## Just down the road & a million miles away

The Cannon County Chamber of Commerce is focused on a visibility campaign. Given our small population – just 14,000 to Rutherford’s 280,000 – and location away from an interstate, we have limited name and place recognition.

Using the pooled resources of Chamber members, we are marketing Cannon with radio, TV, print and social media.

Keeping our retail establishments going is of primary concern. Our tourist-attracting Court House Square sets a visual tone – busy establishments suggest prosperity and opportunity. New businesses are drawn to an area with vibrancy.

A healthy retail core generates sales tax dollars which fund our local government operations.

Many Cannon residents shop outside Cannon County – leaving sales taxes in other counties. In order to generate sales tax dollars inside Cannon, we need to draw in folks from other counties – tourists. While they may just be crossing the county line, they are in fact tourists by definition and are playing a vital role in supporting our local economy.

We put a welcoming positive face out to the world. We spend our marketing dollars strategically. Additional marketing support dollars comes from the TN Office of Tourist Development. The State believes the growth of the tourism economy will come from the distinctive, smaller, more remote, personality-filled counties.

In 2014 Tourism’s \$17.7 billion annual economic impact made it one of Tennessee’s most successful industries. The \$1.5 billion in state and local sales tax revenue, a 7 percent increase year over year, helps improve the quality of life for all Tennesseans.

First a tourist then a resident or business owner. Yes, we build just a few dozen new houses county-wide each year. Related, overall population growth is modest. Natural attrition frees up older housing for new residents. Many people come to Cannon County to visit friends or

## ‘Gem’ Stone of history survived Viet Cong attack

The Stones have been solid rocks of history in Cannon County beginning in the 1700s with “Long Hunter” Uriah Stone, namesake of the Stone’s River that spawned Cannon County, Woodbury, Readyville and other communities downstream.

Descendant James “Jim” Stone has kept the family flow of significant modern history flowing, starting with: “I woke up alive! ... I could have woke up dead!”

Retired Army Colonel Stone, shared his thoughts when coming out of a coma in 1963, three days after the Viet Cong had blasted his UH-1B helicopter out of the sky.

“I woke up three days later in a Saigon tent hospital, and recall thinking: ‘I woke up alive ... I could have woke up dead,’ I remember being excited, actually very thankful, as my hands examined my upper torso to see if all was still where it was supposed to be.”

He woke up with a



parched throat.

“When this nurse walked by, I smelled water,” Col. Stone added. “I didn’t know how long I’d been unconscious, but it’s the first time I remember literally smelling water. I couldn’t wait to drink

some water.”

Col. Stone, who served 35 years in the military following in the tradition of his deceased father career Army M/Sgt. Hilton Stone, described why he had flown his helicopter into

## A town called Danville

Part II of a Series.

Danville, an emerging rural village along the upper waters of the Stones River by the 1820s, was surveyed out in town lots as early as 1818. The lots were even advertised in a Nashville newspaper. A Henry Trott and Henry D. McBroom, maybe others, foresaw opportunities for a growing town along this early stage route. It’s been stated that they donated town lots to anyone willing to build a dwelling on it. They even left a section for a courthouse square if the need should arrive.

North Carolina surveyors had been in some areas of the upper Stones as early as the 1790s. It was many years later before the town



site around the area of Danville was even occupied by settlers. These surveyors marked out large swathes of land while recording the tracts in their field survey entry notes. Past historians have indicated that some settlers may have been in the area of Danville by the year 1800, however its difficult to imagine settlers in this area before the counties of Rutherford and Warren had been fully established.

By the year 1790, North Carolina had, by previous action, ceded its holdings known as its western district which included the

waters of the Stones River drainage area to the new Federal Government. However North Carolina retained rights to these surveys. A ‘southwest territory’ had been created when our first president George Washington signed a bill authorizing the creation of what became known as the ‘Territory South of the River Ohio.’ Its capital was located in the east Tennessee area today. The settlement at Nashville was just a small village on the banks of the Cumberland River. This was some six years before a new state called Tennessee was actually created. William Blount was appointed its first territorial governor.

The upper waters of the Stones River was one of several river systems that flowed north into the Cum-

## Media not Trump apprentices

At a recent press conference addressing money that he promised to raise for veterans, Donald Trump lambasted assembled reporters for questioning how much he had raised and to whom it had gone. In an especially notable moment, he singled out a reporter from ABC news as “sleaze.”

Days earlier he had blasted a “Mexican” judge (although he has a Spanish name, he had been born in Indiana) for presiding over proceedings involving whether Trump University (which, as it turns out, is not a true university) engaged in fraudulent marketing practices.

Although he has since buried that hatchet, Trump skipped a debate earlier in the year because of a quarrel with Megyn Kelly of Fox News. For Trump, the personal is the political.

As those who support Trump over Clinton (who has her own thin skin) sometimes point out, few if any modern politicians have been as accessible to the news media as Trump. Some estimate that the media has extended Trump as much as \$2 billion in free media. His face has been ubiquitous on television news, and he is well known for his late-night twitters and tweets.

When Trump calls, he can choose to whom he talks. It is more difficult to walk out of a press conference, but easier to direct attention away from nettlesome questions by quarreling with members of the press. Trump is hardly the first to charge the press with being unduly liberal or biased, but he appears to have ratcheted media criticism to a new level. For all his media savvy, Trump appears to lack the self-deprecating sense of humor of a John F. Kennedy (the closest Trump has come was an appearance on Saturday Night Live) or the artfulness in using verbal circumlocutions of Dwight D. Eisenhower. There does not appear to be much of a filter from what pops into his mind at the moment and what he says.

After eviscerating his Republican opponents, Trump now has the media in his cross hairs. The politics of insult hardly portends well for a potential Trump presidency, especially if it signals how he would also treat rival branches of government (or foreign governments). Is Congress altering or delaying a presidential proposal? Don’t just follow Harry Truman and call it a “do-nothing” body. Try questioning its integrity. Has the Court issued an adverse ruling? Call its members out for being Hispanic, female, Jewish, or Catholic. State governors not jumping on

the bandwagon? Blame them, as Trump blamed a Republican New Mexican Governor Susana Martinez, for federal immigration policies.

America’s founders expected the three branches to check one another, and as former critics of the English King whose words were considered treasonous, they certainly were not expecting a fawning press. They adopted the First Amendment precisely because they knew that rulers often sought to retaliate against those who questioned them. Political scientists often identify the press as the fourth branch of government precisely because they expect its members to challenge those to whom the people have entrusted with power. Thomas Jefferson said that if he could have could have government without newspapers or newspapers without government, he would prefer the latter.

In 1798, Federalists sought to cling to power by adopting a sedition act that made it a crime to criticize the president or the government of the United States. Two years later, the American people repudiated this policy by electing a president who supported freedom of speech and press and pardoned alleged offenders. Like the election of 1800, the 2016 election will likely determine how the president treats the press over the next four years.

The American system doesn’t need a press, or rival branches of government, composed of sycophants or toadies. As a billionaire and a television personality known for firing those who do not please him, Trump may be used to having butlers, housekeepers, hairdressers, pilots, and chauffeurs to carry out his bidding, but he should not count members of the press among them. If elected president, he will not sit on a throne or be ensconced in a tower, but will reside in the “the people’s house.” Neither members of the press nor of the rival branches will be his apprentices.

## It’s ego versus artistic skill

How many of you remember when, just a few short years ago, professional writers and photographers were distinguished from “wannabe” writers and photographers by one essential fact: they got paid for their work. There were, of course, amateur writers and photographers, but they almost never got paid, except perhaps a nominal amount.

People who called themselves writers or photographers were folks who made their living by their craft. And that almost always meant getting paid.

But technology has, as in so many other areas, blurred those distinctions, and, certainly unintentionally, made it perhaps more difficult for professionals to succeed in their craft.

The physical process of writing or photography used to be somewhat difficult. Typewriters and film cameras imposed constraints and restraints on what the user could do. The physical task of these crafts often separated the professional from the amateur because the professional was able to transcend these constraints and produce art other people would want to see and read.

But word processing, cell phone cameras and instant access to almost

unlimited information have put these tools into the hands of almost anyone, even those without the skill to use them properly.

This in turn has led to a plethora of web sites that, to put it bluntly, cater to ego rather than quality. At some level that’s ok, because anyone who wants to can post their creative projects for the entire world to see.

To be sure, these postings may be a springboard to success and riches...but quite frankly, not likely. For all of the exposure the web can give, it’s hard to buy groceries and pay the mortgage with simply 100-thousand views.

There is a huge chasm between technical ability and artistic skill. And that chasm cannot be bridged by simply pushing buttons and moving a mouse.

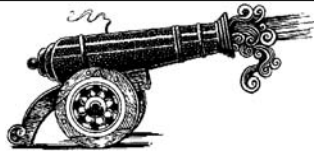

While her first show focused on Tennessee landscape images in pastoral shades, her newest work draws on a recent visit to New Mexico and Arizona. Having gone there to see the landscape and the work of other artists who captured that environment on canvas, to be inspired and instructed by those preceding arts, Garrett “saw and felt the Southwest more intensely” than on prior visits – seeing now with her educated art eye. The images range from painted portraits of the landscape to pencil drawn portraits of people. Garrett’s work displays an intimacy with place and person. # Chronic Migraine Headaches Helped with Chiropractic - A Case Study

The chiropractic examination and analysis including x-rays led to the conclusion that there was a subluxation at the upper neck known as the atlas. Based on this information, a specific form of upper neck adjustments was initiated to correct the subluxation in the upper cervical area of the neck.

The case study notes that after 10 weeks of care, the patient's migraines reduced from an 8 out of 10, to a 3 out of 10. The improvement was verified by examination procedures as well as by her medical physician. The study authors reported, "Upon re-evaluation with the patient's medical doctor, the patient stated an improvement in the overall frequency and duration of migraines, as well as a reduction of her medications, but the exact dosages was not given."

“We were there to rescue wounded friendlies, after two of our H-21C flight crews had been wounded,” accounted Col. Stone. “I probably survived because our helicopter was only 15 feet above the rice paddy when the Viet Cong pierced our chopper with 17 bullets. The (2-feet in depth) water also softened our crash.”

A wounded American pilot he was attempting to rescue ended up saving Col. Stone’s life.

“He saved me by holding my (unconscious) head up out of the rice paddy water,” Col. Stone confirmed. “I’ve never found out the pilot’s name who kept me from drowning.”

Col. Stone was fortunate, but his crew chief perished in the assault and crash.

Pentagon records confirm why Col. Stone was presented the “Distinguished Flying Cross” -- “For heroism while participating in aerial flight. Lt. Stone without regard to personal safety and knowing full well the grave dangers involved, initiated an approach into the landing zone to attempt the rescue of the (two) downed CH-21 (chopper) crews. The Viet Cong fire was intensive throughout the approach.

“The Viet Cong fire resulted in the death of the crew chief (on Col. Stone’s UH-1B aircraft) and the subsequent crash of the helicopter. Lt. Stone was knocked unconscious in the crash. Lt. Stone’s selfless act of attempted rescue in the face of blistering Viet Cong fire was an act of extreme heroism.”

He’s the honoree of three combat Bronze Stars, two Legions of Merit, two Meritorious Service Medals, 12 Air Medals in combat and two Army Commendation Awards for bravery in combat, and a member of the MTSU ROTC Hall of Fame.

The retired Master Army Aviator, who received a Purple Heart for his wounds, said he felt “destined” since boyhood to serve his country ... having lived briefly as a boy on Sewart Air Force Base in nearby Smyrna where his military career father had

been stationed.

Col. Stone’s mother, Ruth, was known as “Granny” by thousands of students at Woodbury schools where she worked as a dietitian for 20 years.

In 1959, Col. Stone married Frances Ray McBroom and enjoyed over 50 years of marriage until her death on February 9, 2011.

Col. Stone made U.S. military history when assigned to fly helicopter missions in Vietnam.

“I flew in the first ‘hot mission’ our Army launched in Vietnam,” Col. Stone confirmed. “We gave the enemy a hard day, with all of our mounted machine guns and missiles on our helicopters.”

He was a pioneer aviator in the Army’s first turbo-jet helicopter, nicknamed the Huey, in preparing to serve in the first armed helicopter unit sent into combat in Vietnam. He was one of the original Iroquois Chieftains, a precision helicopter flying team of the 101st Airborne Division.

Preserving history and honoring military professionals, past and present, helps motivate Col. Stone, at age 79, to continue serving other veterans.

“If we don’t record and preserve our history, what’s to keep mankind from making the same mistakes made by previous generations,” confirmed Col. Stone, a past “Commander” of Woodbury’s American Legion Post 279 serving more than a hundred military veterans and families.

He also believes in strong civic duties as a civilian!

“We help support the annual summer Tennessee Fishing Rodeo when Wildlife officials stock 500 extra catfish in the stream beside Dillon Park,” Col. Stone added. “Up to 50 children learn to fish that day.”

For 30-plus recent years, Col. Stone’s most visible volunteer efforts include organizing and staging military honor ceremonies at Cannon County High School along with parades through downtown Woodbury’s pristine Courthouse Square.

“It does my heart good to see our youth show respect to our military heroes,” Col. Stone added. “We try

Colonel “Jim” Stone could just as accurately be known as Cannon County’s “Gem” Stone of history.

berland River. These waters that lay north of what became known as the ‘Tennessee Dividing Ridge,’ flowed into the Cumberland River, all being part of this newly created territory. A portion of the Caney Fork River was also included.

This ‘southwest territory’ by the early 1790s consisted only of two pockets of sparsely settled areas that later would be included in a new state called Tennessee. One called the Washington district in the extreme eastern areas of later day east Tennessee. The other, called the ‘Mero’ district, centered mostly around the early settlement at Nashville and outlying areas, both north and possibly a few south of the river Cumberland. All other areas of what later became Tennessee was still controlled by various Native American tribes that still held claim to these future Tennessee lands. Travel between these two pockets of settlements proved to be most challenging for the earliest travelers.

By 1790, the Mero district was only composed of Davidson, Sumner and ‘Tennessee’ counties and had been originally created by North Carolina to provide some type of civil authority in the area. These counties were much larger then today. By 1836, the small town of Danville and some nearby hamlets already had several inns, taverns, storehouses and blacksmiths scattered along this river’s edge of a Stagecoach Road. There was a grist-mill as well as a log church and schoolhouse in the vicinity.

A diary entry from a pas-

senger traveling by stagecoach along this roadway through these upper waters during the year 1827 has been much publicized over the years. After leaving Bates Tavern the stage stopped in the town called Danville. One passenger observed the people were all busy in what was described as ‘town-making.’ The comment was also made that it would be much easier if all these small hamlets combined their efforts to create one good-sized town.

Passengers sometimes reported how lonely the stage ride was through this east fork of the Stones. What was a slow, bumpy and boring ride, this horse drawn coach would make its way through what looked to be row after row of tree stumps along the way, while crossing shallow streams, drop-offs, and mud-holes so deep it would almost capsize the stage itself.

A postal stop had, by 1827, been moved to Danville from a hamlet called Woodville, where a John Wood had served since 1814. When John Wood first settled along these upper waters of the Stones he built a stage stand along a newly built road that took the name, “Stones River Road”. By 1814 the Federal Government designated this stage stand to be a postal stop and John Wood was appointed post master. Also a new Stagecoach Road route had been laid out of the town of McMinnville, mostly over the previously mentioned Stones River Road to better serve ones traveling through these sparsely settled regions of the upper Stones.

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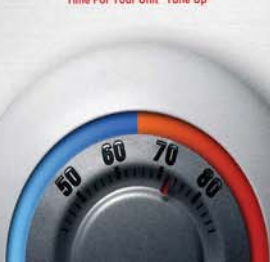
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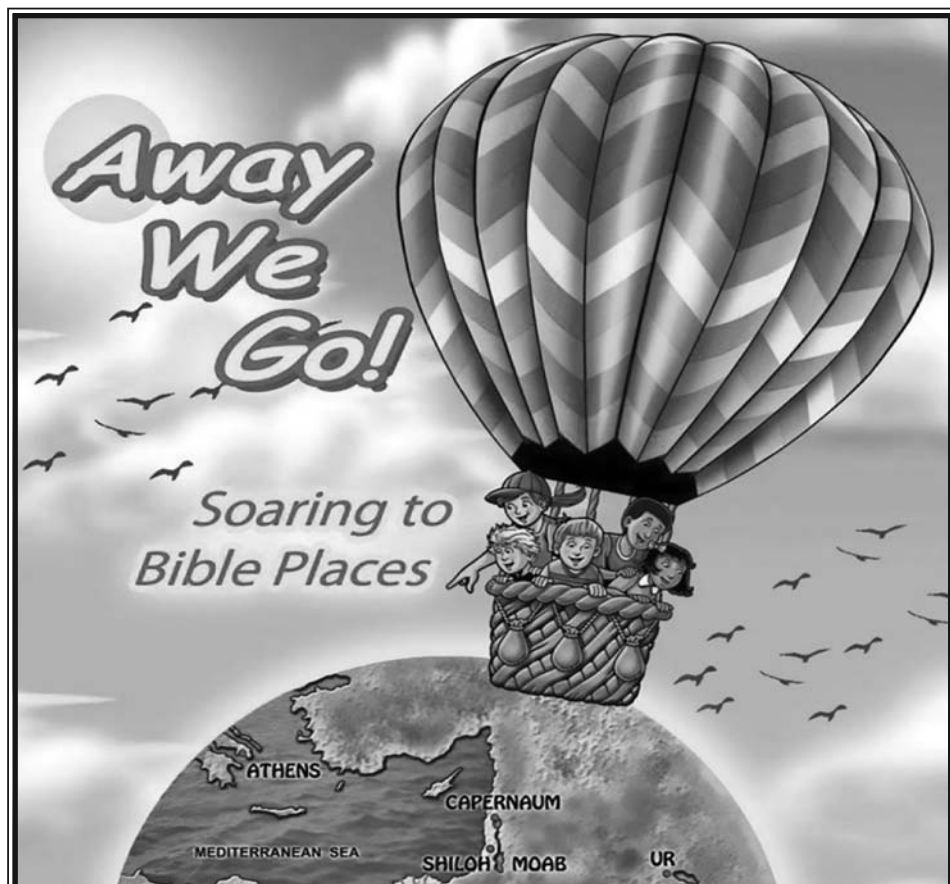

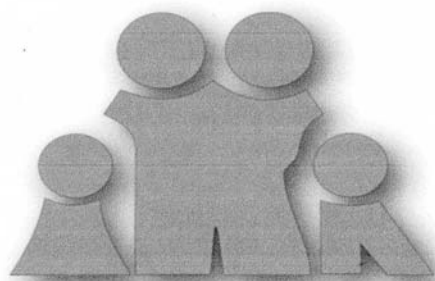

## Jacob's Ladder

Jacob, the son of Isaac and grandson of Abraham, was fleeing from his twin brother Esau, who had vowed to kill him. Esau was furious with Jacob because Jacob had stolen Esau's birthright, the Jewish claim to inheritance and blessing.

On his way to his relative's house at Haran, Jacob lay down for the night near Luz. As he was dreaming, he had a vision of a ladder, or stairway, between heaven and earth. God's angels were on it, ascending and descending.

Jacob saw God standing above the ladder. God repeated the promise of support he had made to Abraham and Isaac. He told Jacob his offspring would be many, blessing all the families of the earth. God then said,

"Behold, I am with you and will keep you wherever you go, and will bring you back to this land. For I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you." (Genesis 28:15, ESV)  
When Jacob awoke, he believed that God was present in that place. He took the stone he had been using to rest his head, poured oil on it and consecrated it to God. Then Jacob made a vow, saying,

"If God will be with me and will keep me in this way that I go, and will give me bread to eat and clothing to wear, so that I come again to my father's house in peace, then the LORD shall be my God, and this stone, which I have set up for a pillar, shall be God's house. And of all that you give me I will give a full tenth to you." (Genesis 28:20-22, ESV)

Jacob called the place Bethel, meaning "house of God."

• In the NIV translation of the Bible, the term "stairway" is used instead of ladder. The word ladder appears in the King James Version, New King James Version, English Standard Version, and New American Standard Bible.

## Drug Violations Continue to keep law enforcement busy

### Cannon County Sheriff’s Office

#### Drug Violations

Deputy Tonya Holland was traveling north on Hollow Springs Road when she observed a small Toyota truck which had veered off the road. Deputy Tommy Barker arrived for backup and the officers questioned the Toyota’s driver, identified as Larry Vann Davis.

Davis told the officers he had swerved to miss a dog in the road and had run into the ditch. Deputy Barker asked Davis for his drivers license and he responded that he didn’t have one. A check with dispatch revealed Davis’s license was revoked. Deputy Barker then approached the passenger’s side of the Toyota where Destiny Thompson was located. The deputy spotted a burnt tablespoon in the floor board.

Deputy Holland then searched Thompson and discovered a baggie containing nine needles. She was subsequently charged with possession of drug paraphernalia. A hearing is set for July 5 in General Sessions Court.

Jeremy Scott Vann, 23, of McMinnville, was arrested on multiple charges after he was apprehended in the parking lot of Bluewing Market with an escaped female juvenile from Memphis who was attempting to set up a methamphetamine drug deal.

The female juvenile, in question, was 14 years old.

Vann was charged with solicitation to commit statutory rape, solicitation to manufacture/sell or delivery Schedule II drugs, possession of Schedule II drugs (meth) in a school

zone, possession of drug paraphernalia and driving on a revoked license.

The juvenile was turned over to the Department of Children Services.

Sheriff Darrell Young searched Vann discovering a short fixed blade knife and a long filet knife stuck inside his boots. A BB pistol was discovered under his car seat along with black zipper case which contained a pipe, a lighter, Q-Tip and a small bag of a crystal substance.

A hearing was set for August 2 in General Sessions Court.

James Logan Taylor and Alecia Kay Shorey were arrested and charged with distributing/selling marijuana. The couple were apprehended in the parking lot behind McDonalds by Investigators Brandon Gullett and Chris Brown. The officers had warrants for Taylor’s arrest. Officers discovered \$1,421 in cash on Taylor’s person. \$200 worth of the cash was money the Sheriff’s Department had used to purchase narcotics, the officers said.

Reid Colby Hartley, 19, of Readyville, was charged with possession of marijuana, oxycodone and Alprazolam. He was also charged with a violation of probation warrant.

#### Burglary

Blake Dean Burton, 25, was charged with burglary, breaking and entering and larceny following the theft of items from a storage unit owned by his parents. Among the items taken were seven guns, three guitars and an Epson home projection system. A hearing is set for July 12

in General Sessions Court. Burton was also charged with several drug offenses by the Woodbury Police Department. He was charged with possession of methamphetamine for resale, possession of drug paraphernalia, simple possession of a Schedule IV drug and possession of contraband in a penal institution by Woodbury Patrolman Tommy Miller.

Jordan works with four developers who are students at Tennessee Technological University in Cookeville. The software was developed two months ago. Since then, Jordan and his team have been working with the Tennessee Alcoholic Beverage Commission, the Nashville Beer Board and other organizations. They have also been working closely with TopShelf EDU in Knoxville, an organization that provides all server training in Tennessee and Alabama.

"I have never seen a scanner I could get excited

SafeSurv is sold to businesses and comes preloaded on a device. Management is able to access analytics which shows trends including what timeframe most inadequate identification is passed and what type. SafeSurv covers all fines if the business is using the software and a false or tainted ID is still passed.

Jordan has been working with The Biz Foundry in Cookeville, an organization that helps entrepreneurs and start-ups by providing resources and mentorship.

"We really like Charlie and his progress as a young entrepreneur. It just never occurred to him that he couldn't do this. Now he is on his way to launching something pretty spectacular," remarked Jeff Brown, The Biz Foundry President.

The Murfreesboro office of Legal Aid Society — which provides high-quality, free legal services and community education to those facing the loss of the basic necessities life — sustained extensive damage following a late-night fire on June 14, 2015. Officials determined that the cause of the fire was arson.

Just hours following the fire, Legal Aid Society moved its operations to a temporary location at 307 Hickerson Drive in Murfreesboro and continued to offer free legal advice, representation and legal clinics to low-income individuals and families in Rutherford and Cannon

## Consumer Tips to Avoid Lawn Care Scams

As we enter lawn care season, the Tennessee Department of Commerce & Insurance’s (TDCI) Division of Consumer Affairs warns Tennesseans to stay savvy when considering lawn care service this summer.

"Consumers and senior citizens should be wary of ‘splash and dash’ salesmen who use high-pressure tactics to trick homeowners into paying big bucks for shoddy workmanship," said TDCI Deputy Commissioner Bill Giannini. The Division of Consumer Affairs offers Tennesseans these tips to help avoid lawn care scams:

Shop around. Request written estimates from more than one lawn care company. Compare quotes, services, products, online customer reviews and ratings.

Understand pricing. Be sure to request a yard inspection and estimate. If the salesperson quotes a price for elaborate lawn service without first conducting a yard inspection, this is a red flag. Be sure you fully understand the pricing and services. Ask if you will be charged by the mow or by the week. What happens if it rains the day you expect lawn service? Does mowing include edging? Will the company mulch or bag

the clippings? Are services performed by employees or subcontractors? Know exactly what you’re getting before you pay.

Check for prior complaints. You may contact the Tennessee Division of Consumer Affairs at consumer.affairs@tn.gov or 800-342-8385 to ask if prior complaints have been reported against the company or salesperson. You may also visit www.bbb.org to see how your local Better Business Bureau reviewed the company.

Scrutinize the contract. Thoroughly review the contract before signing. Does the contract automatically renew from season to season and/or year to year? Does the company offer a warranty and/or guarantee? Does the company offer a cancellation policy? If you choose to sign a long-term contract, request documentation of your cancellation rights in writing, in case you find the services to be unsatisfactory.

### Simple Smartphones for Seniors

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you recommend some smartphones that are specifically designed for seniors? My 75-year-old mother is interested in upgrading from a basic cellphone to a smartphone, but will need one that's very easy to operate.

Inquiring Daughter

Dear Inquiring,

I wrote about this topic just last year, but in the fast changing world of personal technology devices, there's a new crop of simplified smartphones that have recently hit the market that are better than ever for tech-shy seniors. Here are my three top options.

Doro 824 SmartEasy: Offered by Consumer Cellular, the new Doro 824 SmartEasy is one of the best, simplified smartphones available today. It starts with a bright, 5-inch high-resolution touch screen display that offers large icons and text, and customizable volume settings. Its simplified design pairs down the options, providing uncluttered, easy access to key contacts and frequently used features – such as the phone, text messages, the camera email and the Internet – right from the home screen. And, it provides help as you go along from the built-in coach.

It also offers a unique pre-installed My Doro Manager app that can also be downloaded by family or friends. This app provides a number of tutorials showing your mom how to enjoy her phone, and gives her trusted contacts the remote ability to help manage and adjust her Doro smartphone from their smartphone no matter where they are.

And for added convenience and safety, the Doro 824 provides three physical buttons on the front of the phone for quick, one-touch access to the home screen, recently used applications, and a back button that returns to the previous screen. And an "Emergency Alert" button on the back of the phone that will automatically dial one, predetermined contact in the event of an emergency.

The Doro 824 is sold online at ConsumerCellular.com, over the phone at 888-532-5366, or at any Target or Sears store for \$200 with no contract.

Jitterbug Smart: Offered by GreatCall wireless, the new 4th generation Jitterbug Smart is much bigger than previous GreatCall smartphones. This phone is actually an Alcatel smartphone that's been rebranded and loaded with GreatCall's simplified user interface software.

It has a big, bright 5.5-inch high-definition touch screen, and a simple single-list menu on the home page that provides easy access to only frequently used features, along with one-touch access to contacts and other apps.

It also provides convenient voice typing for emails and texts, and offers a variety of optional health and safety features, like MedCoach, that sends medication and prescription refill reminders. Urgent Care, which provides unlimited access to registered nurses and doctors to answer health questions. And a 5Star medical-alert service that lets you speak to a live emergency-alert agent around the clock. These trained agents will confirm your mom's location via GPS tracking technology and dispatch help as needed.

Available online at GreatCall.com, or at Best Buy, Rite Aid, Sears and Walmart stores for \$150 with a onetime \$35 activation fee and no contract.

Samsung Galaxy Note5: While this smartphone isn't designed specifically for seniors, its large size (5.7-inch screen) and unique "Easy" mode setting that boosts the icon and font sizes and simplifies the home-screen layout, makes it a good option.
