Officials stunned by water dept.

Compliance problem now resolved

Town officials were stunned to letter to Mayor Harold Patrick. discover this month the Woodbury Water Department was out legal notice from Tisha Calabrese of compliance with the Tennessee Safe Drinking Water Act.

That letter was a preview of a Benton, director of the Tennessee Division of Water Resources. That bit of news was a shock to Patrick and Board of Aldermen members, including Vice Mayor Charlie Harrell.

The violations date back as far as 2006, 2007, 2012 "with too much turbidity in the water, not reporting what we are supposed to report," the mayor said.

"The bottom line was we didn't know anything about it," Patrick said.

that we produce quality water and that we are sending out reports to where ever they need to be sent. He's top of the class. He knows what he's doing and he's licensed and he is working with us two 16-hours days a week to make sure we are where we should be and our water is drinkthe reports and then there's the question of turbidity, which they didn't notice or overlooked," Patrick said.

"The water coming in out of the source ... the first thing it does is go through filters that are supposed to remove all the foreign matter (turbidity) before

"The Woodbury Water Department has had multiple violations for failure to perform bacteriological monitoring, failure to record and report turbidity monitoring, failure to maintain chlorine residual leaving the plant, failure to distribute Consumer Confidence Reports and a nonacute total coliform maximum contaminant level violation," said Jessica Murphy, manager of the Tennessee Compliance and Enforcement Unit, in a certified

The surprise was expensive and came as hard news for a Water System that was judged as one of the best in the nation a few years ago.

"Our status now is that we have paid a little more than \$6,000 in fines," Mayor Patrick said. "It (the fine) was \$27,000 put we managed to get it down

"What I want people to know above all now is that we are now producing quality water. We're doing everything we're supposed to do," added Vice Mayor Harrell.

Notifications from the state went directly to Alan Paschal, who was public works director. Paschal is no longer a Town of Woodbury employee.

"But now that we have a new guy, Ray Hunt, who works at CUD in Murfreesboro. He's working two days a week with us and he's up here to make sure able," Patrick said.

"We're good right now, but what we have to do hire somebody now that Alan Paschal is gone who knows something about water and can produce good drinking water. That's the bottom line. We are producing good water and we are in compliance," he continued.

Apparently it was Paschal's lack of attention or slowness to act that resulted in two major causes of the reports from the state.

"First, they didn't send out

the water is treated with chlorine. We don't know for certain, but I feel like we've always produced quality water," Harrell said.

The Woodbury Water System was also slow in producing its annual CCR (consumer confidence report). The CCR must contain information for its customers on the quality of water delivered by the system plus report any risk from exposure to contaminants.

Other problems included a failure to report monthly cryptosporidium samples. A cryptosporid-See WATER, Page 9

<u>Guest column</u> **1 year, 95 Counties: A true TN Traveler**

By Commissioner Kevin Triplett Depart. of Tourist Development NASHVILLE – It was on the drive back from Lewis County when I really started thinking about it.

For months I had been traveling this great state of ours, talking about things like the roughly 570 miles across, discussing with partners the diversity of the geography, history, music and attractions. We mapped out the daunting task of observing that diversity first-hand by visiting all 95 counties in a year's time -- to survey what was out there.

Then I thought of Lewis County's namesake; Meriwether Lewis, leader of the Corps of Discovery -- that 4,000-mile, up-and-back journey to survey what was out there.

Suddenly my task did not seem so intimidating.

The plan was to put rubber to the road, meet partners, talk with them about their successes and challenges. Share ideas. The goal was to have a better understanding of those 570 or so miles and all points in between, to be more equipped to tell folks in the rest of the country, and parts of the world, why they should spend time in Tennessee.

Many along the way heard me say I was not surprised by anything but was amazed at every turn.

From Blount and Sevier and Boone and Crockett to Jackson, Johnson and Polk. From Civil War battles fought on our own soil to native son Alvin York fighting in places that a year earlier he probably could not find on a map and still might struggle to pronounce. Our history is as deep and long as the many caves and caverns that run under our grounds and the rivers that flow over them.

From more than 6,500 feet elevation at Clingman's Dome to less than 400 feet above sea level in Tipton County, our offerings are as varied as our landscape.

We stepped back in time in Cumberland Gap and Rugby, La Grange and Granville and saw the future at Discovery Park. In Bradley and Meigs Counties we discussed the resourcefulness of Native Americans and pioneers on the frontier in making tools from inanimate objects and medicine from plants. Fast forward to today and we marveled in the ingenuity of scientists at Oak Ridge.

Staring across Dale Hollow Lake at a Bald Eagle, he majestically took to the air. It was if he was saying, 'you think I am something just sitting here, watch me fly.' Yet another eagle sat in a tree above my head at Fort Donelson. A huge barge chugged up the Cumberland River below us and a cold wind blew. The morning was gray as I stood on the exact spot almost 154 years to the day from when it was altogether different and, I am sure, a lot louder. We "cut the ribbon" on several Civil War Trails markers, including two in Brownsville, commemorating the contribution of more than 200 African-American troops from Haywood County who fought in the conflict and another one detailing the thoughts from the diary of a young Sarah Madison Taylor who witnessed the burning of part of the town. Her words were riveting. It was not in the plan to crawl on my hands and knees in Ruby Falls or stand on a rock ledge way higher than I care to in White County but sometimes one gets caught up in the moment. I stood looking up at the balcony of the Civil Rights Museum (formerly the Lorraine Motel) and I got a tear in my eye. I stood at the grave of Elvis at Graceland ... and I got a tear in my eye. Caught up in the moment again. We all know Goo-Goo Clusters and Moon Pies and Jack and George all originated and still are made today in the great state of Tennessee. But I learned, in the valleys of bottomland of the Upper Cumberland, around Fentress and Pickett Counties, the card game PIG was created. The smell of fried bologna, I believe, can thwart crime but in few places does it smell better than the R.M. Brooks General Store. I have tasted barbecue from all over this state that I hope they have in heaven and fudge that was sinful. I learned the story of Vinegar Pie and tasted a milkshake from one of those old fashioned machines spinning the concoction in

metal tumblers that get so cold ice forms on the outside. All in the name of research, of course.

It was with curious appreciation I watched Jack Martin, holding a handful of straw, manipulate a century-plus-old Willy Wonkalooking contraption his greatgrandfather used and produce a Hockaday Handmade Broom, the Everlasting Gobstopper of housecleaning tools. It is a process so steeped in tradition, so Tennessee, he has sold them to the Smithsonian.

Three-hundred feet underground in Cumberland Caverns I watched modern expertise blend with nature's wonders as technicians, producers, sound engineers swarmed like ants at a picnic to prepare for the taping of Bluegrass Underground. That is thinking outside the box under the earth.

I strolled through Leiper's Fork and sat in a chair in a farmhouse in Bon Aqua where, I was told, Johnny Cash used to relax. I closed my eyes and tried to think where he found the words to his songs. Then I thought of his wife, June Carter Cash, and her mama, Mother Maybelle Carter, Maybelle's cousin Sara and her husband A.P. who were discovered during the Bristol Sessions in 1927. Funny how the mind rolls sometimes, isn't it?

We stood with Governor Haslam on the stage at the Ryman, The Mother Church, and announced the economic impact of tourism on Tennessee. The impact of standing there went deeper than that. In the back of my mind I heard Roy Acuff.

I have heard music: bluegrass, blues, country, soul, southern gospel, rockabilly and rock and roll, from artists ranging from those you have heard of to those who hope you hear of them. And I dare others to try to listen to what I heard and sit still.

Following the steps of Pulitzer and Nobel Prize winners, I wanted to touch the typewriters from which the words poured that have impacted so many. I stood on the steps of Milky Way Farms where Frank Mars (yes that Milky Way and that Mars) built his manor and employed nearly half the men of depression-torn Giles County to help them feed their families.

I stood in places where towns were destroyed by flood or fire and they were moved a couple of miles up the road. I stood in towns destroyed by flood or fire and rebuilt on the same spot. I stood in another that was saved from flood by a vocal group of citizens and First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt.

tiny can produce a bout of watery diarrhea. The water system also failed to monitor Total Organic Carbon in both source water and in treated water. TOC is the amount of carbon found in an organic compound and is often used as a non-specific indicator of water quality.

Letters regarding those problems were sent to Paschal. Either he didn't do anything or he took them down to the treatment plant and they either did or didn't take any action, the mayor said.

"We don't have a paper trail, that's a problem," Patrick said.

"It was a failure to report not necessarily the problem was there," Harrell said.

Another major problem reported by the state was leaks at base and first and second ring joints of the Parker Hill water storage tank. Letters were mailed to Woodbury's Water Department in 2012. 2014 and 2016 regarding the leaks.

'We've got six months to fix the tank on Parker Hill, but the other corrections must be done immediately," Patrick said.

The Board of Aldermen also must act to hire a qualified replacement for Paschal.

"We have taken care of the problem, but it's our duty to make sure the problem stays taken care of," the mayor said.

"We have two operators undergoing certification training right now and that will ease the responsibilities faced right now by parttime director Ray Hunt," he continued. Hunt is a Cannon County resident.

The next step is filling the top management position.

"We already have several applicants, but just one (Hunt) with the certifications required for the job," Patrick said. "You just can't hire anyone for that position. It is very complicated and requires training and expertise."

In fact, the State of Tennessee has already said the city must appoint someone with the proper certification.

and Military Veterans Family Center will be named for legendary country music entertainer Charlie Daniels and his wife, Hazel, President Sidney А. McPhee announced Wednesday.

McPhee surprised the couple with the honor at a private dinner Tuesday night at the President's Residence, where the music icon presented an additional \$70,000 gift to the center from The Journey Home Project.

The donation raises the total support from the veterans-support organization, founded by Charlie Daniels and his longtime manager David Corlew, to \$120,000.

"We are deeply touched and deeply honored," said the singer, who is widely known for his advocacy work for veterans. "I've been blessed to be inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame and, now, having a veterans center named after me."

"This is truly special," Hazel Daniels said to McPhee.

Tennessee The Board of Regents delegates authority for the naming of centers and entities within campus structures at the sole discretion of the president, McPhee said. "This is a responsibility I take very seriously," he said.

McPhee said the support by the Journey Home Project "creates a

legacy for you and your family, where veterans and their families will have the benefit of having such incredible services offered at the Charlie and Hazel Daniels center."

The Journey Home Project assists other not-for-profits in securing funds to benefits veterans and assist in their transition from uniform into civilian life. It was founded by Daniels, Corlew and board members Ed Hardy and Joe and Mercedez Longever.

The project raises funding from individual donors and fundraising events, including the renowned Charlie Daniels Volunteer Jam. The 40th Anniversary Volunteer Jam was last held in August 2015 at Nashville's Bridgestone Arena.

The project seeks to assist veterans partnering "by with organizations that do the most good, with the least overhead," Corlew said.

The president retired Army credited

Lt. Gen. Keith Huber, the university's senior adviser for veterans and leadership initiatives, for his leadership in building the center and establishing MTSU's ties with the project.

"The general helped this university build, in record time, the largest and most comprehensive veterans service center found on a Tennessee university campus," McPhee said. "He continues to serve our nation by helping our more than 1,000 veterans and family members receive the support and services they have earned."

Daniels helped formally open the 2,600-square-foot center on Nov. 5. Located on the first floor of the Keathley University Center, it addresses many of the needs of student-veterans, including academic advising and navigating the paperwork tied to various federal benefits and

financial aid.

Hilary Miller, military spouse and а family member, serves as the center's director. She works alongside U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs employees Heather Conrad with VetSuccess on Campus and Veteran Affairs Coordinator Ray Howell.

The center staff features five full-time staff, including a mental health counselor, and 17 parttime student-veterans, who serve as peer advisers.

The center also has distinctive social space for informal gatherings and study sessions and a conference room for video teleconferencing and employer job interviews.

Daniels has had close ties to MTSU for decades. In 1975, the

second Volunteer Jam was held at MTSU's Murphy Center and in 2009, the university presented him with the Joe M. Rodgers Spirit of America Award,

In the city of Caesarea, a Roman centurion named Cornelius was praying when an angel appeared to him. Although a Gentile (non-Jew), he was a devout man who loved God, prayed, and gave alms to the poor

The angel told Cornelius to send to Joppa, to the house of Simon the tanner, where Simon Peter was staying. He was to ask Peter to come to him at Caesarea. Cornelius' two servants and a loyal soldier set out on the 31 mile journey.

State Fire Marshal Offers Home Fire Safety Tips for Pet Owners Pets and Wild Animals Start an Average of 700 Home Fires Each Year

For many Tennesseans, pets provide comfort, friendship, and unconditional love. Unfortunately, a pet can not only be the victim of a home fire, but the unintentional cause of it as well. The State Fire Marshal's Office wants to educate pet owners on precautions important to keep pets, people, and property safe from fire.

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), pets and wild animals have a part in starting about 700 home fires per year. Roughly three-quarters of these fires were started by cooking equipment, fireplaces or chimneys, lighting, or candles.

The State Fire Marshal's Office offers the following safety tips to prevent pet-related fires:

Pets are curious. They may bump into, turn on, or knock over electrical cords. Have any cooking equipment. A problems checked by a pet accidentally turning on a stove knob is a

leading cause for petstarted house fires. Keep pets away from stoves and countertops. For extra protection, consider removing or protecting knobs stove from activation while you are away.

Keep pets away from candles, lamps, and space heaters. Consider batteryflameless operated, candles. They can look and smell like real candles. Always use a metal or heat-tempered glass screen on a fireplace and keep it in place.

Keep pets away from a chimney's outside vents. Have a "pet-free zone" of at least three feet away from the fireplace. Glass doors and screens can stay dangerously hot for several hours after the fire goes out.

Some pets are chewers. Watch pets to make sure they don't chew through professional. Housing and pens

for outside animals should be located clear of brush, bushes, or other vegetation that could act as fuel for a fire. Outdoor pets should wear or have implanted identification in case they flee your yard or property during a fire. Remember:

Have working smoke alarms on every level of the home. Test your smoke alarms at least once a month. Replace any alarms over 10 years old.

If the smoke alarm sounds, get out and stay out.

Never go back inside for pets in a fire. Tell firefighters if your pet is trapped.

Make sure pets are included in your family's wildfire evacuation plan. Build an evacuation kit for each pet in your household. Ensure each kit is a size and weight that can be quickly and easily

Choosing an Appropriate Walking Cane Dear Savvy Senior.

I have severe arthritis in my knee and could use a walking cane to help me get around. Is there anything I should know about canes before I buy one?

Dear Linda,

When it comes to choosing a cane for balance and support most people don't give it much thought, but they should. Walking canes come in hundreds of different styles, shapes and sizes today, so you need to take into account your needs and preferences to ensure you choose one that's appropriate for you. Here are some tips that can help.

Types of Canes

The first thing you need to consider is how much support you need. That will help you determine the kind of cane you choose. The three basic types of canes you'll have to choose from include:

1. Straight canes: These are basic, single point canes that typically incorporate a rounded "crook" handle or "L-shaped" ergonomic handle. Usually made of lightweight aluminum or wood, most of the aluminum models are adjustable in height and some even fold up.

2. Offset-handle canes: These also are single point straight canes, but come with a swan neck curve in the upper part of the shaft that puts the user's weight directly over the cane tip for added stability. These canes are typically aluminum, adjustableheight and come with a flat, soft grip handle that's easy on the hands.

Both straight canes and offset-handle canes are best suited for people who have a slight walking impairment.

3. Quad canes: Also called broad based canes, these work best for people who need maximum weight bearing and support. Quad canes comes with four separate tips (some have three tips) at the base, they usually have an offset flat handle, and can remain standing when you let go of it which is very convenient. Fitting the Cane

Once you decide on the type of cane, you need to make sure it fits. Stand up with your arms hanging straight down at your side. The top of the cane should line up with the crease in your wrist, so your arm is slightly bent at the elbow when you grip the cane.

The cane should also have a rubber tip at the bottom to prevent slipping. A worn or torn rubber tip is dangerous, so check the tip frequently to ensure it's in good condition and replace it when necessary. Rubber tips come in different sizes depending on the shaft diameter, and can usually be purchased in multipacks at vour local pharmacy.

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The grip is also very important, so choose one that's ergonomically designed, or one that has a molded rubber or foam grip that's comfortable to hold on to.

And if you travel much, consider getting a folding cane that can be packed or stored away easily.

How to Use

When using a cane, it should always be held in the hand opposite of the leg that needs support. For example, if your knee pain is on your left side, you should use the cane in your right hand. The cane should then move forward as you step forward with the bad leg.

If you have to go up stairs, you should lead with the good leg. And when you go down stairs, you should put your cane on the step first and then step down with your bad leg.
