# Within wood

Sue and Joe Daniel Davenport preserve heritage through fishing lures, baskets

Between Joe Daniel Davenport's 300 fishing lures and his wife Sue's 70 white oak baskets, the couple could likely share stories enough to cover half the history of Cannon County.

While that may be a slight exaggeration, Sue's handsome baskets certainly speak for themselves as representations of the handiwork of a half dozen or so Cannon County basket makers reaching back a half century or more. One can easily imagine those hard-working men and women trekking into the wood to cut down just the right size white oak and then hauling the timber home where it was split into hundreds of wood strips before the long hours of intertwining the strips into the marvelous baskets that have made a name for themselves and their makers across the U.S.

As for Joe's lures, the majority he whittled from small pieces of wood taken from old homes, church buildings, school houses and wood samples used in construction or from branches he found in the woods. They stand in a sentimental way as memorials to sites that time and man have

Ararat School at Pea Ridge, Wood Cemetery, his Aunt Angie's kitchen, his Uncle Jim and Aunt Pearl's house, the Motley House and the Patterson Place. Two more were whittled out of wood from his daddy's wood box and his grandfather's barn. "The first one I finished was made of cedar. I used them quite a few times to fish with and had luck with some of them," he recalled. "Most of them I whittled. For some of them, I used a coping saw." He notes that he did not design the lures but copied them from examples he found in catalogs and magazines. "People began to find out I made them, and they began to bring me wood from different states and then from different countries," he says, but most came from trees from "every hollow of Cannon County." "If there was a piece of wood, he usually picked it up to make 'em," said Sue of her husband's pursuit carved into cedar, walnut, oak, maple, chestnut, poplar, pine and other See WOOD on Page 9

Guess what? This Thursday (Aug. 7) is election day. Voting will take place at all five Cannon County precincts from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

- Those voting places are:
- 1. Westside (West Side School)
- 2. Auburntown (Auburntown Community Building)
- 2. Pleasant Ridge (Woodbury Grammar School Gym)
- 2. Short Mountain 2 (Short Mountain School)
- 2. Gassaway (Gassaway Fire Hall)
- 3. Woodland (Woodland School)
- 4. Eastside (East Side School)
- 4. Short Mountain 4 (Short Mountain School)
- 5. Woodbury (Woodbury Grammar School Gym)

Remember, you must be registered prior to the election to vote. You must also bring a photo ID to the polls.

As a voter, if you have not changed your name or address with the Cannon County Election Office, you will have to follow fail-safe procedures and may experience a delay in voting and may also be required to go to a different polling place.

A campaign free zone will be enforced at the polls. The boundary is 100 feet.

The counting board will convene at the Election Office on Election Day.

Following the vote, candidates and supporters will gather on the Courthouse lawn to hear the results which will be broadcast by WBRY radio.

Remember voting will be conducted in the state Republican and Democratic Primaries and in the Cannon County General Election.

In the General Election, voters will cast ballots in 29 different Cannon County races:

County Executive: Anna Pittman, David J. Faulkner and Mike Gannon.

County Commissioner First District: Mark Barker, James H. Gibbs, Russell W. Paschal and James Russell Reed.

almost forgotten.

"I always enjoyed fishing. I began collecting lures in grammar school when I was about 12," said Joe, whose schoolboy years from the first grade until graduation were spent inside the same Woodbury schoolhouse: Central High and Grammar School.

"Dad bought two Heddon Midget River Runts one day at Bank's Hardware, and I caught a fish on one of 'em in Stones River," said the son of the late Joe A. Davenport and Pauline Daniel Davenport.

About half a century later, while studying a fishing plug, the thought crossed his mind, "Hey, I believe I can make one."

In 2000 he took up his knife and began whittling. Twelve years later, Joe Daniel's hands have turned out about 300 lures, each bearing a date and notation as to where the wood originated.

A plastic storage box holds about 15 lures special to his heart, each con-

# Cannon Co. man faces extradition in rape case

A Cannon County man wanted for additional charges of rape and attempted rape of a child has been arrested in New York and faces extradition, according to Cannon

County Sheriff's Investigator Anthony Young. Joseph O. Sullivan has been charged with one count of rape of a child and two counts of attempted rape of a child, Young said. The crimes occurred in 2012.

Sullivan was recently arrested by U.S. Marshals in Jamestown, N.Y., and has waived extradition. When he arrives in Cannon County he will be under \$250,000 bond, Young said.

Sullivan is the fifth man Young has charged with sex crimes against children in the last five weeks.

# Budget passes; no tax increase

Cannon County Commissioners approved the appropriation resolution for the 2014-15 fiscal year during a special called meeting Monday (July 28).

The budget includes no property tax increase and consists of raises for employees of the Sheriff's Department. Commissioners approved a property rate of \$2.53, which is the same as it was last year.

The only real discussion centered around \$35,000 appropriated for raises for deputies and jail employees; however, that would create a situation where corrections and road officers would actually be making more money than their supervisors.

There was much discussion on the issue, including Sheriff Darrell Young's proposal to return the \$35,000 to the general budget, add \$2,800 to it and give every county employee a 2 percent increase.

The proposal to provide all county employees the 2 percent raise did not receive much support.

"Why don't you just take the \$35,000 appropriated for the Sheriff's Department raises and let (Sheriff Young) split that among his employees and they will all receive a raise," Commissioner Kevin George said.

Commissioner Tony Neal is on the budget committee, which met eight times, and said the reason for allocating the \$35,000 for increases was so that deputies would not be so quick to leave Cannon County looking for employment – and additional money – elsewhere.

"The reason for this was to give deputies an increase to keep them from leaving and now we are cutting them back," Neal said. "We are taking money from deputies because they are not getting (the \$35,000) we had allocated."

"I think (Sheriff Young's) employees would be happier to split the \$35,000 than they would give it back for a 2 percent raise," George said. "We are so far behind with the Sheriff's Department competing with (surrounding counties). We need to do this."



### **Commission action requested** on vital planning issues

#### To the Editor,

This letter is intended as a public request for action from our elected County Commissioners.

Please take positive action starting nowto protect land values and quality of life here in our county. Direct the Planning Commission to immediately begin developing enforceable land use rights and restrictions and report their progress publicly. What is the hurry? you ask. We have spent two years not addressing the issues regarding 'land use' in our county and the issues are growing. Our current county government by ignoring this growing situation gives most land owners cause for concern.

This is why, Tuesday, July 22nd I attended the Planning Committee meeting along with over 30 other county residents. Their primary concerns quickly became clear. It was the sudden appearance of a firing range in their rural neighborhood. They rightfully I think, contended that suddenly the quality of their rural life style and the dollar value of their property have been significantly reduced through no fault on their part. They wanted to learn why their county government had not acted to protect them. What they heard from the Planning Committee was a series of excuses

that can be summarized with the phrase: We have no power.

For example: There are no existing land use nor zoning restrictions to prevent opening a business [firing range, quarry, halfway house]; creating zoning guidelines or restrictions is too complicated, expensive and time consuming; the Committee has no authority to develop zoning guidelines nor land use restrictions without direct authorization from the County Commissioners. And therefore, as the Planning Committee we could take no action to remedy the current situation.

Over two years ago I went to another well attended Planning Committee meeting. That night the issue was the sudden appearance of two quarries just off the John Bragg Scenic Highway and their impact on the Arts Center and nearby property values. Commissioners, that was more than two years ago; the excuses offered then and those offered the other night were identical. That's why as a property owner I am very concerned. We need to begin now to find our solutions. I'm confident a reasonable balance between land use restrictions and property ownership rights can be found. We all love this county!! 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

### And you still can't make a mater sandwich

Here we are once again in the glory days of homegrown maters and I'm still finding folks who can't make a mater saminch. I put out one of those videos a couple of years back, wrote articles, was featured in a few fancy magazines scraping a Miracle Whip jar with a knife and I still have people ask me the proper way to make the correct mater saminch. Let me tell you however, it does my heart good to have those questions since I have become Tennessee's official apostle of rural living as declared by Joint House resolution number 225 in 2013 and am truly known as an expert mater saminch constructor.

My claim to fame all began with me looking through one of my late wife's "country Wanda be" magazines. You know the ones, those that have pictures of old furniture out in the yard with ankle high grass under a tree like a Little House on the Prairie movie set. In fact, I wrote a column a few years ago about seeing that magazine and from that article I became the mater saminch creator of all time.

The thing that caught my attention in that magazine was a recipe for a tomato sandwich. Mater saminches have been my specialty and I have always been real interested in what trendy folks do to make one. Right off the bat, I knew whoever wrote that recipe never grew a homegrown tomato in Tennessee.

In the first line as I remember, they suggested using slices of challah or brioche bread with butter and a sprinkle of sea salt. First of all, I really don't know what those breads are, and second, sea salt was never a staple in my mama's kitchen cabinet from whom I learned to make mater saminches at an early age. We had that salt in a round blue box with a little girl under an umbrella. And everyone knows it is Miracle Whip on lite bread, not butter, that makes a real mater saminch. I know some of vou will tell me it's these other salad dressings, but Miracle Whip is the tang for my buds.

once again, to repeat the true art of making a Tennessee mater saminch so the influence of the trendy people will not

mayonnaise, white bread (or lite bread as it is called in the country), and a fresh ripe "mater" from the garden.



corrupt the mater saminch making process. Butter is really good on a lot of things. It's great on hot buttermilk biscuits with molasses, fresh roasting ears of corn and other items too numerous to mention here. But butter on a mater saminch is just wrong!

To those who are not schooled on the correct terminology of what to call those beautiful red juicy fruits, there is a difference between a "tomato" and a "mater" which I will repeat again. A "tomato" by some standards is a fruit grown hundreds of miles away. A "mater" is a bright red, juicy fruit that has had our love and care for several months and is most certainly what you would call a real "homebody." Homegrown "maters" are what summer is all about. Mv summer wouldn't be complete without a fresh "mater" sandwich every day or so. There are many ways to make one, but there is only one true country way to serve up your garden delights. A few years back, I gave out my "mater" sandwich recipe to help the "mater" novice create the perfect sandwich. Just in case there is another generation of those who have failed to perfect their own "mater" sandwich, here it is again. "mater" A country sandwich has to be made in an orderly routine using

You place two slices of fresh lite bread on a plate. Next, take a kitchen knife and spread a good amount of mayonnaise on both slices of bread. Make sure the knife hits the sides of the mayonnaise jar so a click can be heard sounding from the jar. This doesn't help the taste of the sandwich, but it reminds you to buy more mayonnaise the next time you are at the store.

Next, slice your homegrown "mater" into several thick slices, avoiding the temptation to swipe a slice for now. You should not be able to read a newspaper through any of the slices. This helps hold in the juice, and besides, if you wanted thin slices you could have gotten a "tomato" at a restaurant in town.

Add pepper and salt as desired. Place the slices on the lite bread and gently put the pieces of bread together. Ladies may want to cut the sandwich in a triangle, but real "Tennessee mater eaters" like their sandwiches whole to avoid the losing of any juice. Bite into your sandwich and enjoy what summer is all about.

When I won the election for the office of Sheriff in 2010 I knew that the plans I had laid out would take much time and effort. This job isn't about making everyone happy or solving every situation. It is about

doing the job to the best of your ability and doing that honestly with hard work. In 2010 I listened to the citizens and I realized that they desired a change. I am running again for this office not for a personal agenda or for any other gain but to continue this office in a forward direction. Some changes can be made immediately and other changes take time. I appreciate the support I have been given to allow me the opportunity to serve as your Sheriff.

One of my pledges when I became Sheriff was to be straightforward. I was faced with much difficulty when I took over office and have made the best attempt to overcome these hurdles. Upon entering the office I was unable to locate many case files, evidence, property and other information on crimes in order to continue investigations. These items were missing. Additionally all computers at the office were wiped clean. I will honestly say that I believe the citizens were treated unfairly during the transition to my administration. I tried with much effort to run a clean campaign but I was still met with resistance. I will be the first to say that if I am ever elected out of office or retire that I will work fairly with the new administration and preserve all property that belongs to the office or citizens and make no attempts to complicate anything. Any attempts at complicating a transition don't directly hurt the person(s) leaving;



it really does more of an injustice to the citizens. We as public servants should be concerned about the citizens first, not our personal agenda. My office has worked tirelessly to rebuild these files and re-structure.

The other candidate for the office of Sheriff was a member of the prior administration in 2010 and I feel that we both have different feelings and ideas, and I respect those. Each of us has a right to express what we have done or would do differently. I believe this can be done tactfully without being inappropriate. The citizens also have this right. This is why I have an open door policy at the Sheriff's Office. I am open to the concerns of the citizens.

In 2010 I even spoke with the employees of the department who are the first ones that I believe need to be talked to when you decide to run for office, especially when they will be the people working for you. I could sense tension and a low morale between employees and I was going to seek to create a better workplace. I believe today that I have an **excellent group of employees** with a high morale who support me, which is needed to succeed. When I took the job as Sheriff I never expected everything to work out perfectly. Sometimes I am faced with hard-line decisions such as firing or suspending an employee. If we have any issues with an employee it is dealt with in a fair and swift manner. Anyone who has worked in this position understands that this aspect is just a part of the job and must be done.

My administration has **made many changes** since my election, several of which I have already addressed. I first started out by eliminating small things that I could do immediately. I eliminated reserved parking spaces for Sheriff, Sergeant, Lieutenant and other ranking officers in the parking lot. I believe this gives other employees the impression that they aren't sufficient in their capacity. We all are no better than the other person and work together as a team. I also eliminated several ranking positions. Most of these were not needed due to the size of our agency. Our chain of command is simple. Patrol officers answer to sergeants, sergeant's answer to the Chief Deputy and then the Chief Deputy answers to myself. I also eliminated the Special Operations team. Again, our department is a small agency. Everyone on patrol provided with tactical gear and can participate in a situation, as needed, not just selective officers. I also eliminated the practice of rolling over an unlimited amount of vacation days for employees. I believe this practice was abused and when the former administration left before I took over on September 1, 2010 the taxpayers ended up paying out thousands of dollars on vacation leave time, some of which wasn't clearly accounted for.

I also provide each officer with **specialized training**. Each patrol officer we have employed is provided with specialized training not to include the minimum required by law. Every officer is provided this opportunity. We also have several officers with 15+ years of service, not including myself. I have served in law enforcement for 23 years.

My administration has proved to be **financially responsible**. We are conservative with taxpayer dollars and this goes without a doubt. I have sought every way possible to lower costs and enhance services. I have turned in at or above \$100,000 the past three years back into the general fund.

I believe in continuing to **use inmate labor** as much as possible. Our inmates have worked on many projects across the county the past few years and it has saved countless dollars on labor and also teaches them responsibility and accountability. Mostly it gives them something to be proud of, and something the citizens can be proud of and utilize.

Our agency has worked very hard to **curb the drug and theft problem**. While it is impossible to solve every crime, we work with every asset we are provided to do the best job that we are able to do. We have set a record amount of drug money seizures by the Sheriff's office and have shut down many meth labs and theft rings. Our agency has also built relationships with surrounding counties and we all work together to solve crime.

I have worked in this county in law enforcement continually for **23 years**. I have a proven and consistent track record. I began my career at the Cannon County Sheriff's Department and lastly at the Woodbury Police Department where I worked there continually from 1991 to 2010. Before I assumed the job as Sheriff I was Assistant Chief of Police. During these years I received countless hours of specialized training. I believe this work record is essential to my candidacy. I love this county and have enjoyed spending many years working here. And I would like to continue working here.

In closing I would like to thank everyone for your support and I am asking for your continued support. Some changes take time and I still have other plans to complete. I would like to continue moving the Sheriff's Office forward, but I can't do that alone without your help. I would appreciate your vote and support on August 7th.

I encourage you to make the most of each day because one day you will be glad you did.







# **Tomato Time - Tomato Pie**

There is no harbinger of great eating more iconic than a fresh homegrown tomato. One taste of a rich red tomato straight off the vine and most of us want only one thingmore. The sweet, slightly acidic tang is a flavor that just screams summer and brings to mind all kinds of food memories for those of us lucky enough to have grown up close to a garden. Most of us love a luscious, juicy tomato served simply with just a sprinkle of onions and herbs. People love a good tomato in their salad. But in our neck of the woods, everyone grew up with one or two classic recipes that call for perfect summer tomatoes and have become required guests at every gathering. These recipes have likely been handed down for a few generations and most of them have slight variations that mark them as family heirlooms of their own. Much depends on the tastes and opinions of the family cook who introduced the original recipe to the family. Often, for instance, a recipe will call for a particular tomato variety. I have one friend who grows a special variety of Beefsteak tomato just for his favorite recipe-tomato sandwiches.

The tomato sandwich is a timeless Southern classic, made with simple sturdy white bread, a little salt and pepper and mayonnaise. This for me is similar to the traditional lobster roll in Maine; you can make minor adjustments, but don't mess with the basics. People may argue about which mayonnaise is the right one. Duke's, Hellman's or Kraft are all contenders. I have actually heard arguments for each brand. Some folks will carefully craft their white bread at home, using a time honored family bread recipe. Others swear by Pepperidge Farm Farmhouse white bread. Some may get their bread from a hometown bakery. But no one I know would ever change from white to whole wheat or any other variation of bread. The sandwich is simply prepared by slathering the bread with mayonnaise,

slicing tomatoes warm from a sunny garden and placing them on top of the mayonnaise. Sprinkle with a little salt and pepper, then top the tomatoes with a second slice of bread. For a garden party, you might cut the sandwiches into pretty shapes or even just quarter them. One thing is sure, though, they will get gobbled up!

Another Southern favorite is tomato pie. This can be served as a starter, a picnic entrée or even as a Sunday supper side. Unlike the tomato sandwich, however, there are as many variations on the tomato pie as there are gardens and gardeners. Some people make a tomato pie with a dough crust, essentially creating a deep dish pizza with fresh tomatoes as the core ingredient. Others will make a regular style pie crust but with bits of cheese incorporated into the crust. Some folks go with just fresh tomatoes and a few fresh herbs. Others swear by adding a touch of sugar. Many more seem to favor using cheese layered between the tomatoes. Some let their tomatoes drain before adding them to the pie. Others load up on fresh basil and mozzarella. You get the idea. If you have a pile of luscious tomatoes, you can make a tomato pie. It can be as simple as you like and the results can be as amazing as that first ripe tomato of summer. Here is my favorite recipe, which can be assembled in a few minutes and adjusted to fit what is in your pantry pretty easily.

#### Fresh Tomato Pie

(if you have some pesto available, you can substitute that for the basil and garlic and save some time.)

1 pre-made refrigerated pie crust

3-4 fresh ripe garden tomatoes (don't make these with those pink things they sell in big stores-it won't work!) 1/2 teaspoon salt

3 tablespoons fresh basil, chopped finely

1-2 teaspoons minced garlic or

1-2 cups grated sharp hard cheese (you can use Parmesan, Gouda, or Cheddar-it is about what you have and what you like!)



#### **Fresh Tomato Pie**

Preheat your oven to 400oF. Remove your pie crust from the refrigerator and let it come to room temperature. Meanwhile, slice your tomatoes into half inch thick slices and lay them in a single layer in a large colander, letting them drain into the sink. (Some people will even lay their tomato slices between paper towels to get rid of excess moisture.) Unroll the pie dough and fit it into a pie pan or tarte pan. Pierce the crust a few times and place it in the oven. Turn the heat down to 350oF and bake the crust for ten minutes. Remove the crust and let it cool a bit. Sprinkle the crust with enough cheese to dust the bottom. Lay a layer of drained tomatoes in the crust. Sprinkle a layer of cheese on the tomatoes and then dot with some of the garlic and basil. Add another layer of tomatoes, then another layer of cheese, garlic and basil. Repeat until you have filled your pie pan. Sprinkle a bit of cheese over the top. Bake the pie for 30 minutes. Let it set for five minutes on the counter. You can serve this pie hot or at room temperature.

# Genealogy session set on **Supreme Court records**

Among the vast amount of information available at the Tennessee State Library and Archives (TSLA), Tennessee Supreme Court records make up by far the largest single collection. With individual case files that sometimes include hundreds of pages and stretch over several generations, the entire collection takes up most of an entire floor of TSLA's building.

These records are packed full of valuable information for genealogists and other researchers. And during the next session of TSLA's free workshop series, State Librarian and Archivist Chuck Sherrill will provide tips on navigating through those files.

"Every county in the state

has sent cases to the Supreme Court on appeal," Mr. Sherrill said. "In some cases, the local records have been lost or destroyed. That means the Supreme Court records are sometimes the only ones still available. The cases cover every aspect of life in old Tennessee, ranging from land disputes to horse

stealing, and from moonshining to murder."

Mr. Sherrill has 30 years of experience as a librarian, archivist and genealogist, and has written more than 20 books on various historical topics. He has served as state librarian and archivist since 2010.






