# White Oak Fair keeps craft traditions alive

# Record number of artisans set for show Saturday, Sunday

WOODBURY - Say "white oak" and "crafts" and artisans from as far away as Pennsylvania will respond: "Cannon Coun-

A record number of artisans from multiple states have registered for Cannon County's increasingly popular White Oak Fair slated for Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 13-14, at the award-winning Arts Center of Cannon County.

"We're celebrating the 25th year of the Fair," noted Neal Appelbaum, executive director of the Arts Center. "Judging from pre-show interest, we may exceed 5,000 visitors this

Pennsylvania-based folkart painter Barbara Straw-

ser, who has been showing her work at the White Oak Fair more than two decades, promised to display a painted scene she saw years ago on the road leading north out of Woodbury toward Auburntown.

"My grandson was battling cancer at the time, so I often put angels in my work," the artist sketched with obvious heart-felt words. "During that era in Tennessee, which I love for the beautiful nature scenes, I saw goats standing on a hill, being guarded by these beautiful big Pyrenees dogs. In the trees above the goats and white dogs, is where I painted the angels."

Notable Readyville blacksmith Joe Brown has been demonstrating his craft 19 consecutive years

"Judging from last year's attendance of 4,000-plus, attendance could top 5,000 visitors this year, as our White Oak Fair gains in prestige each year," Brown predicted as he heated and hammered out a bowl.

"I do demonstrations on site, working mostly with steel, forming and shaping functional art," crafted Brown. "I don't do farrier blacksmithing that along with horses and mules, helped make America what it is today. But I do enjoy performing live demonstrations of my folk art to keep the blacksmithing tradition alive."

Murfreesboro's Kim Harris Mullins is scheduled to show her hand-crafted "Gemama" jewelry, featuring a lot of gems.



Artists will demonstrate their skills at the 25th annual White Oak Fair. A record number of entries are expected along with a record crowd.

"I'm a child of the 1980s, so gems are a theme I love as I work with sterling silver, wire works and leather-weaving," creative artisan Mullins noted. "I love the White Oak Fair, because it draws so many other vendors and their creations."

"Last year, we had 70 vendors," accounted Arts Center Fair Manager Mary See WHITE OAK, Page 9

# Scam strikes home

Caller pretends to be IRS rep

Have you received a scary call from the IRS lately?

Chances are it was a prank, one of several being perpetuated in Cannon and surrounding counties by a con-man or a series of con artists trying to steal money from law-abiding citizens.

"We received a prank call some a man who said he was from the IRS. It sounded really legitimate at first," said a Woodbury resident who wished to stay anonymous.

"He had us going at first. My husband was really torn up," the woman said.

"But the caller was soon demanding \$2,400 in cash and telling us not to notify authorities," she said.

"We just hung up on him," she said.

The Internal Revenue Service has issued a consumer alert providing additional tips to protect themselves from telephone scam artists calling and pretending to be with the IRS.

These callers may de-

mand money or may say you have a refund due and try to trick you into sharing private information. e con artists can sound convincing when they call. They may know a lot about you, and they usually alter the caller ID to make it look like the IRS is calling. They use fake names and bogus IRS identification badge numbers. If you don't answer, they often leave an

"Billy and I started talking and this came up," grinned chef Todd Hollandsworth.

The Billy in question is Billy Kaufman, of Short Mountain Distillery fame.

The new restaurant is located on a knoll overlooking the distillery. It isn't ready yet, but the founders are hoping to open at the end of October.

"We are hoping to have a big, Halloween dinner, but that's not set in stone," Hollandsworth said.

"The kitchen was just approved by the state. We got a 99 score, which is almost perfect," he continued.

Hollandsworth is a selftaught chef, who learned to cook from his mother, a caterer in Murfreesboro.

"Build it and they will come. It's like that," he said.

"We are a destination, but we have nothing to eat. People wanted a place to sit down that was air-conditioned. The restaurant is a solution to that," Kaufman explained.

# Courier Columnist Can Mo'ne Davis win Cy Young?

The cover page of the August 25, 2014 edition of Sports Illustrated magazine featured a photo of a determined-looking Mo'ne Davis, a 13-year-old black girl playing for Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, hurling a pitch during the 2014 Little League World Series, which started on August 14, 2014 and ended on August 24,

After throwing a "complete-game, twohit shutout against an all-boys team from Nashville," Mo'ne "received tweets from Michelle Obama to Billie Jean King . . . and TV invites from Jimmy Fallon, Ellen [Degeneres] and Queen Latifah."

(NOTE: Seoul Little League of Seoul, outh Korea, defeated Jackie Robinson West Little League of Chicago, Illinois, 8-4 to win the 2014 Little League World Series championship.)

Mo'ne Davis is the first Little League baseball player to appear on the cover of Sports Illustrated/SI as a Little League


player, and, as SI noted, she "has owned sports conversation since her shutout of Tennessee [Nashville team] last Friday." Interestingly enough, however, is that Mo'ne Davis is not the first girl to play in


the Little League World Series. By all accounts, she is the eighteenth girl, overall, to play, and the fourth American girl to play (since the Little League World Series began in 1947). Over the past century, women have

come a long way in terms of equality, more Gloria Steinem in 2014 than Ma Kettle in 1914. My personal opinion is that women are as intelligent and capable as men—even superior in some cases!

When it comes to sports, though, it is a scientifically-based, anatomical-physiological fact that men are bigger, stronger, and faster than women. Does this mean, then, that women should be excluded from playing men's sports at the high school, college, and professional levels?

Concerning contact sports such as football, basketball, soccer, and hockey, and combative sports such as boxing, wrestling, and Mixed Martial Arts/MMA, I don't think women should compete with men. Sure, from a perspective of physicality, there might be that rare female specimen every now-and-then who could compete, but generally speaking, "no." And my reasons are simple: It would be

In addition to baseball, Davis also plays center midfielder on her school's boys' soccer team. Still, regarding her baseball prowess, the SI article reported "she's five times better at basketball" and "her dream is to play point guard at UConn."

For the sake of making a point here, let's say Mo'ne Davis totally devotes the next few years to developing her baseball skills. At 13-years-old, she is listed as being 5 ft. 4 in. in height and weighing approximately 110 lbs. She already throws "a 70-mph fastball and the most talked-about curve east of Clayton Ker-

Project seven years into the future, 2021: Mo'ne is 6 ft. tall, weighs 170 lbs., throws a 100-mph fastball, and has a curve that defies the laws of basis physics. Simply put, she is the best baseball pitcher on the planet. She could easily play in the Majors, be an all-star, and even win the Cy Young Award, given to the best pitcher in each the American League and the National League of Major League Baseball.

Major League Baseball/MLB is known as "America's Favorite Pastime." If the opportunity presented itself, would it "help" or "hurt" MLB, and society in general, to allow a woman to dominate men in a sport that has always been dominated by men?

Is this a sports issue?

Or is it more a chauvinism vs. feminism issue . . . the oldest issue in the history of the human race?



# Courier columnist Does accuracy suffer from fast pace of news?

I was reading a technology column the other day, and it talked about ways of helping reporters gather news faster. The author made some suggestions for how software and hardware companies could help reporters, to "adapt to the new hyper-speed reality of news.

Unfortunately, the author made a mistake often made by overly tech-centric non-journalists: news happens just as fast, or as slowly, as it always has. Bank robberies don't happen any faster, city councils don't meet any faster, and planes don't crash any faster. They happen at the same speed they always have. Certainly the delivery is faster, but the news itself, we'll, it is as fast or as slow as it has always been.

Now it's absolutely true that technology helps us gather background information faster, and deliver it to audiences even faster: how many bank robberies have occurred in our city? Who is going to benefit from that rezoning application the city council approved? What is the

may not depend on the fastest news outlet, it may depend on the slowest. After all, gathering basic information about a breaking news story takes time, and much too often we have seen initial reports be wrong, distorted or misleading.

It takes time to sort through all of the initial confusion, and breaking stories are always confusing. And a database will probably not be useful. Eyewitnesses and on-scene experts are what count; not numbers in a column.

When it comes to news, I like to think of this, admittedly, strange linguistic equation: "slow" has the same number of letters as "good," and "speed" has the same number of letters as "wrong." Something to think about.







## Now is not the time to take a nap

Once again, we approach that date on the calendar that many of us will always remember as one when we experienced feelings of tragedy, confusion, outrage and patriotism all in one day.

used commercial airliners as missiles to attack the United States of America. Even though not officially declared, we were at war.

One of the ladies in our office spoke with her elderly mother who was at forget something like that. The fear that you have as you punch in those numbers is a fear that cannot be explained by words. As I sat helpless, watching the horror in New York that September



September 11, 2001 for our generation will be like another generation's Pearl Harbor, and as we approach the thirteenth anniversary of that date, I just hope it is not an omen of things to come.

I'll never forget that sunny morning while driving to work on Tuesday, September 11, 2001, when my cell phone rang and I noticed on the digital screen that the call was coming from my home. Just having left only a few minutes earlier, my first thoughts were of what I had forgotten or what my wife was suggesting for me to purchase on my way home. Instead it was a call that changed us all for a very long time.

Of course, she was calling to tell me of the fire at the World Trade Center, and at that time only one tower had been damaged and the news reports were unclear as to what had happened. I hurried to my office and turned on the TV located in our communications area in time to see the second tower struck by another plane. By now, my office had filled with other employees staring in shock as news reports came in from Washington, D.C., York New City, Pennsylvania and other cities involved in the attacks against our country.

What had started as a beautiful, clear, usual day in the Volunteer State thirteen years ago had suddenly turned into one of the most shocking days of our lives. Terrorists had home alone. Being concerned for her mother at a time like this, she asked her how she was doing after hearing all of the news reports. Her mother told her in a very shaky voice, "It reminds me of the day Pearl Harbor was attacked. The only thing was we did not have to watch the attack on television and see the people die."

Those words sent a chill over me and probably will remain with me as a memory of that day forever. Just like the assassination of President Kennedy, November 22, 1963, I will always remember where I was and what I was doing. Like the elderly mother of my coworker, the only difference of that event and the horror we saw September 11, is we did not watch it firsthand as it happened.

As I sat there watching the rescue efforts and the news reporters hurrying to the scene, I noticed a small wooden calendar I have on top of my office TV. The calendar is made of a series of wooden blocks that you change to form the date. I had changed the calendar for the day, which read 9-11. How appropriate that the date that this country will remember forever was the call numbers for help -

I have had to use those numbers the last thirteen vears myself. I've called for help when my father suffered a heart attack and died in my arms, as well as other times, and you never

day 13 years ago, that same fear appeared. A fear not only for those killed or injured, but also a fear for our country.

When the Japanese planes returned to their carriers after bombing Pearl Harbor, it is said that the commander of the Japanese fleet made the remark that he was afraid that what they had done would mean they would lose everything they had due to awakening a sleeping giant. I believe those terrorists who struck 9-11 awakened that giant once again thirteen years ago, but so often, giants have the habit of dozing off every now and then. I just hope it is not in the process of rubbing its eyes for a nap these days, but instead is wide awake and will always remember the day of 9-11.

The 911 numbers were called on that September day and we must never forget the fear we felt. That fear caused us to act and we are not through handling that 911 call. I you are remembering 9-11 this month and continue to stand proud for our country in the days ahead. Never forget!

May God bless America and always keep her awake.

Research on shortening the calving season has shown that calves born in the first 21days of the calving season will weigh more at weaning than those born during the second 21dry matter basis) per day.

Higher-quality grass hays (about 8% Crude Protein) may be consumed at about 2.0% of body weight. Excellent hays, such as good alfalfa, silages, or green pasture may be consumed at the rate of 2.5% dry matter of body weight per day. The combination of increased nutrient content and increased forage intake makes high quality forage very valuable to cattle and the producer. ## Keep food safe for use outdoors

With summer in full and outdoor barbeques part of the weekly fare, an expert with University of Tennessee Extension reminds consumers that food safety can make or break an outdoor activity.

"Whether it's a picnic at the park, camping in the mountains, or living on the boat, food is often a common denominator for fun," said Janie Burney, a professor of family and consumer sciences. Burney says these simple rules can keep foodborne pathogens from ruining your summer:

- Plan ahead. If you are traveling with perishable food, place it in a cooler with ice or freezer packs.

Pack safely. Pack perishable foods directly from the refrigerator or freezer into the cooler. Be sure to keep raw meat and poultry wrapped separately from cooked foods and ready-to-eat foods such as fruit or vegetables. If the cooler is only partially filled, pack the remaining space with more ice. Keep the cooler in an air-conditioned area of your vehicle, rather than in a hot trunk. Limit the amount of times the cooler is opened.

- When outdoors, keep the cooler in a shady spot hamburgers, and cover it with a lightcolored blanket or tarp.

- When camping, boating or picnicking, take along only the amount of food that can be used. Avoid leftovers.

- Don't drink water from streams and rivers. Bring bottled water.

- Keep hands and all utensils clean when food. Use preparing disposable towelettes to clean hands.

- When preparing food, never use the same dish for raw meats and foods that will not be cooked.

- Don't let perishable food sit out while swimming or fishing or during other activities. If the temperature is above 90 degrees F, food is not safe to sit out longer than one hour (two hours at room temperature).

Burney also reminds us that safe food habits also incorporate these simple rules:

- Frozen food should be thawed in the refrigerator. - Do not put spoons into

food after you have tasted food from that same spoon. - Keep hot food hot, and cold foods cold.

- Encourage children to wash their hands after playing with pets, playing outside, going to the bathroom, coughing or wiping their nose and certainly before touching food.

If your outdoor fun includes grilling Burney recommends you play it safe by handling raw ground beef carefully. "First, be sure you keep the meat cold (40 degrees F or less) until it is cooked," she

says. "Second, cook ground beef to a safe temperature of 160 degrees F so that bacteria such as E. coli are killed. E. coli can cause severe stomach cramps, diarrhea (often bloody), and vomiting. infections are mild while others are life threatening. Young children, older adults and individuals with weakened immune systems are more likely than others to develop complications, severe Burney said.

"Third, when deciding when your hamburgers are cooked enough, use a thermometer. You cannot tell by the color," Burney cautions. She recommends you insert the tip of the thermometer into the side of the burgers to check that the temperature as reached 160 degrees F.

"You should also clean your hands and anything that comes in contact with the raw meat thoroughly with soap and water so that vou do not crosscontaminate other foods,' Burney said. She also notes that it is best not to rely solely on hand sanitizers.

In the event of a ground beef recall, return your meat to the store for an exchange or dispose of it, she said. Don't take chances-when in doubt, throw it out!

# Beaver Dam to get improved services

## Sewer rehab project gets approval from Woodbury

Residents in Beaver Dam should see improvement in their water service as a result of a Sewer Project Rehabilitation approved by the Town of Woodbury Mayor and Aldermen during their regular monthly meeting Tuesday (Sept. 2).

The Beaver Dam project will be the first in a series of plans to improve water and service throughout Woodbury.

"We have problems all over town," Woodbury Mayor Harold Patrick said. "We feel Beaver Dam is one of the worst parts (of

town) and this will take care of Beaver Dam over a period of time. After this, we can concentrate our efforts and monies for other parts of town."

Improvements include new collection lines, new manholes and a new service ladder, which will be the Town of Woodbury's responsibility. will There be responsibility homeowners. No date was announced as to when work will start on the

Beaver Dam project. Police Chief Kevin Mooneyham announced the addition of a new officer to the Town of

Woodbury Police. Officer Jimmy Hayes was introduced as the newest member of the force. He is expected to complete his work at the Police Academy in December.

Hayes, who previously worked for the Cannon County Sheriff's replaces Department, Chris Brown who left the Town of Woodbury Police Department to become an investigator with the Cannon County Sheriff's Department.

According Mooneyham, Hayes is the first African American to serve on the Town of Woodbury police force.

"Two weeks ago I was hit by surprise when Chris Brown resigned and went to work for the Sheriff's Department as

investigator," Mooneyham said. "We have never had an African American officer work for the Town of Woodbury and I thought it was time to come up with times. We are proud to have him."

Patrick said the Town of Woodbury Police Department and Cannon County Sheriff's Department have "gentleman's agreement" not to hire one another's employees; however, Mooneyham said he had spoken with Cannon County Sheriff Darrell Young regarding Brown's departure.

"I talked with (Young) and he didn't seek (Brown)," Mooneyham said. "(Brown) sought Sheriff Young. He wanted to work for (Sheriff Young)

for less money and less benefits, but I am tickled to have (Hayes) with our department."

The Board of Mayor and Aldermen also passed Ordinance 464 and 465 on second and final reading. Ordinance 464 amends the Zoning Woodbury Ordinance to delete the pool swimming regulations within this ordinance. Ordinance No. 465 amends the Woodbury Municipal Code to adopt and include a section for swimming regulations.

Faye Knox made both motions, which were seconded by Lois Larimer. Both passed unanimously.

The next meeting of the Town of Woodbury Mayor and Aldermen will be Oct. 7 at City Hall.



Creek Indians ceded 22 to 23 million acres of land in the forced treaty. The Five Civilized Tribes of the southeast are the Cherokee, Muscogee Creek, the Chickasaw, the Choctaw, and the Seminole Nations, who all were forced out of the southeastern part of the United States of America and walked their Trail of Tears to Oklahoma Indian Territory.

Many people have been walking through Woodbury in memorial commemoration of the Trail of Tears on the northern route. This summer Woodbury citizens were able to give a welcome and encouragement to the Cherokee Youth Bike Ride. The riders came on the northern trail

to Oklahoma. It was wonderful to see so many youth from the Cherokee Nations of Oklahoma and North remembering the Trail of Tears. Many thanks to Carolyn Motley, Thea Prince, Laurie Cropley, and Melba Checote-Eads for hosting a luncheon for the riders.

September is American Indian Heritage Month in Tennessee the resolution HRJ1008 passed in April 30, 2014 sponsored by Rep. Mark Pody and Rep. Susan Lynn. On Friday, September 26, 2014, Woodbury citizens can walk in commemoration and memorial of the Trail of Tears.

The Commemorative "Trail of Tears" Walk will start from the gazebo at the Cannon County Court House on Waters St. at 6:30 PM, Friday, September 26th, and walk along Waters St. which is part of the original Trail of Tears to First United Methodist Church of Woodbury for a memorial. A film documentary which marked the 175 year anniversary of the Trail of Tears will be shown.

The film and memorial will start around 7:00 PM at the church, refreshments will be provided. The walk helps to bring reconciliation and renewal in relationships by bringing awareness of American Indian cultures. The most important part of the "Walk" is to bring our cultures together in a "hope" for the future and good will as we walk the steps of reconciliation together step by step. 





#### **Drug Charges**




