For love of dogs

Couple saves castaway canines

Upon entering the living room of Miranda Caffey-Vogeler and Neil Vogeler, a visitor is liable to be sniffed or licked to death.

The husband and wife duo provide a haven to seven dogs, while that number sometimes gets as high as 12, at their Short Mountain Dog Rescue, a nonprofit they began in 2008. To date they have placed 120 neglected or abandoned canines in good homes.

"This started when we lived on Short Mountain. We are avid walkers and hikers. We would walk around and see cars pull up on the side of the road. When the cars left, these dogs would be left, dropped on the side of the road," said Miranda, a Murfreesboro native.

"You'd have a car pull over and suddenly four dogs are there. At first we were like, 'We should do something," Neil recalled.

"We're gonna do it." Miranda exclaimed as she shared that their mission "is to rescue, provide sanctuary and ultimately to rehome abandoned, abused and neglected dogs. We started taking them in. Most of them are females, and most of them had puppies. That's what we learned." The pair gets a lot of help

from their friends, and their dogs, which are continually coming and going, receive professional attention from Dr. Gayle Tate of the Cannon County Animal Clinic.

"He's our vet. He really helps us out a lot," said Neil. "We love him and take all our dogs to him," Miranda echoed.

Responds veterinarian Tate when asked about the couple's passion of caring for unwanted dogs, "The number of stray dogs is a huge problem in Cannon County, and there is no public answer to the problem whatsoever. They provide the best they can for what dogs they deal with. What they provide is a great service.

"They're probably overwhelmed because they can't keep up with the number. They can't service every dog in Cannon County, but they sure try on their scale. It's a great hardship they put them-

selves through," Tate said. Miranda, 37, a graduate of Oakland High School, holds an outdoor recreation degree from Middle Tennessee State University. Neil, 34, earned an engineering degree at the University of Illinois and designs sheet metal dies at Cosma Die Technology in Smithville. Miranda has worked in the

Norris will complete her Masters of Library Science Degree, May 8, and she already has an array of ideas she plans to implement at Adams Memorial Library.

Summer of 1969 pivotal time for us

A few weeks backs back, I wrote that the graphic violence depicted in the 1967 gangster movie Bonnie and Clyde (starring Warren Beatty and Faye Dunaway) "flipped a bird" to the old, conservative Hollywood and, thus, "opened the door" to a new generation of more liberal, more adventurous filmmakers.

As of the late '60s, actor Peter Fonda (son of actor Henry Fonda, brother of actress Jane Fonda) was the "John Wayne of biker flicks," having established himself in films such as the Wild Angels (1966).

As research has it, here's how the highly successful, ultimate biker film Easy Rider—reaching a near-cult status that exists until this very day—came to

Already indoctrinated to biker-themed films, Peter Fonda is reported to have had a creative brain surge along the lines of: Suddenly I thought that's it, that's the modern Western; two cats just riding across the country . . . and maybe they make a big score, see, so they have a lot of money. And they're gonna cross the country and go retire to Florida . . . when a couple of duck poachers in a truck 'off' them because they don't like the way they look.

Further, it has been written that Peter Fonda called fellow actor and friend Dennis Hopper at 1:30 in the morning with the Easy Rider idea, and Hopper immediately came on board.

What we know for a fact is this: Starring Peter Fonda and Hollywood wild man Dennis Hopper, Easy Rider was released mid-July 1969, and, for the most part, the movie's story line matches Peter Fonda's supposed "creative brain surge."

The two main characters are nomadic bikers "Wyatt," portrayed by Fonda, and "Billy," portrayed by Hopper. After making some serious cash on a drug deal, Wyatt and Billy set out across the country, their bikes rumbling down the highway to rock group Steppenwolf's tunes "The Pusher" and "Born to be Wild." (NOTE: Supposedly, Wyatt's character was based on famous Old West lawman Wyatt Earp, and Billy's character was based on infamous Old West outlaw Billy the Kid.)

Headed for the Mardi Gras in New

Orleans, Wyatt and Billy, along the way, hang out out at a Meat 'n' Potatoes hippie commune, **MIKE VINSON** meet American Civil Liberties

Union lawyer and local drunk George Hanson (portrayed by Jack Nicholson, nonetheless), and take the hapless, nodirection-known Hanson with them. Before reaching New Orleans, though, Hanson is beaten to death by some farmers in a field. Wyatt and Billy, however, do make it to the Mardi Gras, get with a couple hookers, and drop some LSD. Having biked their way down to Florida, two rednecks in a pickup truck pull up alongside Wyatt and Billy, on bikes, and comment about their long hair. Billy flips them a bird, and the redneck, riding passenger, "offs" both Wyatt and Billy with a shotgun.

Easy Rider was a ground-breaking story about man's quest for freedom, and, too, the consequences that sometimes come with the quest for certain freedoms. It seemed to embed itself in the American psyche.

For me, in terms of personal freedom, the release of Easy Rider in theaters across America was the quintessential precursor to the rock festival of all rock festivals, Woodstock, which took place August 15-17, 1969, in White lake, New York. Though somewhat hedonistic, Woodstock, arguably, was the loudest and most expressive display of freedom in American history. Ironically—though fittingly—musician Richie Havens opened the Woodstock concert with the song "Freedom."

However, a week prior to Woodstock, August 8, 1969, followers under the spell of cult leader Charles Manson—the embodiment of evil-brutally murdered actress Sharon Tate, Abigail Folger, Wojciech Frykowsk, and Steven Parent in a posh Hollywood neighborhood. It no longer was safe for even the rich & famous. The age of true freedom was gone, and the "Age of Aquarius" was upon us.

Indeed, summer 1969 proved to be a significantly pivotal time for America, because, far as I'm concerned, things haven't been quite the same since.



Is it really a necessity or luxury?



As today's economy becomes a major factor in how all of us plan for tomorrow, I just wonder if any of you have started looking at things you use on a daily basis that you just can't live without. Most of us have cut back on some things that we consider a luxury, but I don't know if I have really considered cutting out something that I consider a necessity.

Each day I see reports on folks cutting back and it may come to a time when the term "necessity" will catch us all having to give up some of our modern day conveniences. To find out how people feel about what they need and consider necessities rather than luxuries in this country, the Pew Research Center out of Washington, D.C. conducted a survey among American adults by phone. A car was the number one need for 91 percent of the group, which is right in there with my thoughts, but the number two need was a clothes washer at 90 percent and number three was a clothes dryer at 83 percent. I thought more Americans, especially the younger generation, was pretty locked into their cell phones, but the survey seemed to prove that most folks had rather be clean than heard. Of course, that is all right with me, especially in a crowd.

However, I never would have thought a clothes dryer would rate up there as high as number three. With everyone turning to a greener environment, I thought many would be going solar, you know, hanging the wash out on the line in the sunshine. But, it seems there are some things folks are just not ready to give up. During my growing-up years, my mother dried our clothes the all-natural way and it never affected me,

other than a time or two of riding my bike under the clothesline and surviving a sudden stop. The smell of fresh sheets right off the line and stiff blue jeans that took a full day's wear to get them bendable once again is something that you need to experience. I grew up in the day before dryer sheets, during the time of clothes freezing on a clothesline in the winter and your unmentionables waving in the summer breeze for everyone to see. On second thought, maybe a clothes dryer is important.

The survey went on to list the order of things Americans consider as necessities in today's world with home air conditioning being fourth on the list, the good old microwave as fifth, a TV set as sixth, car air conditioning as seventh, the home computer as eight, a cell phone as ninth, a dishwasher in tenth place, and cable or satellite TV hookup rounds out eleventh place.

Not until the 1980s did some of the items on the list even exist for many of us and over half of them were not even heard of until the '90s. Today, they are a necessity and it causes me to wonder just how spoiled we Americans really are. Now don't get me wrong, I do like my air conditioning, Andy Griffith on satellite and getting some great offers for upside down tomato growers through email, but are they things we just can't live without?

I have also done a survey with some of my southern country farm friends to find out what we cannot live without if we had a choice between having and not having. Here's our list:

• A pickup truck for hauling our dog around the farm and allowing him to look over the side while driving on the highway so his ears and lips will blow in the wind.

- Of course a good dog to ride in the pickup truck has to be a part of this list.
- A good banker to finance the pickup truck.
- Cornbread muffins with plenty of butter. (This one is mine!)
- Duct tape strong enough to stay on a NASCAR racecar at top speed or to keep the mirror on my pickup truck after getting too close to the gate post at the farm trying to dodge that Angus heifer standing on the cattle guard.
- Vise-Grip jaw locking pliers. (Can't ever have enough of these, especially after you plant a few during planting season.)
- Free caps from the farm supply stores and chemical companies.
- A radio on our tractor tuned to a country station for those long days and nights of planting and harvesting in the fields.
- Someone who still makes flip phones.
- Deer and turkey season.

These are just a few of the things many of us need during tough times on the farm. But, you know, tough times are a usual thing if you farm for a living and this cutting back stuff is nothing new for the rural population. Country living has as its foundation survival skills for hard economic times developed over years of practice. We have learned over the years that getting-by is a necessity on the farm and luxuries are the cream from the over abundance of some successes that come around every now and then.

Midway and has been in operation there ever since.

"We do lots of custom sawing. We will cut logs in just about any dimension," he explained.

Currently, Laidback Custom Lumber has 10 employees. "We had only five employees last year at this time. We expect to add another five by midsummer," Robinson said.

The firm's customers come from outside of Nashville all the way to Sparta with many of them desiring custom work ranging from barn wood to parts for swing sets. Basically, Laidback Custom Lumber rough cuts green lumber by order.

And just how "Laidback" is Robinson's operation.

"We're still working on a sign for the business," he laughed. "Now one of our customers who does signage says he's going to provide one."

His sawmill heritage speaks volumes about his dedication to the business.

"I'm Richard Allen Robinson the III. Dad goes by R.A. Mom didn't like the name Richard so she called me Alex," he said. "My father just retired last week. He worked at Beaman (Bottling Company) in Tullahoma for 40 years. Now he's at the sawmill looking for something to

His grand father was called "Old Man Robinson."

"Richard A. is what everybody called him to his face. He was like Johnny Appleseed except his plant was corn. He would plant corn everywhere even around the Courthouse,"

Robinson said.

When he wasn't planting corn, Richard A. would tear down old houses.

"Old Man" was a friend of banker turned funeral home operator Bill Smith.

Back when Smith was still running the Bank of Commerce, "Old Man" gave him a special Christmas present. "It was a spindle from an old house. Bill's kept it ever since and carries it around in his truck," Robinson said.

Bill Smith is one of Robinson's regular customers. "He comes by at least once a month" and enjoys talking about old times.

Meanwhile, business continues to expand for Robinson.

"Expansion means you are doing well, but it does grinned.

restaurant business for the past six years for Karen and Bob Ford, who recently relocated their Good Gracious Café and Catering from the Boro to the Readyville Mill.

Married nearly six years, the couple lived in a shack on Short Mountain for five years, but a few months ago they moved into a hollow above Dry Creek near Dowelltown, about three miles outside of Cannon County as the

crow flies. "I went to Short Mountain a lot as a youth," said Miranda. "I love the beauty, the nature, the way the streams coming off the mountain carved these little hollows. I told myself, 'One day I'm gonna live there.' It was like the land spoke to me.

"I brought my Yankee husband here and said, 'You want to go live in a holler?" she laughed.

So now the pair with two pet dogs, five rescue dogs and three rescue cats live in an old farmhouse where they heat by firewood and drink from piped in spring water. A sign on their living room wall reads: A dog wags its tail with its heart.

An American flag ripples in the breeze that whips across their porch that stands five feet above the front yard.

"Usually it is a barkfest," she says of the rare occasion when a stranger knocks on their door. "We found that this dead end road is perfect [for the dogs]."

The lucky canine citizens here include Millie, Neil's 11-year-old pet Labrador; Jack, Miranda's pet beagle; Lucy, a coon hound and hit-and-run victim found in a pool of blood; Birdie, a

half coon hound, one of 12 left by the roadside; Beau, a mixed shepherd, dumped by the side of the road and pregnant with 12 pups ("I named her Beau because of the bow left around her neck," says Miranda); Diego, a terrier that was a skeletal mess when they found her; and Sadie, a German shepherd that was dumped and pregnant with four puppies when they rescued her.

"We get calls constantly. We both work full time. We try to take the worst of the worst," said Neil.

"We try to be a force for good. What I realized, most people around here are doing what we've been Everybody in doing. Cannon County seemed to be feeding three or four stray dogs. People from the city were coming out and dropping dogs off, and Cannon County gets a bad

rap."

"We didn't want to go public, so we just take them in and re-home them," Miranda said. "I used social media to promote our efforts and tried to do fundraising. We've put flyers in gas stations. It takes a lot to feed these dogs and we also give dog food to others who are

taking care of dogs."

She keeps a bowl out at Good Gracious at the Mill where diners can drop donations if they wish.

"I've got a waiting list of 30 dogs that people want us to take them in and find a home," she noted.

"We get calls every day," said Neil.

"They says, 'Please take this dog, please take this dog,'" Miranda said.

"We have to say, 'No, we can't. Please give us a picture of the dog and we'll try to help find a home," Neil said.

Miranda said, "I'd love to have 50 dogs, but we have to live here, too. I want to have a dog sanctuary. Here they can live a real good life and we can re-home them, too. I'd like to take in more, but I can only feed 8 or 10 at a time. We have rehomed 120 dogs off of Short Mountain."

Why do the dog devotees do what they do?

"We wanted to help the animals of Cannon County and really it was so needed. Somebody needed to do something. Well, Neil and I will be that somebody," said the woman whose home has gone to the dogs in a good way.



Another young hero Emma Sansom was sixteen when she helped General Forrest and his men prevent an attack on Rome, Georgia. Union troops had just burned the bridge which crossed a creek near her home in Alabama. While under heavy fire, Emma showed General Forrest a cow route near Black Creek The troops used this route to go through the water. General Forrest later wrote a note giving her "My highest regardes...." In turn, the Alabama Assembly honored her with a gift of 640 acres of land.



There was a time when football was the talk of the town in Woodbury and quarterback Al Smith was at the center of the conversation.

Smith, the son of Betty and Bobby Smith, led Woodbury Central to an unblemished 10-0 regular season and a berth in the TSSAA State quarterfinals in 1974. It is the only undefeated season since but those who remember the team recall how special it was.




"Football was the talk in Woodbury," said Woodbury Mayor Harold Patrick, who offered play-by-play of the games for radio and will serve as Smith's presenter when he is enshrined into the Hall of Fame. "There were overflow crowds and enthusiasm. Forty years later we honor Al Smith for the exciting season we had at Woodbury Central. Al is the second inductee from that team (joining Steve Bullard), and we are just four years into the Hall of Fame. That speaks volumes

Smith downplays his importance in leading the team to perfection. He deemphasizes the fact that he was any more important than the next guy.

"That was my life. It is all I wanted to do," Smith says of his love for football. "If not for that, I would not have cared about school. We had a great team, and I



it. We had talent at all of the positions. We had great offensive linemen, great receivers and great running backs."

They had a great quarterback, too.

Smith earned All-District, All-Region, All-Midstate and he received a scholarship to play at Northwest Mississippi Junior College.

"You hear the saying, 'There is no I in team,' but you have to have people that will step up and lead. Al Smith was won of those people," said Randy Gannon, an offensive lineman and Smith's classmate. "Al was not afraid to lead. He did it without any hesitation or making anyone mad. Al was unselfish. He was also very humble."

Dennis Banks, currently a professor at Michigan State University, said Smith was the most complete athlete in a class full of standout performers. He was also an outstanding basketball player, earning All-District, All-Region and All-Midstate honors for his work on the hardcourt.

"Al was always the most complete athlete in our class," Banks said. "We were together from fifth grade all the way through high school. Al was not necessarily the fastest or strongest but, as far as being complete, he was it. He understood the game. Al was instrumental in developing the position of quarterback very well. He could do a lot of things very well."

Al Smith was a difference

Smith did not play football as a sophomore but came back out onto the gridiron as a junior in 1973.

His return signaled a change in fortunes for Woodbury Central football. It also made Banks a very happy man.

"The thing I remember the most is Al didn't play football our sophomore year," Banks said. "I was the quarterback our sophogame. We just were not very good. I was so happy when Al arrived back as a junior because I didn't have to shoulder that responsibility anymore. That was a blessing. We went from winning one game to winning the conference in 1973."

Smith completed long, tight aerials to his playmaking teammates. He ran the power I to perfection, baffling foes with his elusive moves and accurate arm.

"Al Smith is arguably the best quarterback ever (in Woodbury)," Patrick said. "Al Smith was not just a football player. He was an athlete. He could do it all and it helped him being the quarterback he was. He was very agile. His composure was remarkable. The most impressive thing about Al was his arm, not his arm strength but the accuracy in throwing the football.

"When the team went 10-0in 1974, Al couldn't have done it without the team and the team couldn't have done it without Al. He was the key component in the team going 10-0 in 1974. How many former players can say they quarterbacked Woodbury to a 17-3 record in a two-year span? Al developed the position of quarterback for those teams and that was a big key."

Teammates say Smith's intelligence was as important as his overall ability.

"He was always cool and composed," Gannon said. "He was extremely intelligent. Coach (Mike) Mayfield (also a member of the Cannon Courier Hall of Fame) would relay in plays. They would bring one in, Al huddle and call something else. We ran the Power I. If it was power right, we ran right. If it was power left, we ran left, but Al would mix it up and coach Mayfield would not know the difference. Al had such intelligence and we fed off of it. You never saw any panic. We were a close bunch and part of those closeness was due to his leadership."

Smith says he didn't more year and we won one change plays. He altered

them.

"When you are on the field you get a feel for the game," Smith said. "You know what you need to be doing. I always loved to play football. We kind of turned it around in 1973 when we won several games, went to a bowl game, and just continued to get better. Nobody cared who did what. We just wanted to win. I enjoyed playing the games and winning, and my teammates and coaches. I had some great teammates. I had some really good coaches. They pushed us hard and wanted us to be our best."

Smith played for two Hall of Fame Coaches. His basketball coach, Bobby Parker, was inducted in 2012, and Mayfield was inducted in 2013.

Patrick says Smith's play reminded him of another great quarterback that would come along more than a decade later.

"Al reminded me of Peyton Manning before Peyton played," Patrick said. "When I saw Peyton play I made the comment, 'This guy plays the game like Al Smith did back in the 1970s as far as his accuracy and running the team. Another characteristic of Manning that Al possessed was when the game was on the line he put his team in position to

He writes that the Lord spoke to him telling him that before He formed him in the womb He knew him and before he was born He set him apart and appointed him as a prophet to


Jeremiah argued with God telling Him that he was only a child and did not know how to speak.

Breeding Soundness Exams Results

Eleven bulls were tested at the recent Breeding Soundness testing on Saturday April 5th. The event was hosted by the Cannon County Cattlemen's and Cannon County Extension and conducted at the Cannon County Livestock Market.

Along with an exam from Dr. Mandy Willis, bulls were vaccinated courtesy of Zoetis, vitamin supplement with Multimin and a bag of mineral from Woodbury Farmers Coop.

The results of the testing; 7 satisfactory potential breeders, 1 unsatisfactory potential breeders and 3 classified deferred.

The bull makes up half of every mating opportunity and thus he is necessary to produce a calf. It is integral that he is physically sound and fertile to improve the odds of conception. An infertile bull can cost an entire calf crop. The cost associated with no calves to market due to infertility is the cost of carrying those cows for a full year plus the

opportunity cost associated with the resources used on the cattle herd that likely could have been devoted to something else with a positive return.

An infertile bull can cost a small fortune depending on the size of the cattle herd, but a subfertile bull can also cost a producer a pretty penny. The subfertile bull can cost a producer in two ways. The first way he costs a producer is by a reduced conception and calving rate. The second way the subtertile bull costs producer is in the way of pounds at weaning if he failed to settle a cow during her first heat cycle. If we consider an operation with 30 cows the difference between a 90 percent calf crop (27 calves) with a fertile bull and an 80 percent calf crop (24

calves) with a subfertile bull would result in 3 fewer calves from the subfertile bull If those three additional calves from the fertile bull weighed 525 pounds at weaning and brought \$194 hundredweight then they would be worth \$1,018.50 a head for a total of \$3,055.50.

However, the story does not end there. Even if a subfertile bull settles the cows later in the season, it can cost a producer because cows bred in the first heat cycle will typically wean heavier calves than cattle settled in the second or third heat cycle. If we assume the average weaning weight of calves from the subfertile bull was 500 pounds as opposed to 525 pounds from the fertile bull then we would have 25 fewer pounds per head to market. Assuming a 500 pound calf brought \$200 per hundredweight then each calf would be worth \$1,000. Twenty-four

calves worth \$1,000 a head results in total revenue of \$24,000 while 27 calves worth \$1,018.50 a head results in total revenue of \$27,499.50. Thus the fertile bull returned nearly \$3,500 more than the subfertile bull. The use of a subfertile bull could result in a much lower calf crop percentage than used in this example which would cost a producer even more.

So the question is, "can a producer afford not to have a BSE performed on the
