Early voting to begin Oct. 15

Early voting begins Wednesday, Oct. 15 for the State General Election.

Registered voters can cast their ballots early until Oct. 30 at the Cannon County Election Office. Voting will be held from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, from 1 to 6 p.m., on Thursdays and from 9 a.m. until noon on Saturdays.

In addition to the statewide election, several local issues will be of interest to voters in Cannon County.

* First is the Cannon County Board of Education election. Two candidates have qualified for the District Two seat, Frank Walkup and Tim Powers. The district includes Auburntown, Gassaway, Pleasant Ridge and Short Mountain 2.

Cannon County voters will also vote on

an alcohol-related question. Citizens can vote either for or against the legal sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises. If approved, this would allow customers to legally imbibe at local restaurants that meet Tennessee licensing procedures.

* The most controversial of the measures is a resolution dealing with the route of state Route

70S nearly finished

Trouble with a gas line is among the issues that pushed back completion of the new four-lane version of U.S. 70S between Woodbury and McMinnville.

"The project was supposed to be completed by the end of September, but we are currently looking at a time extension for the contractor. It may be completed sometime in November." said Jennifer A. Flynn, Regional Community Relations Officer, Tennessee Department of Transportation

"There is still a lot of work remaining on the project and there was an unexpected issue with a gas line that recently came

TVA sets rate hike on Oct. 1

Beginning Oct. 1, the Tennessee Valley Authority will raise their rates for electricity. That increase is an increase of approximately 1.5 percent, or \$2, to the average residential member of Middle Tennes-

see Electric.

In an effort to help keep rates affordable, MTEMC will pass this adjustment through beginning Oct. 1. The change in rates is not beyond what TVA is charging, but is designed to keep costs affordable for members. The adjustment will come in an increased customer charge, taking it from \$13.75 to \$15.75,

"I'll go on your shoulders to show you there's nothing there," he said. And he got ready to be carried on the backs to the graveyard.


When they came near enough to hear the cracking, they walked stealthily



It's time to stand up for a great cause, 'Whittlemania'

What is Whittlemania? Why is it important? How can you get involved?

"Whittlemania" dates back to 1994 when then Daily News Journalist columnist Dan Whittle became involved with Habitat for Humanity.

He was approached by a fellow employee Ben Weber, who had been diagnosed with brain cancer in his early 20s. Whittle recalled it was on a "blustery cold, sleet- rain-filled wintry night" when Weber approached him at a gas station and asked him to say a prayer for him. He told Dan of his plight and the two prayed together, and both left the gas station with tears in their eyes.

The prayer and the disease that struck Weber really touched Whittle, who is now a regular contributor for The Post and Cannon Courier.

So, the next day he called Jack Goodrich, who was a founder of the lost Habitat for Community chapter and shared the night's previous story.

The rest is local history.

Goodrich, with some serious help from our wonderful community, helped see that Weber's Habitat for Humanity house was built for the family he left behind. Weber lived within two weeks of seeing it

The next year the cause of building housing became known as "Whittlemania." It came about when restaurant

owners Jim Demos and Wade Hays agreed to launch the annual event to fund new Habitat houses. Along with Whittle, Demos and Hays then enlisted the support of DNJ President Ron Fryar and for 14 more years, homes were built in La Vergne, Smyrna and Murfrees-

"Whittlemania" was discontinued in 2009 upon the death of Doris Demos, who was the wife of Jim.

Fast forward five years and "Whittle-

mania" is back!

With the blessing of Murfreesboro's Peter D's Restaurant, "Whittlemania" is being resurrected to benefit the Tennessee Fisher House.

Why is it important today? As now Post and Courier Publisher

Fryar says, "It was ever so much the right thing to do and be involved with in 1994 just as it is today in 2014. We are once again humbled to be asked to participate as primary media sponsors."



Watch for fescue toxicosis

Fescue toxicosis is still a cattle problem for producers in Tennessee and beyond during the summer months. Photo courtesy UTIA.

Fescue is the primary for cow-calf production in Tennessee and the upper Mid-South. It is the source of both pasture and hay, yet in spite of the contribution fescue makes to the cow-calf industry, the problem of fescue toxicosis still results in reduced cattle performance.

The greatest problem with fescue occurs during the months summer and extends into the fall. University of Tennessee Extension beef specialist Jim Neel refers to this period as the "summer slump."

"Here in Tennessee, when the grass goes to seed, the endophyte concentration is the greatest," Neel says.

"Early grazing pressure in the spring and harvesting fescue for hay before it goes to seed will aid in reducing the concentration of the endophyte," recommends. Neel adds that producers should try to get fescue cut in the "boot stage" - that is while the grass flower is still in the sheath. Grazing pressure can also contribute to the

temperature is the toxic effect of the endophyte, "Consider Neel said. weaning and conditioning the calf crop for marketing. Generally, the gain of the calves is very poor due to reduced forage availability and quality as well as milk production of the dams. However, if weaned and fed concentrate ration, the calves will efficiently convert the feed to gain. "On-the-farm" field trials conducted here Tennessee several years ago support these recommendations, he adds.

The cattle specialist says mature cows get along well on summer's lower quality forage, and they gain both weight and body condition, help which with reproduction. Research done over five or more decades at Southeastern land-grant universities demonstrates maintaining 30 percent clover in fescue stands improves the performance of the cattle.

Neel adds that there is no silver bullet that can replace management of fescue and cattle to reduce the effect of the endophyte. "There are times in the annual production cycle of fescue that the grass quality is better and this can be capitalized on appropriate cattle and forage management," he said.

"Grandma is that you?" - Fraud and Financial Abuse Awareness Month

A ringing phone breaks the silence in the calm dead of night. A sleepy voice answers "Hello?" "Grandma is that you? I'm in trouble and need your help." The beginning of a fascinating mystery novel? - not quite. But for many seniors it is the beginning of a true nightmare. This is just one of the many financial fraud schemes currently targeting our older population.

The scammer calls in the middle of night when grandma or grandpa is disoriented from sleep. It could be their grandchild's voice they hear on the other end of the phone; they're not quite sure so they ask questions. The scammer has all the right

How do they do it? Scammers gather names and other details about family members from obituaries, Facebook, Instagram, and even ancestry websites. They call pretending to be beloved grandchildren who are in trouble in a faraway location - arrested, hospitalized they need money wired to them now, and plead with grandma to not tell their parents! Grandparents naturally want to help and according to AARP.org, grandparents of college-aged young

people are the most frequent targets, 'helping' to the tune of \$110 million a year in losses.

October is Fraud and Financial Abuse Awareness Month in Tennessee - now's the time to get the word out about schemes that can financially cripple our older population. Here are some of the current schemes at work (as listed on aarp.org and fbi.gov):

Charity schemes: When help is needed, older people are often among the first to open their hearts and wallets. This helps make them the group most vulnerable to scams feigning aid for veterans, needy or

Internet fraud: As web use among senior citizens increases, so does their chances to fall victim to Internet fraud. Internet Fraud includes non-delivery of items ordered online and credit and debit card scams.

"The following question is for advisory purposes only. No legal effect shall result from the adoption or rejection of any route," states the resolution.

Three alternatives have been suggested. The Center Route follows the current road through downtown Woodbury. The northern path goes north of town and near Stones River Hospital. The third path travels south near Houston Hills subdivision connecting into state Route

53 near Cannon Market. Voters will also cast ballots in the gubernatorial, U.S. Senate and Congress and state Senate and Legislature races.

In the governor's race, Republican incumbent Bill Haslam faces Democratic nominee Charlie Brown and five other challengers independent including

candidate John Jay Hooker. In the Senate race, incumbent Lamar Alexander is challenged by Democrat Gordon Ball and

10 other candidates. Congressman Diane Black, R-6th District, is squared off against Democrat Amos Scott Powers and Independent Mike Winton.

State Sen. Mae Beavers is unapposed in the 17th Tennessee Senatorial District.

State Rep. Mark Pody is being challenged by Democrat Candace Reed for the 46th District seat.

Constitutional Four Amendments are also on the ballot.

Constitutional Amendment #1 would insert constitutional language empowering the Tennessee Legislature to enact, amend or repeal state statutes regarding abortion, including for pregnancies resulting from rape or incest or when necessary to protect the mother's life.

This amendment began as Senate Joint Resolution 127 sponsored by state Sens. Mae Beavers and Diane Black, who was serving as a state senator at the time of the bill's

Constitutional Amendment #2 asks voters to officially accept the judicial selection system for 29 state appellate court judges that is already in place -- by statute, but not in the state Constitution -with one modification. That modification is that if the Legislature does not act to confirm one way or the other within 60 days, the governor's appointment is

automatically confirmed. Constitutional Amendment #3 would permanently ban any new state or local personal income or payroll tax in Tennessee.

Constitutional Amendment #4 would let many veterans organizations like the VFW and American Legion join the list of nonprofit groups allowed to hold annual charitable gaming fundraisers.

Memphis is no longer just about barbecue. I know many of us drive there to see Beale Street or eat at iconic places like Vergo's Rendevous and Gus's Famous Fried Chicken, but there is much more to the Memphis food scene these days. If you want great barbecue, you know you can find it in Memphis-from pulled pork to Memphis' famous barbecue spaghetti. Of course, there has always been the Peabody with their ducks and special dining opportunities. But did you know there are some serious chefs creating farm to table experiences, giving back to the community in unique ways and making the Memphis food scene richer, brighter and fresher? I have several suggestions for any foodie trip to Memphis, in addition to the aforementioned icons. Take a quick weekend trip to Memphis with me and enjoy a few of my beloved stops.

First, never ignore the icons. Make a reservation at the Rendevous and you can't go wrong. They were originally a ham and cheese sandwich place, so if you start with one of their appetizer plates, you will be enjoying a bit of their original history. Everybody knows they are most famous for their barbecue ribs. Charcoal grilled with a dry rub, they are one of the Memphis favorites. However, if you venture out of the norm a bit, you can find some other gems, like their charcoal grilled lamb ribs or their giant skillet of barbecue shrimp. You have to call ahead ((901)523-2746) for the shrimp, and I suggest doing so early in the week. Also, I would head there early on a Friday night if you canthey don't take reservations and fill up fast!

Next, there is no better place for Saturday lunch than Karen Carrier's Beauty Shop Restaurant. It is literally set in an old Beauty Shop, complete with those beehive hair dryers-and was the spot where Priscilla Presley got her hair done back in the day. The menu is the real treat here, featuring flavors from all over the world. If

salads are your thing, you can't go wrong with a Thai Cobb Salad-all the usual Cobb ingredients blended with crispy duck, mangoes and a mint Green Goddess dressing reminiscent of that 1950's favorite. Or perhaps try the Grilled Romaine, paired with Ripley tomato, crisp bacon and spicy pecans. If you lust after a really good sandwich, this place is a paradise. They have an amazing sandwich they call The Beastie Boy and I call roast beef heavenwith sharp horseradish, roasted red peppers, lemony aioli and a warm au jus dipping sauce. There are also traditional New York lunch options like a real pastrami sandwich and a luscious Rueben. But for the lighter diner, perhaps a succulent smoked salmon club sandwich or a mouthwatering bacon, lettuce and tomato sandwich with avocado are more appealing. Desserts are 1950's standardshomemade shakes, scrumptious cakes and ice cream floats dominate. You get the idea-lunch at the Beauty Shop is a wonderful adventure, not to be missed!

After your lunch, you may want to pick up some culinary prizes for foodie friends back home. I would head to Phillip Ashley Chocolates or to Muddy's Bake Shop. Phillip Ashley Rix, one of the world's great chocolatiers, offers up some uniquely Memphis takes on chocolate. He offers the Memphis Truffle Collection-that features a truffle for every flavor you would find dining in a Memphis barbecue joint, including Memphis BBQ, Mama Jean Sweet Potato, CocoLoco and Arnie (half sweet tea caramel and half lemonade Ganache.) His chocolate bacon has been much copied, but never equaled. At Muddy's Bake Shoppe, Kat Gordon and her team bake things we can only wish our grandmothers had made. They have some ridiculously rich toffee bars and an amazing array of other cookies. If you are visiting folks in Memphis, a pie or a dozen cupcakes from Muddy's is the perfect hostess gift, and yummier than any bottle

Dinner on Saturday will take some advance planning, as I don't want you to miss a chance to enjoy the amazing atmosphere and outstanding hospitality at Felicia Suzanne. It is popular enough that reservations are important. Here, Felicia Willett has created the perfect blend of farm fresh foods with beautiful décor which defines modern Southern dining. While she may have worked with Emeril in New Orleans, her restaurant is truly her own. Her appetizers are inventive and delightfully Southern, like Felicia's famous deviled eggs with smoked salmon topped with Arkansas's Kelly Catch Caviar or her Gulf Oysters of Love (crispy oysters with Delta Grind Grits and New Orleans Barbecue sauce.) The menu is peppered with references to the source of ingredients, such as the tomato salad made with Robert Tims's Heirloom tomatoes and Woodson Ridge Farm's baby tomatoes, the Georgia Bobwhite Quail with dirty rice dressing, caramelized sweet potatoes and bourbon syrup or their creamy macaroni and cheese made with Sweetwater Farms cheddar from right here in Middle Tennessee. All of this attention to detail and care shows in the beautiful plates and the fabulous flavors. It is one of the truly great places for a memorable meal in the

Finally, there is the Majestic Grille, known as the spot for dramatic dining. Here, in the heart of a grand old movie theatre, owners Patrick and Deni Reilly have brought a bit of old Hollywood glamour to the Memphis dining scene. They are locally known as supporters of the arts, and pride themselves on helping art organizations grow. They even pioneered a special program for music students at the University of Memphis to help students gain exposure to working in a professional performance environment. So Sunday Brunch could also mean enjoying a live performance of jazz or blues

along with the best brunch in town. While they do serve the standard Southern fare of biscuits and gravy, shrimp and grits and eggs and bacon, brunch also includes six signature flatbreads (think mushrooms or grilled artichoke) and sandwiches (try their grilled aged cheddar cheese sandwich with local tomatoes, bacon and creole mustard on artisan bread.) French toast, pancakes and steak and eggs are offered up alongside distinctive items like smoked salmon hash and vegetable frittatas with goat cheese and Parmesan. This is really the best way to end a lovely Memphis weekend!

Now I know we can't all get away for a trip to Memphis, so I am leaving you with Felicia Suzanne's deviled egg recipe to try

House Smoked Salmon Deviled Eggs with Arkansas White River Caviar

1 dozen large eggs salt freshly ground black pepper 1/4 to 1/2 cup mayonnaise 4 ounces Smoked Salmon, flaked Hot Sauce

1 ounce, Arkansas White River Caviar In a saucepan, add the eggs and cover with water. Add a pinch of salt. Bring the water to a boil and cook for 2 minutes. Remove from the heat and cover for 11 minutes. Remove the eggs from water and place in a bowl of ice water. Allow eggs to sit for 8 minutes. Remove and peel the eggs. Slice each egg in half and add the volks to a bowl. With a fork, smash all of the egg yolks. Add the mayonnaise, one spoonful at a time and mix until smooth. Season with salt and hot sauce. Fold in the smoked salmon and mix well. **If you like your eggs creamy add a little more of the mayonnaise. Place on a serving tray and garnish with the caviar.

SHOES The first item of business when beginning your walking program is to select the right pair of shoes. Dr. McAndrews recommends the following tips: Make sure the shoes you purchase fit properly. The balls of your feet should rest exactly at the point where the toe end of the shoe bends during walking. Avoid high-top shoes, that, often cover the entire ankle, limiting your foot's ability to move freely and naturally. Opt instead for shoes that offer your ankle a fuller range of motion. Select shoes with plenty of cushioning in the soles to absorb the impact

of your walking. GETTING STARTED Walking just 12 minutes every other day can offer important health benefits. Walking 20 minutes every other day is even better. But in order to increase your longevity, try to eventually work up to 30 minutes, five days per week. The

following tips should help

you get started safely and

smoothly: Move your arms freely, in coordination with the opposite leg.

' Don't stoop your head or look down as you walk. This will challenge the normal forward curve of your neck, which, in turn, will cause you to carry your

weight improperly. Don't carry weights or dumbbells while walking. They're better used as a separate part of your exercise regimen. If you do carry weights while walking, be sure that they are light enough that they do not interfere with the "rhythm" of your arms and legs; in order to counterbalance the body, when your right arm moves forward, the left leg should

be moving forward, etc. " Expect a little soreness in the thighs and calves for the first week or two. If you experience more than soreness, check with your doctor of chiropractic.

" Walk briskly, with Simply "purpose." "sauntering," while relaxing and enjoyable, is not an effective form cardiovascular exercise.

Keep in mind that, if you have not previously been physically active, you should consult your doctor before. Begin slowly with a walk of perhaps half of a mile at a pace that does not cause discomfort. Continue this for about two weeks, then start to increase the pace and length of time walking. Eventually depending on your age you can build your "target" heart rate/pulse to either 120 beats per minute or, if younger, as many as 140 beats per minute. For the average adult, a heart rate of 120 beats per minute would require walking at

about 2 miles per hour,



while a heart rate of 140 beats per minute would require a pace of 4 1/2 miles per hour.

HYDRATION Drink 10 eight-ounce glasses of water a day to help keep the kidneys active, dilute and remove toxins from the body, and replace lost fluids. (Coffee, tea, soft drinks and alcohol are diuretics/dehydrators. Don't substitute them for water.) If you perspire during walking, you may need to drink even more.

SURFACES walking surfaces are better than others on your musculoskeletal system. Walking on a cushioned or rubberized track is ideal, because the cushioning of this type of track absorbs most of the impact of your walking. Many recreation centers offer this type of track free of charge. Grass is another good surface, but watch out for hidden dips or holes in the ground. Walking on a surface with no give, such as concrete or a mall floor, is not your best choice, because this type of surface will not absorb much of the impact your body will experience. If you do choose to walk on such a surface, be extra careful to select highly cushioned

Lions suffer 28-6 setback against Macon Co.

Cannon County displayed a hard-hitting and physical style of defense in its Homecoming game against Macon County but the Lions couldn't muster enough offense in a 28-6 setback at Schwartz Field Friday (Oct. 3).

Cannon County (0-6, 0-2) suffered its 25th consecutive home loss dating back to 2009.

The Lions' defense has been representative for most of the six games played to date and Friday was no exception.

The scrappy unit had three takeaways, forced two turnover on downs getting off of the field on fourth-down tries and came up with five sacks.

Austin Brock had one of his best all-around games with an interception and a fumble recovery. Ethan Smith forced a fumble, had a sack and six tackles. A.J. Daniel continued his outstanding defensive play with a game-high 12 tackles. Stellar sophomore linebacker Eldon Resco also had another strong outing with 10 tackles and a sack. Case

Isenhart, Brock and Smith each had six tackles.

Cannon County's defensive efforts kept the team in the game but the Lions could never get into an offensive rhythm. Starting quarterback Jake Walkup was sidelined

with an injury and Josh Walkup got the nod under center. The only offensive highlight was two big pass plays from Walkup to Wilder Mankin.

Trailing 28-0, Walkup dropped back and fired a spiral to a streaking Mankin who caught the ball in stride 40 yards downfield and outran the Macon County defenders for a 71-yard scoring strike.

It was one of two big plays to Mankin who also had a 61-yard reception in the first half. In fact, the turning point in the game likely occurred following Mankin's first big play.

Trailing 7-0 midway through the second quarter, Walkup completed a short pass to Mankin who did the rest of the work as he jetted 61 yards before being chased down at the 6. The Lions moved the ball to the 4 but a holding penalty moved them back and Walkup fumbled on the next play to end the scoring threat.

Macon County converted the turnover into a touchdown as it marched 88 yards in six plays and scored on freshman quarterback Seth Carlisle's 30-yard run. Carlisle ran for

four touchdowns and 107 yards in the Macon County win. Macon County scored on its opening drive but the Lions kept them off of the board until the late score in the second quarter.

The people retain the right through their elected state representatives and state senators to enact, amend, or repeal statutes regarding abortion, including, but not limited to, circumstances of pregnancy resulting from rape or incest or when necessary to save the life of the mother.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in accordance with Article XI, Section 3 of the Constitution of the State of Tennessee, the foregoing proposed amendment shall be submitted to the people at the next general election in which a Governor is to be chosen, the same being the 2014 November general election, and the Secretary of State is directed to place such proposed amendment on the ballot for that election.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 2

A RESOLUTION proposing amendment of Article VI, Section 3 of the Constitution of Tennessee, relative to judges of the appellate courts.

WHEREAS, Senate Joint Resolution No. 710 of the One Hundred Seventh General Assembly, which proposed amendment of Article VI, Section 3 of the Constitution of Tennessee, relative to judges of the appellate courts, was considered and agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each of the two houses, as shown by the yeas and nays entered on their journals; and

WHEREAS, on Sunday, May 6, 2012, such resolution proposing such amendment was published in compliance with Article XI, Section 3 of the Constitution of Tennessee; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING, that a two-thirds majority of all the members elected to each house concurring, as shown by the yeas and nays entered on their journals, that it is proposed that Article VI, Section 3 of the Constitution of Tennessee be amended by deleting the first and second sentences and by substituting instead the following:

Judges of the Supreme Court or any intermediate appellate court shall be appointed for a full term or to fill a vacancy by and at the discretion of the governor; shall be confirmed by the Legislature; and thereafter, shall be elected in a retention election by the qualified voters of the state. Confirmation by default occurs if the Legislature fails to reject an appointee within sixty calendar days of either the date of appointment, if made during the annual legislative session, or the convening date of the next annual legislative session, if made out of session. The Legislature is authorized to prescribe such provisions as may be necessary to carry out Sections two and three of this article.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in accordance with Article XI, Section 3 of the Constitution of Tennessee, the foregoing proposed amendment shall be submitted to the people at the next general election in which a governor is to be chosen, the same being the 2014 November general election, and the secretary of state is directed to place such proposed amendment on the ballot for that election.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 1

A RESOLUTION to amend Article II, Section 28 of the Constitution of Tennessee, to prohibit taxation upon payroll or earned personal income.

WHEREAS, this resolution shall be known as the "No State Income Tax" Amendment; and

WHEREAS, not having a state income tax has brought jobs to Tennessee, and clarifying this prohibition will help Tennessee become the number one state in the southeast for high quality jobs; and

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 28 of the Constitution of Tennessee currently prohibits the levying of a tax on any class of income other than income derived from stocks and bonds; and

WHEREAS, in 1932, in the case of <u>Evans v. McCabe</u>, 52 S.W.2d 159; once again in 1960, in the case of <u>Jack Cole Co. v. MacFarland</u>, 337 S.W.2d 453; and still again in 1964, in the case of <u>Gallagher v. Butler</u>, 378 S.W.2d 161; the Tennessee supreme court unanimously ruled that the General Assembly lacks constitutional authority to levy a state tax on any class of income other than income derived from stocks and bonds; and

WHEREAS, the aforementioned decisions of the Tennessee supreme court have never been overruled; and

WHEREAS, clearly, the General Assembly can neither exercise nor delegate authority it lacks; and

WHEREAS, any tax measured by an individual's earned income, an employee's salary, or an employer's payroll would be harmful to Tennesseans and is contrary to the longstanding public policy of this state and its political subdivisions; and

WHEREAS, by this proposed amendment, the General Assembly seeks to clarify the language by which the Constitution of Tennessee currently prohibits the levying of a tax on any class of income other than income derived from stocks and bonds; and

WHEREAS, Senate Joint Resolution No. 221 of the One Hundred Seventh General Assembly, which proposed amendment of Article II, Section 28 of the Constitution of Tennessee, to prohibit taxation upon payroll or earned personal income, was considered and agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each of the two houses, as shown by the yeas and nays entered on their journals; and

WHEREAS, on Sunday, May 6, 2012, such resolution proposing such amendment was published in compliance with Article XI, Section 3 of the Constitution of Tennessee; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE ONE HUNDRED EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING, that a two-thirds majority of all the members of each house concurring, as shown by the yeas and nays entered on their journals, that it is proposed that Article II, Section 28 of the Constitution of Tennessee be amended by adding the following sentence at the end of the final substantive paragraph within the section:

Notwithstanding the authority to tax privileges or any other authority set forth in this Constitution, the Legislature shall not levy, authorize or otherwise permit any state or local tax upon payroll or earned personal income or any state or local tax measured by payroll or earned personal income; however, nothing contained herein shall be construed as prohibiting any tax in effect on January 1, 2011, or adjustment of the rate of such tax.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in accordance with Article XI, Section 3 of the Constitution of Tennessee, the foregoing proposed amendment shall be submitted to the people at the next general election in which a governor is to be chosen, the same being the 2014 November general election, and the secretary of state is directed to place such proposed amendment on the ballot for that election.



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

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
