wish for the opportunity to just talk to him one more time about his favorite sport. Daddy passed away in 2001, but those memories he left me seem to bring him back to me on cold frosty nights. The other night as I listened to those hounds on the knob, I looked over at the horn that he used to call in his dogs, made from a Texas Longhorn's rack, hanging on the wall near my bed and thought back

on those memories. The years that I grew up on our Middle Tennessee farm was a time of "handson" education. It was a time of learning from the end of a hoe, the knee of a



finding from the hands of a father who taught me what life was all about. It included a lot of hard work, but also many adventures of enjoyment by his side as we would do the fun things that farm guys did together while growing up. I found out really quick that nature could also be a real educator as well, because it always seemed that when work was to be done in the field or at the barn it either rained, was really warm or cold and changed when you least expected it.

In my employment "adventures" today, there have been those who have questioned my reasons for what I write in support of modern animal agriculture. My early upbringing has a lot to do with that. I was literally born on the farm in grandparents' log house. The day I was born, my parents were short of money to pay the doctor, but they were saving a hog for winter meat. They sold that hog to pay the doctor for bringing me into the world, and I have often wondered if my father ever second thoughts whenever I would get into trouble and the price of

hogs would go up. But, my understanding of animal agriculture came from a family that understood the importance of taking good care of your livestock. They were fed and watered before we were. In fact, we had running water at the barn before we had it at the

I can still remember as a small boy the feeling of his large, rough weathered hands as many times we would work together taking care of a small calf or baby pig. Hands that may have seemed rough to some, but were as gentle and caring as a nurse's in a newborn wing of a hospital.

That's why today I support Tennessee's farmers in what they do to provide us a safe and affordable product. They have had the same training I grew up with, in most cases, and today have the advantage of information from the best schools of agriculture you can find, plus they have that same inward concern that my father did all those many years ago for their animals. also have an unexplainable desire to be the caregiver for God's creatures.

I fell to sleep that night to that musical tone of those hounds, or maybe it was the memory of the one who taught me the truth about what being a real farmer was all about and who passed on that same inward concern and unexplainable desire to do right. Thanks Daddy, for your hands-ontraining in more ways than you could have imagined.

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

tree mechanic. Now you gotta take them to where they use a computer to check 'em. When I started we'd just check fire and gas, but today there are sensors on everything," says the the Woodbury Lions Club member.

Pelham, an old dog in the salvage world and as congenial a gent you'll ever meet, has learned a few new tricks. Besides buying clunkers that folks tote, tow or push on to his property, he purchases cars over the Internet. And he's adding a new attraction to his business come early November with a "youpull-it" lot.

"I buy so many cars. These cars we're gonna drain the oil and put 'em up on rims. They'll be new models and old models. We'll charge a \$2 fee to go in. You can just go out there and get what you want and come in and pay. Be real cheap prices.

"We'll start with 400 to 500 cars. I think the lot will hold a thousand cars, and we'll rotate 'em out and put fresh ones in," said the man who grew up a half mile away from his salvage lot, 3½ miles south of Woodbury on Highway 53.

The eldest of six children born to Noah and Alice

(Phillips) Pelham, Jerry learned from mechanically-minded father who worked on "appliances and TVs and whatever."

He ventured into the salvage and scrap business when he was 14 on March 13, 1958, when he bought his original business license for three bucks.

"My dad bought aluminum and copper, and I started junking cars and selling the parts," recollected Pelham, who moved his business to its present location in 1976.

Here on about 20 acres, he keeps a thousand cars. more or less, almost all of them purchased from individuals or at insurance auto auctions. Currently, he's been buying cars that no longer run for \$11 per 100 pounds and hulls for \$10 per 100 pounds. He said that averages between \$350 to $\$50\bar{0}$ per car depending on the weight of the vehicle.

Eddie Taylor, now retired, was Pelham's first employee, and worked the parts counter for 24 years.

"We didn't have no computer. We hand writ all the tickets. We knew where everything was. Cars were simpler," said Pelham of past decades. "They would

ask me and Eddie, 'Have you got this?' and we could go and get it, but now we got computers."

Pelham's Auto Salvage employs 10 including four members of Jerry's family. His son Terry has been disassembling cars "ever since he was big enough to walk." Wife Joyce handled the bookkeeping for years, a chore now taken by daughters Angie (Rogers) and Amy (Bogle). And sonin-law Richard Bogle operates the wrecker service.

Pelham's best sellers include engines, transmissions, door glass, alternators and starters.

"We probably got about 500 motors and 600 transmissions," he estimates, and they're all neatly labeled and stored in sheds.

Besides selling auto parts, Pelham's Auto Salvage recycles scrap metal and aluminum cans and offers 24-hour wrecker service. Customers looking for parts phone in from across the United States.

"We had one guy in Chicago who called and said he saw one of my [ball] caps and the 1-800 number. We've got ads in these locator magazines, and I have 'em call from these

magazines, and we have a Web site," said Pelham about the ways he promotes his business.

But he's not a man who enjoys sitting behind a counter hours at a time. He comes to work early and leaves late, and from three to five hours a day, he operates a front-end loader, a labor of love.

The best part of running this business, he says, "I guess dealing with the people. I have guys come in here and get something and they say, 'I remember

dad.' I had one guy who said he remembered when he was young and had a '57 Chevy and came here to get a front end for it, and it cost him \$150. And I remember when my dad and I did a car overhaul and charged

"Cars, man, they've changed. Used to be you'd hit a tree and hardly bend it. Today you hit one and it totals it. They're just throwaways. They iust scrap 'em and go buy something else," says the man who battled tonsil cancer in 2006 and 38 radiation treatments later came out with a clean bill of

Ironically, this country gentleman, who can retrieve practically any car part you're searching for, has had no luck in finding the truck of his dreams.

Says Pelham, "I been looking for a '58 Chevy pick-up that I could repair because that's the year I started."

The Auto Salvage King is still searching.



Scarecrows will continue casting their mystical spell over the Courthouse Square through the month of October, according to one spirited supporter of the Scarecrow idea.



Vehicular homicide, drugs and DUI sentences given

A Cannon County resident was sentenced to 12 years in prison by Judge David Bragg Thursday on vehicular homicide charges.

Travis Lee Dobson was convicted in the May 5, 2010 death of Robert Eddie Ward of Murfreesboro.

Dobson failed to properly negotiate a curve on Auburntown Road, overcorrected and then hit Ward's vehicle head-on. Court

records indicate the offense was related to use of methamphetamine.

UT-Extension Service. Three dead and decaying donkeys were found on Kronnick's property. Two donkeys described by investigators as being in "poor health" were still occupying a dirt lot/pasture at the residence.

According to Steelman's report, "No forages were present, or evidence of any forages being fed to the donkeys. The owner admitted he was unable to provide care for the animals.

"The pasture/dirt lot was absent of manure piles, an indication that the animals did not have sufficient feed/forages. The conclusion of the investigation revealed the three donkeys died from starvation. The small colt was orphaned due to the death of the jennet. The owner surrendered the animals."

The donkeys were not being fed grain, the report

Kronnick was arrested on suspicion of making methamphetamines Sept. 6 at his home in Morrison. He was charged with the initiation of a process intended to result in the manufacture of methamphetamines, maintaining a dwelling to keep or sell illegal substances, and possession of drug paraphernalia, according to a Cannon County Sheriff's Department report. Initially, deputies went to his home in reference to a complaint filed by Woodbury resident Melinda Barrett, who alleged Kronnick had stolen some of her property. "After getting out of jail, I went to retrieve my belongings from Kronnick, and he would not return all of them," Barrett said in an affidavit complaint filed Sept. 4 in

Two days later, an arrest warrant was signed for Kronnick's arrest over the theft allegations. During a routine search of his residence, "several components for a meth lab were found," investigator Anthony Young said in a Sheriff's Department report. In a related report, Young said authorities also found items used to ingest, inject and inhale illegal narcotics. 

Smithville farmer fought for Union Army

Col. Stokes pursued 'Champ' Ferguson

Col. William B. Stokes was in many ways a typical Middle Tennessee politi-

Born in North Carolina in 1814, his family moved to Tennessee in 1818, settling in the Liberty community in DeKalb County.

Raised a farmer, he turned to politics and was elected to the Tennessee General Assembly for two terms before his election to the State Senate.

When the Civil War began, he was representing the Fourth District of Tennessee in the U.S. Congress.

"When the war broke out, he took a decided stand for the Government, and has been an unconditional Union man ever since," wrote John Fitch in the Annals of the Army of the Cumberland. "He worked and spoke earnestly against separ-ation, and was the ex-member Congress in Middle Tennessee who made a regular list of appointments for public speaking.'

Stokes lost his seat in Congress when Tennessee seceded and remained in private life until July 22, 1862. On that date, the former Congressman was commissioned a colonel in the Union army.

The former congressman had little trouble raising a

company of troops from Rutherford, DeKalb and Davidson counties.

Three of Stokes' regiments-Co. A led by Capt. J. H. Blackburn, Co. B with Capt. Shelah Waters, and Co. K led by Capt. E. W. Bass - were made up of DeKalb County men.

As a cavalry unit, Stokes' men fought at Stones River and even at Nashville, but the Tennesseans excelled in a less glorious purpose, the pursuit of Confederate guerillas like those lead by the notorious Samuel "Champ" Ferguson.

Branded an outlaw by the United States, Ferguson evaded Stokes and other Union troops until the end of the war. Ferguson surrendered in May 1865, believing that he would be treated accord-ing to surrender agree-ments and paroled. But he was arrested in Nashville and tried as a guerilla. He was convicted and executed Oct. 20, 1865.

Ferguson was one of only

two Confederates who were executed by the Union Army, the other being Henry Wirz, commandant of Andersonville Prison. Federal authorities honored Ferguson's last wish to be buried beside the Calf Killer River in White

County, Tenn.

Stokes' Fifth Regiment of Tennessee Cavalry had greater success catching other Confederate guerillas

No quarter was given, meaning that captured guerillas were executed on the spot.

The regiment was ordered to Sparta, to break up the guerrilla bands under Ferguson, John M. Hughes, and W.S. Bledsoe.

While Stokes failed to capture Champ Ferguson, a

number of guerillas were executed.

In a February 1864 movement, Stokes sought out Confederate irregulars in White and Putnam counties with some success.

"We killed 17 of the worst

men in the country, to wit, Capt. James Davis (chief of Confederate scouts, brother of A.L. Davis of Nashville), who had on his person a pass with the oath indorsed; Capt. Conley, Jack Coger, Bill Allcorn, Milt. Hawkins, Neely, Dyer, Melton, and others. Most of these men are known to have been engaged in number, robbery, and rape; in fact, all were accessory to the outrages committed through this county. We took 12 prisoners and captured about 20 horses mules," Stokes reported.

After the Civil War, Stokes even managed to return to Congress.

He studied law, was admitted to the bar in 1867, and commenced practice in Alexandria, Tenn. in DeKalb County.

Upon the readmission of Tennessee to representation, he was elected as an Unconditional Unionist to the 39th Congress by Tennessee's Third congressional district. He was re-elected as a Republican to the 40th and 41st Congresses. He served from July 24, 1866 to March 3, 1871.

He was an unsuccessful candidate for re-election in 1870 to the 42nd Congress. He also was the supervisor of internal revenue for Tennessee. He resumed the practice of law and died in Alexandria on March 14, 1897.

He was interred in East View Cemetery

Smoke over the old Sheybogan footpath

Indian bands used the trail near Upper Brawley Creek

No one knows for sure when the first settlers arrived along the Upper Brawley Creek.

Stories of so-called adventurers living in the middle Tennessee country even before the area known as "The Territory South of the River Ohio" are commonplace. Actual documentary evidence for early occupation of the area

is rare to non-existent. Season after season, for generations untold, various tribal bands gathered to hunt and trade on the waters of Brawley's creek, the Carson fork branch being noted, traveling along a time-worn footpath that ran along the edge of the highland rim. Today we might remember it as parts of the old Hollow Springs Road that runs along the edge of the rim to a place called "Shey-bo-gan." Dr. Robert Mason in the 1984 book, "History of Cannon County, Tennessee," states the word was pronounced locally as Shebog'gy.

Sheybogy was located along the same rim where the headsprings of the Horse Spring Creek flows into the valley floors of what early settlers named Carson Fork. A well-worn footpath descended to the base of the hollow.

What became known in Cannon County folklore as the "Shey-bo-gan trail" was a part, in times long passed, of a network of ancient trails hunting footpaths along the upper east fork of Stones River long before Cannon County was formed. Sheybogan connected with the old Nickajack to the south along the Coffee county line near the "Hollow Springs" to another trail that ran toward Warren County.

A trail also went north from the Sheybogan, staying close to the edge of the rim, in the direction of the Short Mountains. Skirting what is geographically known as the Highland Rim Escarpment, the trail ran nearby "Iconium-

Bluewing" where another footpath descended down rocky slops on old Hills creek. Other footpaths descended off the rim near what settlers later called "Shinebone" or Elledge

Hollow (Mason, 1984).

In ancient times, tribal bands hunted all along these headsprings that cascaded into the valley floors of a complex drainage system, flowing eventually into the east fork of Stones River. It was a river system striving with wild game _ a hunters'

For untold centuries long before Europeans ever were aware of these places,

native Americans gathered and camped in the valleys and headsprings of this river system, traveling along familiar networks of ancient footpaths. And, when there, became places for get-togethers, family reunions and renewal of old friendships. traded their choice hides and furs along with stone tools. Marriage ceremonies were sometimes perfbonding ormed tribal bands together. Some would bring rare stones from the distant mountains of East Tennessee for trade along with forest medicines and herbs. Was it a center of early com-merce?

Were these people also paying homage to the ancient forests that helped to sustain them _ for it was from the forests their food,

shelter, medicines and clothing were derived? No doubt conflicts developed. Could these trails be described as warpaths?

When backwoodsmen ventured into these valleys, ridges and hollows they found no permanent villages or towns. What they did find was evidence of a transit people who camped here off and on over the centuries, hunting wild game.

Another unusual story of a piece-mill nature, speaks of a family or party of "settler-adventurers," traveling this old footpath from the "Short Mountains", along the "Bluewing," that led to Sheboygan, then turning south, either to the area of the old McMahan community or the Carson Fork area. Details of this

story, legend or fact, has become lost in the annuals of time.

One could gather many meanings from the word Sheybogan. Some even have their own notion about it remembered by family members in our own county.

Was it the name of an ancient warrior chief who once guided bands of people into these valleys? It may have only been a name the Europeans gave to a place to describe an ancient footpath?

For the most part, however, it was the name of a way to ancient gathering places where an abundance of wild game and water could be found.

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

T.S.S.A.A., the state's governing body for high school sports, has recently posted new enrollment figures for its member

With these numbers now public knowledge, here are some interesting tidbits and facts regarding enrollment: 1. Blackman High School has the largest enrollment in

- the state 2,381 students. 2. Memphis Academy of Health Sciences has the
- smallest enrollment of any football playing school in the
- 3. The seven Class AAA high schools in Rutherford County (including the new Stewart's Creek High School, scheduled to open next fall) will have a combined projected enrollment of 13,837 students. That number exceeds the entire county population of 16 different Tennessee counties.

Along with the enrollment numbers, information that details how schools will be divided into districts and regions was also disclosed.

The 336 football playing schools will first be divided into two groups - Division I and Division II.

The remaining "private schools" that have elected to remain in Division I with public schools will have their enrollment figures multiplied by 1.8. Schools such as Friendship Christian, for example, the state's defending 2A state champion, has an enrollment of 217 students. Applying the 1.8 multiplier gives Friendship Christian a new enrollment number of 391 and moves the Commanders from 1A to 2A in football. Four additional dates will play a major role in the process. They are:

October 17 - T.S.S.A.A. sends letters to all school administrators, letting them know they have the opportunity to move to a higher classification.

October 24 - Schools that desire to move up in classification have until this date to notify T.S.S.A.A. of

October 25 - T.S.S.A.A. staff will make district/region assignments suggestions in all sports and send those suggestions to Board of Control members, as well as all member schools. These district assignment suggestions will also be posted on the T.S.S.A.A. website.

November 15 - The Board of Control will meet at the Doubletree Hotel in Murfreesboro at 9 a.m. At this meeting, the districts and regions will be set for the next four years.

"The good thing is we made strides this season and have several girls back so that is a good thing for us," Coach Kailiponi said.



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
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

Basking in the joys of fall!



Scarecrows, pumpkins, and orange, brown & yellow leaves doorways and porches across America. Hot cocoa and pumpkin flavored drinks and desserts are being added to menus of our favorite eateries. College football gear is being worn by fans all across the nation. Fall has officially arrived!!

Fall is a time for family cookouts, gatherings, festivals, football and tailgating parties. And what do all of these activities have in common?



Picnicking, camping and tailgating are popular activities of the fall season but if you are not careful, your event could be the host to some unwanted guests! Harmful bacteria can grow and multiply in your food, particularly when temperatures are warm and food sits out too

people get sick from eating contaminated food. Most of these result in a simple case of the "tummy flu". However, young children are especially susceptible to serious consequences from foodborne illness because their immune systems have not fully developed.

Cleanliness, time and temperature are three major concerns when enjoying an outdoor meal. Keep everything clean (including your hands) to prevent the spread of bacteria and viruses from hands to food, from one food to another and from a surface or utensil to food. You should bring along clean platters and storage bowls for serving & leftovers. You never want to put cooked food back onto a platter that held raw meat until it has been properly

Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Bacteria grow most quickly between 40°F and 140°F. If you have brought along a large package of chicken (or other meat) and you are cooking it in "batches", put the uncooked portion back inside the cooler until you are ready for it on the grill.

Do not leave foods out for more than two hours....and only one hour if the temperature is above 90°F. This is a sure-fire way to start the growth of bacteria

Generally preparing your food and eating on site is the best option, but if you are going to prepare food ahead of time and then travel, cook your food completely. Partially cooking food for travel is an excellent way to make you sick. Cook your food completely, cool food quickly and then store it in a well-insulated cooler during travel. Pack your cooler in the backseat for travel and once you've arrived, store it in the shade for better insulation.

70% of people surveyed said they never use a refrigerator thermometer in their cooler to make sure foods are being stored at a safe temperature. However, over 60% of people enjoying outdoor eating along popular perishable dishes such as potato salad, pasta salad mayonnaise-based favorites. Make sure your cooler is staying below 40°F; otherwise you are at risk for growing bacteria.

There are a lot of do's and don'ts to safely enjoy an outdoor meal with family and friends, but if you take the extra precautions it could save you a lot of serious pain discomfort later!!

MISCELLANEOUS: We request that voters bring a Federal or State issued PHOTO ID with them to vote early. If you are a registered voter and have misplaced your VOTER CARD please call the office to receive a replacement. Voters who have changed their address or name may do so while early voting. Persons registered by-mail must vote in person at the polls or during early voting for the first time after they register.

THE CAMPAIGN FREE ZONE WILL BE ENFORCED AT THE EARLY VOTING AND ELECTION DAY POLLING LOCATIONS.

The campaign free zone ends generally **100 ft**. from the entrance of the building in which the election is being held. Under Burson V. Freeman, the election commission may prohibit campaign signs and the electioneering on public sidewalks and streets if those areas fall within 100ft. boundary line. No campaign posters, signs or other campaign materials may be displayed. (Hats/shirts) No person may distribute materials, or solicit votes for or against any person or political party or position on a question. No person may solicit or collect for any cause.

What activity is permitted in the campaign free zone? An individual may bring a sample ballot or other campaign literature inside the boundary as long as the voter does not display the campaign literature to other voters. If the parking place of the polling place lies within the boundary, then a vehicle having campaign literature displayed on it may be parked within the boundary, only for as long as necessary for the occupant of the vehicle to vote.

VOTING BY MAIL:

If you are unable to appear at your polling place on Election Day or during Early Voting, you may request a By-Mail Ballot for the following reasons:

- 1. If you will be out of the county during all voting periods.
- 2. If you are a student (or the spouse of a student) enrolled in a college or University located in Tennessee;
- 3. If you are hospitalized, sick or physically disabled;
- 4. If you are a candidate for office in the election or an election official;
- 5. If you are the caretaker of a hospitalized, ill or disabled person;
- 6. If you are serving on a state or federal jury;
- 7. If you are observing a religious holiday;8. If you are over 60 years of age or older;
- 9. On the Permanent Absentee Voting Register. If you are hospitalized, ill or disabled and are not able to appear during Early Voting or at your polling place on Election Day, you may file a Doctor's Statement of your condition (forms available from our office). Once this form is on file, you will automatically be mailed a ballot for all future elections.


