

Everyone's 'Bud'

Tireless servant Mitchell's got heart of gold

Bud Mitchell, the master mechanic who runs Bud Tire Pros on Woodbury Pike about four miles east of the Murfreesboro square, knows tires better than Colonel Sanders knows chickens. But he's also got a pretty good grasp of what makes folks tick.

The college drop-out possesses a doctorate in doing good to his fellow man, a trait he earned as a youth working in his father's grocery store in the 1940s and '50s.

"I got to meet people, got to know them. We had an old Warm Morning heater in the store, and in the winter the old men would come in and sit around, and I learned a lot listening to older people, and I got a good education. I met some of the finest people there ever was," says the smiling Mitchell, who has a knack of leaving people with an easy feeling after they spend a few minutes around him.

The optimistic businessman was born Glenn Wilson Mitchell in 1941 in a work environment, his father' store in Barfield. Five years later his dad opened a new grocery store, on the site of today's Wilson-Mitchell Hardware.

"My granddaddy, A.H. Wilson, ran a store on Franklin Road, and he helped my daddy by loaning him \$600 to get his store. That was why he used the

name Wilson & Mitchell because my granddaddy had credit," said Bud.

"I grew up helping in that store across the road. I never did like school," he says, noting that his mother Alice was a schoolteacher at Kittrell and McFadden Central and his sister Judy became an educator who taught in Fort Worth,

You need a place of your own. Somewhere you can do your work and not be disturbed," said Nurse Victoria Fletcher. "This place. Where is it?" asked Dr. Zander "Just drive south. Don't stop until we get to Tennessee," she said. Nurse Fletcher's place was an abandoned shirt factory in Auburntown, a town so rural you couldn't even find it on a map. It was perfect. They didn't even have a police department. Stocked with to-go baskets of chicken sandwiches and ice-cold Coca-Colas from the nearby diner, they unchained the gate and pulled to the rear of the factory."

The production involves 40 actors in the 20,000 square foot building.


and support of our Red Cross and the countless **MTSU** volunteers, students, administrators, faculty, staff community supporters."







This ghost tale based in reality

One of Tennessee's most famous ghost stories involves a mysterious rider at Stones River Battlefield.

The rider in question is said to be the ghost of Lt. Col. Julius P. Garesche, who died near the railroad line just past the current site of Stones River National Cemetery. A sign marks the site where Garesche fell from his mount.

On the afternoon of Dec. 31, 1862, Gen. William S. Rosecrans was riding along Union Army lines near the Round Forest. Accompanying him was his popular, but humble chief of staff Garesche.

Capt. Henry Semple of Semple's Alabama Battery spotted the officers and told a gunner to fire at them. A round of solid shot missed Rosecrans, but struck Garesche, decapitating him. Garesche's blood and brains covered the commanding general.

Garesche's horse galloped another 20 yards before his body fell off near the tracks of the Nashville and Chattanooga

After dusk, Garesche's West Point classmate, Brig. Gen. William S. Hazen searched for his body. Hazen discovered it and recovered his West Point ring and his well-read Catholic devotional, "Imitation of Christ."

"I chanced to pass the spot where he lay. He was alone, no soldier - dead nor living – near him. I saw but a headless trunk: an eddy of crimson foam had issued where his head should be," Hazen

"I at once recognized his figure, it lay so naturally, his right hand across his breast. As I approached, dismounted, and bent over him, the contraction of a muscle extended the hand slowly and

slightly towards me," Hazen said. His classmate found Garesche's hand

Hazen took the West Point class ring from Garesche's finger and his

still warm and lifelike.

devotional from his pocket. "There was no time for tears," the general wrote.

Hazen and a group of volunteers then buried Garesche in a temporary battlefield grave. The rare nighttime

burial became fodder for newspaper stories in Union states. A marker near the railroad tracks not

far from Stones River National Cemetery memorializes his death site.

While it was not rare for soldiers to be decapitated by cannon fire, Garesche's story won national attention due to a series of strange omens that preceded his fall moments into his first battle.

Some 21 years earlier, Garesche had just graduated from West Point and was visiting his father in St. Louis. His father, as the tale goes, had just come into possession of 2,000 acres of land lying at the junction of the Mississippi and

Missouri Rivers. Woodcutters and squatters beset the land so the elder Garesche dispatched

Settling in for the night, Julius was awakened by the sudden collapse of the cabin into the mighty river. He and his compatriots barely escaped disaster. When told the story, Julius' brother Frederick interpreted the near death experience as an omen of disaster.

The comments of Frederick, who was training for the priesthood, made a strong impression on his brother. A series of life-ending "near misses" compounded Julius' fears and as the years past, he became more and more involved in mysticism.

Seeking relief from his worries, Garesche became involved in the Society of St. Vincent of Paul, an organization aimed at relieving the suffering among the poor. But as the outbreak of war approached, Julius found himself on the opposite side from many of his Southern relatives. During a heated discussion with an associate, Garesche called his Confederate relatives turncoats and damned them to a living hell.

This out-of-character performance caused Julius to seek out the advice of his brother once again. By this point, his brother Frederick was now a Catholic priest of some prominence.

This sin caused his brother, Father Frederick, to predict Julius' death in his first battle. Frederick set an 18-month timetable for his brother's demise.

At first, Julius refused to accept his brother's prediction. He was, after all, a staff officer who would not be called into combat. But by April of 1862, he began to seek a field commission. His attempts were foiled until his West Point friend, Rosecrans, was appointed to lead the Army of the Cumberland.

On Nov. 5, 1862, Garesche was appointed chief of staff, Army of the Cumberland. He quickly became Rosecrans' closest confidant.

His last day on earth came soon after with the Army of Cumberland marching from Nashville to Murfreesboro. On the morning of Dec. 31, 1862, Garesche joined in the celebration of High Mass with the Rev. Father Cooney of the 55th Indiana Regiment officiating.

All to soon, it became obvious that the Confederates had beaten Rosecrans to the punch on a surprise attack and the Union Army was quickly falling back. As Rosecrans paused to determine a course of action, Garesche took a moment for prayer in a small grove of trees. He quickly rejoined Rosecrans and quickly rode off to his fate 15 months after his brother's pronouncement.

the shooting Apparently the names were not linked to the shootings, but were part of an on-going shouting-match over who is,

you're a beta, what you have to do to be-

come an alpha. Some people post threats

on the site and others reply, sometimes offering

encouragement to the original poster.

As with most Internet discussions, it's hard to differentiate what simply is a rant and what is a real threat. But what makes 4chan different from most social media sites is users are not required to use any kind of identification. This anonymity has led to a myriad of rants from the extreme ends of the political and social spectrum, as well as claims of responsibility for numerous shootings and threats of violence.

And now the FBI is investigating the site to see if there are any connections to





'Pistol Pete' Part 2: Shootin' from the hip!

"Best ball-handler of all time" (reference: Boston Celtics' (guard John Havlicek: 8-time National Basketball Association/NBA champion, NBA Finals MVP, 13-time NBA All-Star).

"Best showman and ballhandler ever" (reference: Detroit Pistons' guard Isaiah Thomas: 2-time NBA champion, NBA Finals MVP, 12-time NBA All-Star).

"He was the original showtime" (reference: Los Angeles Lakers' guard Earvin "Magic" Johnson: 5-time NBA champion, 3-time NBA Finals MVP, 12-time NBA All-Star).

If you recall, in my last column I wrote about Frank "Pistol Pete" Eaton, an Oklahoma-based gunslinger, who by the age of 17 was considered one of the quickest draws (reportedly faster than "Buffalo Bill Cody") anywhere there was any pistol-totin'-gunslingin' action going down. Too, at the age of 17 Eaton became a U.S. Marshal in 1877, possibly the youngest in American History. Frank "Pistol Pete" Eaton sealed his legacy when he, still at age 17, walked into a saloon in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and shot it out with the remnants of the notorious Ferber-Campsey gang, who had cold-bloodedly murdered Frank Eaton's father when Frank was a mere 8-yearsold.

That said let's trade the dusty plains of Oklahoma for the "hardwoods" of men's Collegiate Division 1 and NBA basketball, more

specifically a "gunman" named Peter Press "Pistol Pete" Maravich. Born June 22, 1947, in Aliquippa, Pennsylvania, Peter developed an interest in basketball at a very young age near-obsessively spending hours practicing ball-control tricks, passes, head fakes, and longrange shots. Maravich's ball-handling skills reached such a degree that, reportedly, "neighbors remember seeing Pete dribbling a basketball outside the passenger window of a moving car driving at 20 miles per hour" (reference: "Sixty Cool Pistol Pete Facts").

Peter Maravich entered Louisiana State University/ LSU the fall of 1966 on a basketball scholarship. Back in 1966, freshmen did not play with the varsity, and, instead, were confined to playing with the freshman team against freshmen teams from other universities. However, when Peter Maravich took to the hardwood floor his sophomore year, fall of 1967, the world of basketball would never be the same. Playing for his father Press Maravich, LSU's head coach, Peter would average 43.8 points per game for the 1967-1968 season, 44.2 per game for the 1968-1969 season, and 44.5 points per game for the 1969-1970 season, averaging 44.2 points per game for his 3-year varsity collegiate career, an all-time record that still stands. Expectedly, Peter Maravich made First Team All-American in men's Division 1 collegiate basketball all three varsity seasons at LSU.

Maravich joined the NBA during the 1970-1971 Season, drafted by the Atlanta Hawks, for whom he played 1970-1974, then playing for the New Orleans Jazz 1974-1980,

retiring, due to injuries, from the Boston Celtics after the 1980 season (traded from Jazz to Celtics mid-season 1980). During his 10-year NBA career, Peter Press "Pistol Pete" Maravich accomplished the following:

*NBA All-Rookie First

Team (1971) *5-time NBA All-Star (1973–1974, 1977–1979) *All-NBA First Team (1976-1977) *2-time All-NBA Second Team (1973, 1978) *NBA scoring champion (1977) *NBA's 50th Anniversary All-Time Team *Elected to Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall

But just how did Maravich come about the nickname "Pistol Pete"? So goes the legend of "Pistol


of Fame (1987)

Pete: Part 2"... The Maravich family had moved to Raleigh, North Carolina, during teenage Peter's high school years. At first, Peter attended Needham B. Broughton High School in Raleigh. It was during his high school basketball years that the still-famous nickname was born: Given his style of shooting the ball from his side, as if he were holding a revolver, a more benignsounding "Peter Maravich" became known—with considerable help from the sports media—as a much more catchy "Pistol Pete" Maravich"!

The moniker "Pistol Pete" would follow (continues to follow) Peter Press Maravich until January 5, 1988, when, sadly enough, he collapsed and died at age 40 of heart failure while playing in a pickup basketball game in the gym at a church in Pasadena, California.



Study Shows Chiropractic Safe for Post Disc Surgery Patients

A research article published on April 21, 2010 in the journal, Chiropractic & Osteopathy from Melbourne Australia, looked at the safety of chiropractic care for patients who had previously had disc replacement surgery.

the reason I work for myself. Mainly I work for my wife. She's the boss," he says of his Kay, his better half, to whom he will have been married 52 years come Oct. 18.

The couple has a son, Andy, and a daughter, Alison Mitchell-Warrick, and three grandsons, Drew and Clay Mitchell and Lincoln Warrick.

Drew helps at the front counter of Bud's Tire Pros, while Alison, also a paramedic, serves as Bud's right hand and has just about taken over the operation.

"She runs it now," he said. "I let her make a lot of the decisions."

Bud's been attending to other people's cars and trucks for decades and remembers the day it started.

"My dad put a grease rack in, and from the time I was 12, I changed everybody's oil up and down this road. From '46 to '64 we had an old wood building. I was a meat cutter, and I would stop to go change tires in the basement.

"When I was 17, we were drag racing," he said, switching gears. "I put a Chevy engine in a Ford and got started on oval racing. I raced in Smyrna, Nashville and Ridgetop. I really enjoyed doing that. I built the motors. I did it for 15 to 20 years. About racing, people will get mad and want to fight, but I just had a good time," he reminisced of the days when he competed and also rooted for such top NASCAR drivers as Fireball Roberts.

"We first went to the Daytona 500 in 1961. I've hardly missed one for years," he said. "Talladega, I've gone to about all of them, and those at Bristol."

The former meat cutter, Bi-Rite grocer and mechanic commenced to selling tires in 1987.

"I used to build stock cars and stored feed in a building on this side of the road. I came over here and started fooling with tires. "Had a fire in '06. I didn't know how good people were here until then. I had insurance but not enough to build the building back. People gave me \$23,000 to help build the building. I found out I didn't need it. I put the money in a fire fund and give it away to people when they need it for a tragedy like a death and funeral expenses. I call it Bud's Tire Fire Fund.

"The fire waked me up to how good people are to us. So nice and patient with us. When the store burned, I was in Texas. I got in the car and hurried back this way. Three days after this place burned, I had this cleaned up, and we went over to the hardware store across the road and used it. We were back here in three months, but everybody helped me.

"We do about everything but no motor work. We sell tires, do brake jobs and repair. A lot of Cannon County and Rutherford County are our customers," noted Bud, who has a staff of 10 to 11 employees.

"What I enjoy most is meeting people and pleasing people. Trying to give people what they're happy with is what we do. Your satisfaction is our goal. That is truly what I believe.

'God puts us here for a purpose. I believe I was born with one talent, but I think I've picked up at least one more," said Bud, an elder for the Science Hill Church of Christ who has served with their Inner City Ministry for more than 20 years.

"The big thing about Bud is that he is always

interested in other people and trying to find a way to help them. He's a special man," said Truman Jones, radio show host and former Rutherford County sheriff who has been a close friend of Mitchell since elementary school days.

"He's one of these people that you can trust 100 percent. When you do business with him, he is more interested in doing something for you rather than trying to make money in the business. He's just like his daddy, Glenn Mitchell, who ran Wilson-Mitchell store. They had a grocery store that took care of everybody on the east side of town and were known for taking care of their customers all the way back then.

"Bud used to be a great NASCAR-type racer. He could take anything mechanical, whether it be an engine or whatever, and take it apart and put it back together, even when he was young. He just had that gift," said Jones, who in his younger days bought a souped up '63 Corvette from Mitchell, a car he wishes he still had.

On Sept. 28, 2013, Bud narrowly averted death after a horrible motorcycle

"If they hadn't flown me to Vanderbilt, I would have died. I was in there three weeks. They brought me through it. I have to watch what I do, but I'm doing great a lot better than I deserve," he said, reflecting on the incident.

A man with deep coun-

try roots, he shares that all four of his grandparents were from Cannon County, hailing from the communities of Porterfield, Gassaway, Hollow Springs and Pocahontas.

As for the biggest changes he's seen over the decades in Murfreesboro, he savs they have to do with the traffic and people.

"When I was little, this was an agricultural community," Bud said of the east side of town. "Everybody raised cattle, hogs, chickens. The traffic now looks like Nashville. Between 7:30 and 8 Sunday mornings along East Main, that's the only time you'll find Murfreesboro looking like it used to.

"There's still a lot of great people, but a lot of people moved in here from different places. We still have that friendly atmosphere, but it's different. Everything used to be centered around the square. It's a different world, but still we got a lot of good people," said Bud, whose hobbies are going to the races and

practicing the Golden Rule. He shares a bit of advice

for younger generations. "Whatever you try to do, do the best you can, and you'll be successful. My mama said, 'You're no better than who you are.' You determine who you are. If you teach a child morals and work ethics, you can't hold them back," said Mitchell, who is living proof as well as one of the best friends folks in Cannon and Rutherford counties have ever had.



At the Upper Cumberland Senior Expo, scheduled for 9:00 a.m. on October 22 at Hyder Burks Pavilion, the UCAAAD will be introducing a program to attendees that is designed to prepare seniors for emergencies: SENIOR Planning and Resources for Emergency Preparedness.

SENIOR P.R.E.P. was created by South Carolina's Lieutenant Governor's Office on Aging to raise awareness of the importance of individual emergency preparedness. The program encourages individuals to organize an emergency kit and an emergency plan, as well as providing resources to aid seniors in the planning SENIOR P.R.E.P.

has been adopted by the UCAAAD, a division of the Upper Cumberland Development District, who will be taking the lead in implementing the program across the Upper Cumberland. Tennessee

will be the first state to join the program which is being promoted to spread nation-

UCAAAD launch SENIOR P.R.E.P. at the Senior Expo, where each attendee age 60 and above can receive basic supplies donated by vendors to place in a SENIOR P.R.E.P. bag which will be distributed to attendees. Attendees will be given a checklist of items that should be included in a fully equipped emergency kit and will be encouraged to collect additional items not provided at the Senior Expo. A fully equipped kit includes items that will help prepare seniors self-sustaining be for 72 hours: flashlight with batteries, seven day supply of medications, legal documents, personal hygiene and sanitation items, extra eyeglasses and hearing aids, family and emergency contact information, water, nonperishable foods, fire plastic extinguisher, sheeting and duct tape, multipurpose tool, whistle, first aid kit, map of local

Cumberland area, cash, change of clothes, and cell phone with extra battery or charger. Tyler Smith.

EMA

Director, stresses importance of individuals being prepared, "During the last ice storm, some people were without power for up to three weeks. We found that most of our seniors were not prepared for that kind of emergency."

Cookeville Fire Department, Putnam County Emergency Management Agency, Putnam County Emergency Medical Service, 911 and Rescue will be at the Emergency Preparedness station at the Senior Expo showing seniors how to be prepared in the case of an emergency. Attendees can participate in interactive activities and win supplies to put in their SENIOR P.R.E.P. bags. Emergency personnel also encourage attendees to bring their weather radios for programming at the Emergency Preparedness station.

"As our senior population rises, so does the need to educate the public on how seniors can prepare for emergencies," said Jessica Pruett, Upper Disaster Preparedness Coordinator with UCAAAD who is heading-up the SENIOR P.R.E.P. program. "After the ice storm, we saw a serious need in our region that had to be addressed Many seniors were left illequipped and unprepared.'

Along with distributing the SENIOR P.R.E.P. bags, Ms. Pruett will also be coordinating onsite disaster preparedness training at senior centers across the region, by request.

"Through fund raising, we were able to the SENIOR purchase P.R.E.P. bags, which we believe, along with providing education to seniors and resources to fill the bags, will be a great firststep in preparing seniors in the Upper Cumberland future for emergency situations."

The **UCAAAD** plans to reach seniors who are home-bound and distribute additional bags at other events through fund raising efforts and donations received to sustain the program. 



The Lions played with a lot of pride, but it wasn't enough as a lethal Cougar running game was the difference in Cannon County's loss to MTCS 33-20 falling to 0-8 for the season at Fred Schwartz Field last Friday night.

"That is the best game we have played all year," CCHS head coach T.J. Daniels said after the loss. "We kept fighting, but the biggest thing was turnovers killed us. Any success builds momentum, and we got two district games left. We are not going to quit working and fighting."

The Cougars jumped on the board on their second play from scrimmage as they rambled 78 yards to take an early 7-0 advantage with 10:18 left in the opening quarter.

CCHS had a chance to answer, which featured a beautiful pitch and catch from Brady Page to Jeremy Litchford for 50 yards. However, on fourth and goal Page was stopped at the MTCS 1 to keep the Lions scoreless.

With five seconds remaining in the first quarter, the Lions scored on a fifteen yard Brady Page to Austin Brock pass in the end zone, but a missed the two-point conversion attempt left the score 7-6 at the end of the first quarter. It was the closest CCHS would come to their first win.

Averaging over 300 yards on the ground coming into the contest, the Cougars used their powerful running game to score twice on the ground during the second quarter to make the score 21-6 at halftime.

The second half was a repetition of the first half for the Cougars as they scored from 24 yards out to increase the advantage to 27-6 with 9:50 left in the third. However, the Lions Maika Fonoti, coming back from an earlier injury,

blocked the extra point attempt.

Even with the wet conditions, the Lions used their passing attack to get back into the game as Page found Litchford on a 16 yard strike. Page also found Brock for the two-pointer to cut the Cougars' advantage to 27-14 with 4:30 left in the

In the final quarter the turnover bug bit again as Page was intercepted by a Cougar defender who returned it to the CCHS 16. Two plays later, MTCS pulled away for good with a 10-yard touchdown run to make the score 33-14 with 4:40 left in the game.





together, and we would love for you to go.' We go visit and they feed us. It just kind of happens."

During the past few seasons, the Lions have attended several area churches from varied viewpoints, First Baptist, Woodbury Church of Christ and Ivy Bluff. Many of sermons touch on life's less both on and off the field.

"The focus of our message while hosting the football team centered on the deeper meaning of the game and winning," First Baptist Church of Woodbury Pastor Dr. Hunter Hay said via email. "Having had the opportunity to play football I took the time to speak to the standards we use for determining who is a winner. For a football team we say it is the scoreboard. For a farmer, we measure winning by saying it is the number of acres that are owned and tilled. For

people, we measure being a winner by the number of square feet of their home, or our 'imagined' size of their savings account. Often in life, winning has little to do with these external measurements. The win that comes from playing the game is not reflected in the score, ut is reflected in lessons learned from the game; not giving up, maintaining our focus when we are tired, the necessity of completing my assignment as a part of the play recognizing our part in what it means to be a team, understanding and trusting authority, maintaining emotional control when you want to explode, and respect for honest play.'

In addition to attending the different churches, the Lions listen to a devotional given the day before the game by Andy Herzer, founder of the 1st Shot Organization and

a former MTSU basketball coach. Similar to what the players gather from their church visits, Herzer gives faith based life lessons dealing with adversity and other topics to the players and the Lions coaching staff.

"More importantly it is about growing individuals, and I think sometimes as coaches, and I was one of them when I was in college, we care so much about skill development and winning games," Herzer said before this week's devotional to the Lions. "We forget a vital part of it and that is the spirit of a man and building it up. So when adversity comes, and it comes in everybody's life, they have some character and substance about them that can help them. It helps them when they hit adversity, and it grows them when they face it and make mistakes. It is what they do after mistake that matters most. That is the essence of what we tried to do this year with

the Lions." The players get a lot of good advice from listening to these devotionals, and it has helped them focus for the upcoming game.

"The devotionals make us reflect on ourselves, and what can you do better the next week," CCHS sophomore lineman Cole Hill said a few weeks ago after one of the sessions.

Lions wide receiver Jeremy Litchford added, "Andy (Herzer) coming in and talking to us has really helped a lot. It gives us courage and different aspects of what he has been through. It helps us a lot."



Book of Amos

Amos was a Shepherd and grower of figs and a dresser of sycamore trees from Tekoa, in Judah, the southern kingdom of the Israelites. His prophecy was to the northern kingdom, Israel.

Amos begins his condemnation by speaking of God's coming judgment to the nations surrounding Israel. He spoke against Aram, Gaza, Tyre, Edom, Ammon, Rabbah, Moab and his own country, Judah. Then he begins to denounce Israel, condemning the wealthy for oppressing the poor and for their worship of idols.

Amos illustrated his messages with situations from his farming and shepherding experiences: a loaded cart - ch. 2, v. 13; a roaring lion - ch. 3, v. 8; a mutilated sheep - ch.3, v. 12; pampered cows ch. 4, v. 1;

His people who had ceased to worship Him and obey His word

and a basket of fruit ch. 8, v. 1,2.

Crossing the Jordan River

After wandering in the desert 40 years, the Israelites finally approached the boundary of the Promised Land near Shittim. Their great leader Moses had died, and God had transferred power to Moses' successor, Joshua. Before invading the hostile land of Canaan, Joshua had sent in two spies to scout the enemy. Their

story is told in the account of Rahab, the prostitute.

Joshua ordered the people to consecrate themselves by washing themselves, their clothes, and refraining from sex. The next day, he assembled them a half mile behind the ark of the covenant. He told the Levite priests to carry the ark to the Jordan River, which was swollen and treacherous, overflowing its

banks with snowmelt from Mount Hermon. As soon as the priests waded in with the ark, the water stopped flowing and piled in a heap, 20 miles north near the village of Adam. It was also cut off to the south. While the priests waited with the ark

in the middle of the river, the entire nation crossed over on dry ground. The Lord commanded Joshua to have 12 men, one from each of the 12 tribes, pick up a stone from the center of the riverbed. About 40,000 men from the tribes of Reuben, Gad, and the half-tribe of Manasseh had crossed over first, armed and ready for battle.

Once everyone had crossed, the priests with the ark came out of the riverbed. As soon as they were safe on dry land, the waters of the Jordan rushed in. The people camped that night at Gilgal, about two miles away from Jericho. Joshua took the 12 stones they had brought and stacked them into a memorial. He told the nation it was a sign to all the

Red Sea in Egypt. Then the Lord commanded Joshua to circumcise all the men, which he did, since they had not been circumcised during the desert wanderings. After that, the Israelites celebrated Passover, and the manna that had fed them for 40 years stopped. They ate the produce of the land of Canaan.

The conquest of the land was about to begin. The angel who commanded God's army appeared to

Joshua and told him how to win the battle of Jericho.







How to Find a Better Medicare Prescription Drug Plan Dear Savvy Senior,

I recently received a letter from my Medicare drug plan provider notifying me that they are increasing my co-pays next year. I'd like to look for a better plan but could use some guidance. What's the easiest way to do this?

Need a Change

Dear Need,

Cost increases and coverage changes are an annual event for many Medicare Part D prescription drug plans. Fortunately, during the open enrollment period (which is Oct. 15 - Dec. 7), you have the ability to shop and compare plans and choose one that better fits your needs and budget. Your new plan will go into effect Jan.1, 2016. Here are some tips that can help with this process.

Shop Online

If you have Internet access and are comfortable using a computer, you can easily shop for and compare all Medicare drug plans in your area, and enroll in a new plan online.

Just go to Medicare's Plan Finder Tool at medicare.gov/finda-plan, and type in your ZIP code or your personal information, enter in how you currently receive your Medicare coverage, select the drugs you take and their dosages, and choose the pharmacies you use. You'll get a cost comparison breakdown for every plan available in your area so you can compare it to your current plan.

This tool also provides a five-star rating system that evaluates each plan based on past customer service records, and suggests generics or older brand name drugs that can reduce your costs.

It's also important to keep in mind that when you're comparing drug plans don't judge a plan strictly by its monthly premium cost. Low-premium plans are often associated with higher prescription co-payments and may end up being more expensive. Look at the "estimated annual drug costs" that shows how much you can expect to pay over a year in total out-of-pocket costs including premiums, deductibles and co-pays.

Also, be sure the plan you're considering covers all of the drugs you take with no restrictions. Most drug plans today place the drugs they cover into price tiers. A drug placed in a higher tier may require you to get prior authorization or try another medication first before you can use it.

Need Help?

If you need some help choosing a new plan, contact your State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP), which provides free one-on-one Medicare counseling in person or over the phone. They also conduct seminars during the open enrollment period at various locations throughout each state. To find the contact information for your local SHIP visit shiptacenter.org, or call the eldercare locator at 800-677-1116.

Shrinking Donut Hole

You also need to know that Medicare's "donut-hole" - the coverage gap in which you must pay out-of-pocket for your drugs - continues to shrink. In 2016, you will get a 55 percent discount on brand-name drugs, and the federal subsidy for generic medications will rise to 42 percent.

The 2016 coverage gap begins when your total drug cost exceeds \$3,310 (that includes your share and the insurer's share of the costs) and ends when your total out-of-pocket costs reach \$4,850. After that, your Part D plan usually covers around 95 percent of your remaining drug costs for the year.

Low-Income Assistance

Also, be aware that if you're income is under \$17,655 or \$23,895 for married couples living together, and your assets are below \$13,640 or \$27,250 for married couples not counting your home, car or life insurance policy, you may be eligible for the federal Low Income Subsidy known as "Extra Help."
